Dear Parishioners.

May the peace and love of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all. Thank you to everyone who helped with the Confirmation reception last Sunday. It was a wonderful meal and time for fellowship. Thank you to our Catechists who gave of their time and talents to prepare the students to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. Thank you also to the parents for valuing their faith and relationship with the Lord and so desiring that their children also experience a special presence of Christ in their life. Thanks also to the choir for helping us to have a beautiful worship experience.

For the next two weeks, our statues will be covered to remind us that we are in the most solemn time of our Church year. The covering of the statues also reminds us that we are to give up all that is pleasing to our senses during this remaining time of Lent and focus upon the suffering of our Lord. Let us enter into these final days of Lent with our entire being, mind, body and soul, so that we can more intensely experience the joy of the resurrection and salvation.

Next Sunday is Palm Sunday, the beginning of Holy Week. The Easter Triduum during Holy Week is our most sacred and solemn time of the whole year. We should make it a priority to attend the celebrations on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday, setting aside other non-religious activities that may conflict with these sacred days. Let us be faithful to God.

Our Mass schedule for the Easter Triduum will be as follows:

Holy Thursday - 7:00 p.m., Good Friday - 7:00 p.m., Holy Saturday - 8:15 p.m., Easter Sunday - 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.

We will also have Stations of the Cross on Wednesday evening at 6:30 p.m. so come and join us in experiencing the love of God through the passion of His Son, Jesus.

We will be having Altar Server practice for each of the above celebrations. Altar Servers will have practice for Holy Thursday on Palm Sunday, April 9, following the 8:30 a.m. Mass. Altar Server practice for Good Friday will be after Mass on Holy Thursday. Altar Server practice for Holy Saturday will be at 11:00 a.m. on Holy Saturday. All Altar Servers who are scheduled to serve at each of the above celebrations are asked to be at these practices. If you are not able to serve when scheduled, please find a substitute for you and be sure to tell them that they must attend the practice as scheduled for that particular day. Also, please call Jennifer to let her know so that we will know who will be serving. Thank you to all of you for serving at God's Altar.

In this Sunday's Gospel, we have the story of the raising of Lazarus from the dead. In the Gospels, Jesus raises three people from the dead: the widows' son at Nain, Jairus' daughter, and Lazarus, whom we heard about in today's gospel.

The raising of Lazarus from the dead is the most powerful story of the three people whom Jesus brought back to life. Jesus told the disciples: "Lazarus is dead. For your sake, I am glad that I was not there, that you may come to *believe....*" Then Jesus called out, not quietly or gently, but *loudly*: "Lazarus, come out!" And Lazarus comes walking out of the tomb. It was for those who were present at the grave of Lazarus and for each of us that Jesus did this miracle, that we might believe in Him and prepare ourselves for the glory of His kingdom, for our Resurrection...not for the glory of this earth. He did it for the glory of our new life with Him as He takes us to the vision of His Father.

In our Masses for the dead, we hear: "Lord, for your faithful people life is changed, not ended. When the body of our earthly dwelling lies in death, we gain an everlasting dwelling place in heaven." As St. Teresa of Avila said in her last days on earth: "I am not dying; I am entering life." As Catholic Christians, this is what we believe and celebrate: a new life in heaven, fully united with our Lord Jesus Christ. It is only through Jesus Christ that we overcome the sting of death. Doctors, hospitals, psychologists and friends can help us make our way through life and help us when we are dying. But only Jesus Christ can prepare us for eternal life with Him, and with God our Father, and with the Holy Spirit. Jesus has given us the Sacraments of the Church to help us in this life and to give us all we need so that we are assured of eternal life with Him. May we always frequent the Sacraments, thereby, choosing Jesus and eternal life.

NOTICE

Recently, I wrote a letter to Bishop Joe Vásquez asking for permission to begin having a 10:30 a.m. Mass on Sunday morning. He has responded by granting my request. There were several reasons for this request.

- 1. In the last few years, the population in Jarrell has increased quite rapidly. In the Sonterra Addition, they have built over 1,300 new homes and are adding more than 225 homes per year. A new apartment complex is being built with over 300 units. Also, the Jarrell Town Center Addition is expanding. 100 homes have been built and another 214 home sites are in progress. The population is increasing about 10% annually. We need to act now to accommodate the people who are moving into this area. Some people who have moved into Jarrell are attending Mass at other parishes because they prefer a later Mass time on Sunday.
- 2. We need more people to attend our parish here at Corn Hill if this parish is to keep a resident priest.
- 3. The 8:30 a.m. Mass is becoming very crowded and uncomfortable. People do not like to feel crowded in the pews.

