

### Dear friends in Christ,

Peace be with you. We have had some beautiful weather recently. Hope you have been able to enjoy it. The beauty of God's creation is amazing!

This week, we celebrate the feast of St. Pope John XXIII on Tuesday. Many of you will remember him, as he was Pope from 1958 to 1963. Saturday is the feast day of St. Teresa of Jesus, also known as St. Teresa of Avila. She was truly a remarkable woman of the 16<sup>th</sup> century.

Don't forget that this is Respect Life month. Continue to pray for those who are praying in front of abortion clinics, for those who are going there for abortions, and for those who are working for Planned Parenthood and other abortion facilities killing babies in the wombs of their mothers. May they have a conversion of heart and mind and may God's mercy be with them. May they see the evil that they are doing.

October is also the month of the rosary. Be sure to pray the rosary daily with your family. May the love and protection of our Blessed Mother, Mary, be with you all.

Our first reading, from the Second Book of Kings, tells a story of the healing of the leprosy of Naaman, a general in the king's army. In his day, the leper was an outcast. The thought of living with leprosy terrorized people. Elisha, a man of God, shows us the depth of God's love, even for the most undesirable people in our midst, by ministering to Naaman. A few verses before today's reading reveal that Naaman did not even believe that he could be healed in the muddy waters of the Jordan. Through Elisha, we see the mystery of God when He bestows His saving grace on the lowly, and not on the kingly. The prophet's message was to trust in God's ways and do the unlikely things that God asks of us.

In today's gospel, ten lepers seek out Jesus and are cured of their leprosy. Only one, a Samaritan, returns to Jesus to give thanks to God. Jesus, like the prophet Elisha, ministers to society's outcasts, the lepers. Jesus cures the incurable. He brings those without hope back to the community. The message given to the people is very clear. God loves us with an unconditional love. God wants to give us His saving grace no matter how incurable our sins may seem. God wants us to reach out to the poorest of the poor and the outcasts of society.

Paul describes himself as a criminal and a prisoner in today's second reading. We hear that Paul was imprisoned because he preached the gospel of the risen Jesus. He preached, and thereby suffered, so that others could come to understand the good news and receive salvation. Though not a leper, Paul was nonetheless an outcast, a criminal in the eyes of many, and a prisoner in society. Sometimes we, too, need to follow the example of Paul and not only reach out to the outcasts of society, but also, if necessary, to **become** the outcasts for the sake of the salvation of others. That is not an easy thing to do, especially if we are too concerned about our self-image. May we all learn from today's readings and go forth with courage to bring God's mercy and healing to all we meet.

May your lives each day be filled with a thankful spirit.

Fr. Ricardo was born on August 4, 1987, into a Catholic family of both Salvadoran and Mexican descent. He is a native of San Diego, California. Following high school, he attended the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana. While in studies at Notre Dame, he played trumpet in the marching Band of the Fighting Irish. In May of 2008, he graduated from Notre Dame with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Philosophy and a minor in Theology.

Fr. Ricardo began hearing a call to the priesthood as early as age 6, but it was not until his freshmen year of high school that he began serious discernment of his vocation in prayer. This discernment continued throughout high school and college. After learning more about the vocation to priesthood as well as the vocation to marriage, he discovered that although the thought of marriage made him happy, he imagined himself happier as a priest, serving God for the salvation of souls. So by the end of his second year at Notre Dame, he had accepted God's call to the priesthood with a firm "Yes!" In time, he further discerned a call to the religious life.

Fr. Ricardo joined the Fathers of Mercy as a postulant in July of 2008. Following his one year novitiate, he professed his first year of temporary vows of Obedience, Poverty, and Chastity on August 14, 2009. He graduated from Holy Apostles College and Seminary and was ordained a priest for the Fathers of Mercy in May of 2013. For three years, he served as an associate pastor of four small parishes in the Archdiocese of Louisville. This past June, he was resigned to the Fathers of Mercy Mission Band. He also currently serves as the community's Treasurer General.
