Dear friends in Christ,

May the peace and love of our Lord be with you all. In today's Gospel, we hear the parable of the sower and the seed. Have you ever thought about what type of soil you are? Is your heart solid as rock, filled with arrogance and pride, so that when God's Word is sown upon you it only rolls right off and doesn't do anything? When we think we know everything and know better than God and His Church, we are like the hardened path or the rocky soil where the seed falls, maybe it sprouts, but it soon withers and dies because it does not have anywhere to take root. Or, maybe our hearts are filled with thorns that choke off the Word of God. This happens when we mingle with the wrong people who could care less about God and His Commandments and we soon get overtaken by the thorns of evil and sin. This also happens when we let things like drugs, alcohol, internet, cell phones and certain relationships control us. God asks that we be like rich, fertile soil that allows His Word to sprout and take root and grow. In order for us to be this kind of soil, we must be humble, recognizing our dependence upon God. We must fertilize the soil through prayer, reading of God's Word, frequent Confession and attending Mass. When we do this, the seed will grow into what God wants it to be and then will produce much fruit, more than a hundredfold.

This weekend, we welcome three transitional deacons from the Czech Republic: Jaroslav Rašovský, Martin Rumíšek and Zdeněk Mlčoch. They will stay with us for about 4 weeks. I will once again be taking them to various activities and events during their stay with us so I will be out of the office much of the time. Please also pay close attention to the weekday Mass schedule, as it will change often during this time.

Saint Fact: Saint Kateri Tekakwitha, Virgin: She is the first Native American to be declared a Saint. Her feast day is this Monday, July 14. She is the patroness of the environment and ecology.

Kateri was born near the town of Auriesville, New York, in the year 1656, the daughter of a Mohawk warrior. She was four years old when her mother died of smallpox. The disease also attacked Kateri and transfigured her face. She was adopted by her two aunts and an uncle. Kateri became converted as a teenager. She was baptized at the age of twenty and incurred the great hostility of her tribe. Although she had to suffer greatly for her Faith, she remained firm in it. Kateri went to the new Christian colony of Indians in Canada. Here she lived a life dedicated to prayer, penitential practices, and care for the sick and aged. Every morning, even in bitterest winter, she stood before the chapel door until it opened at four and remained there until after the last Mass. She was devoted to the Eucharist and to Jesus Crucified. She died on April 17, 1680 at the age of twenty-four. She is known as the "Lily of the Mohawks". Devotion to Kateri is responsible for establishing Native American ministries in Catholic Churches all over the United States and Canada. Kateri was declared venerable by the Catholic Church in 1943, was Beatified in 1980, and canonized on 10/21/2012 by Pope Benedict XVI.
