Dear friends in Christ,

I believe all schools have resumed their classes for this school year. Please pray for all the children and teachers of our schools, whether they are at Catholic Schools or other private or public schools. The children and teachers need our prayers.

As our Parish Bazaar approaches, I ask that you pray about volunteering to work at the Bazaar. We have many parishioners who do not work and we need their help. Please consider volunteering for Bingo or one of the other areas listed on the sign-up sheet.

Today's readings speak to us about humility. It is good for us to recognize our gifts and talents, but we should not go around advertising them to everyone we meet. St. Paul says we are to boast not of ourselves, but only of the Cross of Jesus Christ. Doing this is a sign of humility, of being a humble person -- being humble before God and being humble before other people.

In the reading taken from the Book of Sirach, we read, "My son, conduct your affairs with humility, and you will be loved more than a giver of gifts. Humble yourself the more, the greater you are, and you will find favor with God." The more that you humble yourself and the less that you brag about yourself, the more other people will like and respect you. This is because the main element in the virtue of humility is truthfulness. Everyone admires the person who tells the truth. I suppose this is why many politicians are **not** admired today. Notice that I only said "many" because there still are some honest politicians.

The virtue of humility also consists of knowing that God put our talents within us and being able to give Him first credit for our accomplishments. A person who is humble is also able to acknowledge their flaws and failures and they accept them and do not get stuck in them. Humility is accepting who God made you to be in this life and living this life only for the greater glory of God and not for one's own glory.

Our ultimate model of humility must be Jesus Christ. St. Paul says in his letter to the Philippians: "Though he was in the form of God, he emptied himself and took the form of a slave....He humbled himself, even to death, death on a cross." Christ did not stand up and say, "Hey, I am God and you better worship me." No...He took the form of a slave and served the Father, always doing the will of the Father, always being obedient to the Father. Jesus recognized His dependence on God the Father. That is why the virtue of humility is so difficult for each of us. We are too independent and self-reliant. And nowadays, we refuse to be obedient to anyone, except ourselves. We often say that no one can tell me how to live my life, not even the Catholic Church. When we disobey the Church, we are disobeying God as well. Once we realize how much we need God in our lives and how we must be obedient to Him, it is at that time that the virtue of humility begins to grow within us.

Start off with small acts of humility - - - When someone cuts you off in traffic, say a prayer for them - - - The next time someone gives you a gift or honors you when you think you don't deserve it, say "Thank you" and be grateful to God for this sign of love - - - The next time you disagree with the teachings of the Church, think about it some more and ask God to grant you the grace to see the truthfulness of that teaching, instead of badmouthing the Church - - - The next time you catch yourself blaming everyone else - from your parents to the President of the U.S. - for your problems, recall that, when a London newspaper asked G.K. Chesterton to write an essay on *"What's Wrong With the World,"* he sent back this reply: *"Dear Sir, I am." Sincerely yours, G.K. Chesterton.*