<u>Having another Mass presents us with some challenges, though.</u> We need more Extaordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, more altar servers, lectors, ushers and more people to help with the music and more cantors. If you would like to become involved in one or more of these ministries please contact the parish office.

The new Mass addition will begin on a weekly basis on June 4 (the day of our June Fundraiser). However, we will have a 10:30 a.m. Mass before that time, on Easter Sunday, April 16, and for First Holy Communion on April 30.

May all of you continue to have a spiritually renewing Season of Lent as we prepare ourselves for Holy Week and the celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord at Easter.

Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord



Next weekend, April 8/9, is Palm Sunday. Here is a little meditation to prepare ourselves, as we will journey spiritually with Jesus and walk along with Him from His entry into Jerusalem through the mystery of His Passion and Death and, ultimately, to His glorious Resurrection. If we die with Him we shall also live with Him (cf Romans 6:8).

The blessed sacramental palms we receive help focus our attention on this journey. Besides also being referred to as Palm Sunday, it has sometimes been called Fig Sunday because figs were eaten as a remembrance of the fig tree cursed by Jesus after entering Jerusalem (Mark 11:12-14). At times, different types of branches were used since it was difficult to get palms in areas where they were hard to grow. So, it has also had the name of Yew Sunday or Branch Sunday.

The palm, or phoenix (also phoinix) as it is known in Greek, was a symbol of highest honor, of rejoicing and triumph. It was customary to lay palms and cloaks in front of someone as an indication of submission to them. Imagine the outrage of the officials when they saw Jesus' entry.

They all knew the symbolism the palm contained in many places of the Old Testament. They knew the prophecy, which said "... your king shall come to you; a just savior... meek, and riding on an ass, on a colt, the foal of an ass...he will banish the chariot...and the horse...the warrior's bow..." (cf Zechariah 9:9-10). When the Pharisees told Him to rebuke His disciples, the Lord said that the stones would cry out if they were silenced. In the minds of the Sanhedrin, then, Christ was declaring himself King.

One might ask whether it is possible to be triumphant and victorious and, at the same time, humble. By choosing to enter Jerusalem in the manner in which he did, Jesus showed the people the type of king he truly is. He comes in triumph, but not triumphantly. He has taught as a shepherd, not as a general. Those who have heard him speak, or witnessed a miracle that he worked, have now been called to give witness to their experiences. They do so by proclaiming Jesus the "Son of David," praising God the Father for sending their long awaited savior. Although He eagerly desired to drink the cup He was about to drink, Christ wept for Jerusalem as He drew near (cf Luke 19:21), for the suffering that he knew would come to them.

Let us then, enter into His merciful Passion:

...by how much the more we announce the Passion of the Lord, by so much the more we approach to the celebration of His Resurrection. There are yet six days till we reach the joy of that festival ... even in these six days ... try to recover your ground, if ye have in any respect failed in ... preceding weeks ... the nearer we approach our Paschal joy, so much the purer we ought to make ourselves by fasting, by praying, by watching, and by all the works of mercy; and furthermore, to wash out our sins by continual weeping. And if anyone thinks that he need not weep for his own sins, at least he ought in these days to sorrow for the sufferings of his Lord. For though He were God before all worlds, coming in the form of a servant, and being spit upon and scourged by wicked men, for their and our salvation, He did not abhor at this time to lay down His life. Let each one of you, my brethren, suffer with Him, carrying His reproach, and lamenting the blindness of those from whom He endured it. He Himself hath said in the Gospel, *Blessed are they that mourn, for they shall be comforted*. Grief, for a little while, is now in season, to the end that we may more freely rejoice in the holy Resurrection. The Psalmist also saith, *What shall I render to the Lord for all the benefits He hath done unto Me? I will receive the cup of salvation, and call upon the Name of the Lord*. By the cup we may understand both open persecution and hidden sorrow, which in some way or other must be tasted by every Christian. Let us prepare ourselves, therefore, beloved, for the coming festival, to which the Lord grant us to attain in a worthy manner. Let us, then, rejoice, not in delicacy of good living, but by sending before us the works of justice and equity...

...and by the works of mercy as well! May the palms we take home today be a symbol of our communion with our Blessed Lord and His Passion...and a spur to drawing closer to Him as well.
