"You've all heard Fr. Stephen announce in Mass, or have read in the bulletin many times before ... Even though I knew my parish family quite well and had been the parish secretary for over 10 years, I still couldn't bring myself to overcome the anxiety of standing up in front of everyone and speaking or performing a task. But, I am here to testify, that being on the Altar – and being able to proclaim the Scriptures to you and offer you our Lord in the Eucharist – has brought me more joy and peace than I can explain. #### Dear friends in Christ,

Peace be with you! I hope and pray that the joy of Easter still remains in your heart. Congratulations to our children who are receiving the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus for the first time in Holy Communion this weekend. May they always have a great desire to receive Him often so that they are constantly being nourished by our Lord.

The month of May begins this Monday and it is the month of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Everyone is invited to join us at the following celebrations to honor Mary, because in doing so, we are giving honor to her Son, Jesus. On Wednesday, May 10, we will not have Mass, but our CCE children will gather in the church at 6:30 p.m. to pray the Rosary together. Then, on May 17, which is our last CCE class, we will have the Crowning of Mary at our 6:30 p.m. Mass.

We congratulate Sts. Cyril and Methodius Catholic Church in Granger who are celebrating their 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary this weekend. May God bless them all with a strong and fervent faith to proclaim the Gospel and to continue to bring His loving presence to all in Granger and the surrounding area.

In today's Gospel, we hear about how the two disciples of Jesus walked with Him on the road to Emmaus. They did not recognize Him at first, but "They had come to know him in the breaking of the bread." This is why we always need to be conscious of what the Mass is all about and why we are here to participate in this celebration. The Mass is truly a place where we encounter the Risen Lord in a very special and unique way, just as the two disciples encountered Jesus on the road to Emmaus and then recognized Him in the breaking of the bread. We could say this is the first Mass Jesus celebrated following His resurrection. Because of Jesus, the Mass is the best thing we do in life. The Mass should not be something we have to do, but instead, the Mass should be something we want to do, as often as possible. It is truly a special encounter with God. Unfortunately, there are those who have the idea of Mass only as an obligation, rather than the great treasure that it is.

This special encounter with God began when Jesus was with his Apostles at the Last Supper. He prayed *for* them and He prayed *with* them. Then He fulfilled His great promise and instituted the Mass. He gave them His Body and Blood. He commanded that they continue this Mass until the end of time. That is why we are here. We are keeping Jesus' command. We are celebrating the Eucharist.

If you ever study the history of the Protestant revolt, you will read how priests were hanged for offering the Sacrifice of the Mass. In England and Ireland, it was forbidden and had to be done in secret at the risk of losing one's life and the risk of having one's property confiscated. Yet, those who had the faith were willing to take this risk in order to receive their Lord in Holy Communion. The same is true in many parts of the world today. Would we be willing to do the same in order to receive the Body and Blood of Christ at Mass?

At the Last Supper with His Apostles, Jesus took bread, broke it, and made it His Body. He took wine, blessed it, and made it His Blood. He commanded His Apostles to do this always as a way of remembering Him and as <u>THE</u> way of making Him present to them forever. When the early Christians did this, they referred to it as the "Breaking of the Bread", as we heard in today's gospel. Jesus gives Himself to us in the form of a meal because sharing a meal together is one of the greatest expressions of friendship. We should try to see that in the assembly of people gathered here at Mass ... that we are friends with one another and united with each other in the name of Jesus.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "The Sunday celebration of the Lord's Day and His Eucharist is at the heart of the Church's life. 'Sunday is the day on which the paschal mystery is celebrated in light of the apostolic tradition and is to be observed as the foremost holy day of obligation in the universal Church." Thus, the "Breaking of the Bread" is the main reason we gather here each week and each day. St. John Chrysostom says, "You cannot pray at home as at church, where there is a great multitude, where exclamations are cried out to God as from one great heart, and where there is something more: the union of minds, the accord of souls, the bond of charity, the prayers of priests." And so, in our parish churches, the most visible sign of our being recognized as people who have the Catholic faith is to come together for Mass and share the "Breaking of Bread" as Jesus did at the Last Supper. The Mass is the heart and center of Catholic worship. It makes the difference in our belief.

When we receive the Eucharist together, receiving Holy Communion, we are participating in the greatest act of worship we can do together as Catholics. Theologians have referred to the Eucharist as "the bread of angels," "bread from heaven"; it has been called the medicine of immortality, for Jesus said, "He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood live in me." It is a promise from Jesus that He will take us to heaven if we receive Him and follow Him. What a great and wonderful promise and gift our Lord has given us. Let us always show our appreciation to our Lord for this great gift by spending a few minutes in prayer giving thanks to Jesus for giving us His Body and Blood. We should never receive Holy Communion at Mass and then just walk straight out the door. This is like slapping Jesus in the face after you have received Him. Go back to the pew and say a prayer and stay at Mass until the prayer after Mass is completed. After all, you would not go to someone's home and eat dinner with them and then after you take the last bite get up and run out the door. No, you would stay a little while longer visiting with them before you leave and thanking them for the wonderful meal. Even more so, we should stay with the Lord until all is completed and then go home and *live* what we have received.

May the blessings of our Lord in this Easter Season continue to be with each of you.
