#### Dear friends in Christ,

Congratulations to all of our graduates. Let us all pray for those who are graduating from High School as they begin a new chapter in their life. May they always allow Jesus to be their Shepherd. We need to also pray for all college graduates as they seek employment. May they seek the Lord's guidance in choosing the job that our Lord wants them to have.

In today's readings, we hear much about love. Jesus tells us that we are to keep His commandments, and the main commandment is love. What is love? Love is not a feeling. Love is not an emotion. Love is a choice we make to give of ourselves unselfishly to and for the good of another, just as Jesus did on the cross. Sometimes I hear people say, "I don't feel like I love that person anymore." Only when we live by feelings and emotions can we make such a statement. 'True love' loves the other person no matter what happens and no matter how they feel. It is a choice we make. True love always tells the truth. True love is always honest. True love says what needs to be said, in the spirit of charity, even though it may mean that the person that it is said to may not speak to us again. True love does not talk down to other people. True love speaks with humility. True loves desires the other person to go to heaven ... and this means supporting the other person in living a life of faithfulness to Jesus and to His Church. True love helps the other person to keep God's commandments ... and this means not being afraid to tell the other person when they are straying away from Jesus and His Church, and gently leading them to doing what is right, even though doing what is right may be inconvenient or difficult. In order to do this, we must overcome our own feelings and emotions as Jesus did. This can be very difficult when we are insecure, or when we are a very "needy" people. Sometimes our own "neediness" gets us into trouble. If I say to someone "I love you" and then convince them to commit sin with me, it is not love at all. It is only a fulfillment of my need, or the need of the other - - - it is not love. We need to help one another to keep God's commandments, which we normally number as ten, but also include many subcategories as we find in the Scriptures.

#### The Ten Commandments are:

- **1.** I am the Lord your God. You shall not have strange gods before me.
- 2. You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain.
- **3.** Remember to keep holy the Sabbath Day.
- **4.** Honor your father and your mother.
- 5. You shall not kill.
- **6.** You shall not commit adultery.
- 7. You shall not steal.
- **8.** You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.
- 9. You shall not covet your neighbor's wife.
- 10. You shall not covet your neighbor's goods.

There are also the two commandments of Jesus, which summarize the Ten Commandments:

And one of them, a doctor of the Law, putting him to the test, asked him, "Master, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" Jesus said to him, "'Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with thy whole heart, and with thy whole soul, and with thy whole mind.' This is the greatest and the first commandment. And the second is like it, 'Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself.' On these two commandments depend the whole Law and the Prophets." (Matthew 22:35-40)

We should do our best to help one another keep these commandments. When we do so, it shows our love for the other person and also our love for God. It is difficult at times, but, with the help of the Holy Spirit, we can do it. We just need to have faith and trust in our Lord.

Remember the words of Jesus in today's Gospel, "Whoever has my commandments and observes them is the one who loves me. And whoever loves me will be loved by my Father, and I will love him and reveal myself to him." (John 15:21)

As we continue to honor our Blessed Mother, Mary, during this month of May, don't forget to pray the rosary daily, reflecting upon the mysteries for each day. In doing so, we grow closer to her Son, Jesus, and we grow stronger in our faith.

May the blessings of our Lord be with each of you.

MARK YOUR CALENDARS AND PREPARE FOR OUR UPCOMING EIM WORKSHOP ON SATURDAY, JULY 22.

Several of our parishioners/ministers/catechists are in need of a refresher course in 2017 – so please check your renewal date. Even if you are not due for a refresher by July, but are this year, go ahead and utilize this opportunity to get it done. We always have one in July, so you would have the benefit of being in line with our schedule for the next time. If you don't remember it, you can find your renewal date on the diocesan website ... and if help is needed, please contact the parish office. If you're not able to attend this one, there are always workshops being held in many locations in the diocese each month. All workshop dates/locations can be found on the diocesan website at www.austindiocese.org. (Please be aware that our workshop will not be posted on the diocesan website until July (due to summer scheduling) – but you can, and should, go ahead and complete the online application, if needed, and then go back in to sign-up for our class closer to July 22.)

**IF YOU PLAN TO ATTEND THIS – OR ANY OTHER WORKSHOP – YOU NEED TO DO SOME THINGS PRIOR TO THE CLASS!** You will actually register for the workshop on the diocesan website. If you don't have access to the internet, you may contact the parish office and we will help you out. But, for those of you who do, please go online (www.austindiocese.org) and follow all of the directions on the Ethics & Integrity in Ministry page. If you have already taken an EIM course, then you will just have to sign up for a workshop. If you have NEVER taken an EIM course, then you will have to complete the online application and sign up for the workshop at the same time. **IT IS VERY IMPORTANT THAT YOU DO ALL OF THIS BEFORE ATTENDING THE WORKSHOP!** And, again, if you have any trouble in the process, or have any questions, please don't hesitate to contact the parish office for help!

#### EIM Q&A:

- Q: I don't work directly with children or vulnerable adults, so why do I need to be certified? I'm just handing out Holy Communion right next to the Pastor during Mass ... or I'm just a lector at Mass ... or I'm just an usher at Mass ... or I'm just a function coordinator for our fundraiser ... or I'm just a member of the Cemetery / Pastoral / Finance Council ... etc.
- A: Even if you are not directly involved with minors (anyone below age 18) or vulnerable adults (typically over age 65 or incapacitated in some form in which they would not be able to protect themselves), if these individuals are present at any event or program that you are involved in, then you must be EIM certified. This is not because you are believed to be a perpetrator, but so that you can have the skills and knowledge of what to look and/or listen for in the case of abuse or neglect by another person.

It also gives perpetrators the forewarning that there are eyes all around, who are watching out for the vulnerable. That knowledge will hopefully make them more apt to *not* do harm to others for fear of being seen or getting caught.

#### Q: Why do I need to take the course more than once?

A: New research and statistic data are composed annually and, in our roles as EIM certified individuals, we should all be informed and made aware of such information. Also, no one remembers everything – especially after three years – so it is good practice to have a 'refresher' course. We do understand that this topic is not one that is easily discussed or that we like to even think of in general, but it is all too real in today's society and it is, therefore, our duty as Christians to be vigilant and do what we can to help control and hopefully end this tragic behavior.

We ask that you do not let this necessary program steer you away from being a part of any function/program in our parish! It is a very small sacrifice to make (just 2 hours every three years!) that could make a big difference in someone else's life!

In a culture that often reduces the significance of human love and sexuality, and provides "depersonalized, recreational and often pessimistic information" (Truth and Meaning of Human Sexuality, 1), parents struggle to give their children an adequate education in regard to the true meaning of sexuality.

St. John Paul II labored to offer an adequate anthropology, or understanding of the human person, to the Church and to the world during his years of service as priest, bishop and pope. In his teaching, popularly known as Theology of the Body, and better understood as a catechesis on human love, he offered his reflections on the meaning of the body and the human person.

This presentation by Alissa Molina is an opportunity to better understand the human person in a way that is so radically different from the current culture.

Who should attend?? EVERYONE - REGARDLESS OF AGE OR GENDER - should be educated and informed so as to be an advocate for the teachings of the Catholic Church in celebrating LOVE & LIFE.
