Dear friends in Christ.

Praised be Jesus Christ...who is the Light of the world. "On those dwelling in a land overshadowed by death, light has arisen." On January 22, 1973, a great shadow fell over our land. On this day, the Supreme Court made its ruling in Roe v. Wade, and since then, a shadow of death has prevailed in this country.

But now -- "On those dwelling in a land overshadowed by death, light has arisen." These words, which we hear in today's gospel, remind us that it is Jesus Christ who said, "I am the light of the world". We live in the light of Christ and it is in the light of Christ that we find true life. The life and teachings of Jesus is the Gospel of Life. However, this Gospel of Life has not yet dispersed the shadows of death. Until the second coming of Jesus, there will be this struggle and conflict between the culture of death and the culture of life. In his encyclical titled Evangelium Vitae, Gospel of Life, St. John Paul II sees the whole world facing a decision between "the culture of death" and "the culture of life." Sometimes it seems that the culture of death is winning. In our country, we have abortion by demand, euthanasia, the exclusion of the handicapped, the abuse of the weak, and coercive population control, things all strongly promoted by Planned Parenthood, by those who are rich and those who seem to be physically fit. They make up the rules for this culture of death so that they can have more wealth for themselves.

"Be not afraid!" These are the words of the Risen Christ to His disciples and these are the words that St. John Paul II said to all of us so many times. "Be not afraid!" was the message of St. John Paul II during his last trip to the U.S. The culture of death will not prevail. It tells us in the Gospel of John that "the light came into the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." And, as we know, Jesus Christ is this LIGHT and Jesus Christ will not be overcome by the darkness of Satan.

But, at times, each of us may have doubts. Sometimes it seems that the darkness gets darker and darker. In the 44 years since Roe v. Wade, there have been more than 59 million unborn children killed in this country alone -- who knows how many in the whole world. But, yet, this has not stopped the people from working hard and selflessly for life. There have been many people who have gotten tired and have been tempted to give up for the cause of life. However, when you feel that way, listen to the words which we ended with in today's Responsorial Psalm, "Wait for the Lord with courage; be stouthearted, and wait for the Lord." And also listen to the words at the beginning of this Psalm, "the Lord is my light and my salvation; whom should I fear? The Lord is my life's refuge; of whom should I be afraid?" Though these words were written hundreds of years before the time of Christ, they are the words of Jesus. It is in these words that we find courage and strength to stand up for a culture of life and destroy a culture of death. The Catholic Church has remained committed to the pro-life movement and, for many years, has had to stand alone on this issue. But today, many others - Protestants, Jews, and nonbelievers - stand with us in speaking up for life. For this, we all need to give thanks to God.

St. Paul tells us in today's second reading, "I urge you, brothers and sisters, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you agree in what you say, and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and in the same purpose." I pray that it may be said of this parish that, when it comes to the message of Evangelium Vitae -- The Gospel of Life, that all of you are united in the same mind and in the same purpose. Each one of us is called to prayer ... each one of us is called to action, though your action may be limited. In our personal lives, in our families, in our parish, in our communities and in our country, we are called to speak up for the Gospel of Life. Through you and me, the Gospel of Life will disperse the shadow of death. So let us follow the advice of Jesus Christ and of St. John Paul II: Live in the light ... Live for the light ... Be not afraid!

This Monday, January 23, is the Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children. We all need to pray that babies in the wombs of their mothers will be protected from being killed. This is one of the most horrendous atrocities of our time, yet many people think it is ok. We live in a crazy and confused world. Please come to the church anytime this Monday to spend some time in prayer.

May all of you have a most blessed week living in the Light of our Lord.
