Dear friends in Christ,

May the grace and peace of our Lord, Jesus Christ, be with you all. On Tuesday, we will celebrate the Fourth of July --Independence Day. Many of the freedoms and liberties that hundreds of thousands of people died for since the foundation of our great
country have slowly been chipped away over the last 50 years or so. Our Church is asking us to pray that these freedoms and liberties be
protected so that we, our children, our grandchildren and generations to come, can enjoy the freedoms and liberties that men and women
have died for so that we can have a better life. As we celebrate this Fourth of July, please pray --- especially for Respect for all Life, from
the first moment of conception to natural death, for defense of marriage as God intends it to be, and for Religious Freedom, that we may
be able to live and profess our faith without worry of being fined or jailed. These are God-given rights and freedoms. We pray that our
President and legislatures will always have the courage to defend these rights and freedoms.

In today's gospel, Jesus tells us, "...and whoever does not take up his cross and follow after me is not worthy of me." Jesus is saying that each one of us must bear our cross in life just as he did. We all have to endure some form of pain and suffering. This pain and suffering is the cross which we carry. And, in life, we will have many different crosses to carry. The most important cross, and the one of greatest value, is the one we carry when we have to suffer because of our faith in Jesus and we suffer for Him just as He suffered for us. No matter how many crosses we have, Jesus is always there waiting for us to ask him to help us carry it. All we have to do is ask him for help. The crosses we carry can change our lives and bring us closer to God.

What is your cross in life? Maybe the cross you are carrying is the pain you feel from the death of a loved one. The cross could be the abandonment you feel when your boyfriend or girlfriend has rejected you, or, as you might say, dumped you. Maybe your cross is the suffering you are enduring due to some form of illness, such as arthritis, cancer, or a number of other ailments. Maybe your cross is being unemployed, or having marriage problems, or maybe you have just been through a divorce. Children leaving the Church, or drinking heavily, or taking drugs can be a heavy cross for parents to have to carry. Going to school could be a cross for many of you children and teenagers and adults as well. There are many crosses that we may have to carry and many of those crosses we build ourselves. Sometimes, because of the sins we have committed, we make our own crosses to carry. The question is, what are we going to do with these crosses? Are we going to try to avoid carrying it, or are we going to carry it and ask Jesus for help? Why is it that some people can take up their cross and follow Jesus, while others cannot? Why do some people become better after having carried a cross, while others become bitter and angry at God? The answer to these questions is a matter of faith. If we have faith, the cross can turn us into saints. If we do not have faith, the cross can turn us into animals. Faith gives us the power to carry any cross which we are given. For the Christian, it is the faith that, as Jesus brought new life to the world by taking up his cross and carrying it, so can we bring new life to the world and to ourselves by taking up our cross and carrying it.

Many people turn away from God and get angry at Him when they have a cross to carry. If they only knew how much God wants to help them they would turn to the Lord and seek His help and assistance. That doesn't mean that carrying our cross is going to be easy. Sometimes we need a heavy cross for us to see our own sinfulness and to change our way of life. No matter what our cross - our suffering - is in life, we should be able to see how God is with us and how it has made us a better person. We should be able to determine how God is

working in us in our time of suffering. However, sometimes we may not be aware of God's presence in our suffering until we have had the opportunity to think and reflect upon the cross we have carried. This may be days, months, or years later. With the help of a priest, sister, close friend, or a spiritual director, we can better determine how God has worked in our lives in that moment of suffering. Many times, we can find the answer we are looking for in the bible. Read the New Testament and much of your pain and suffering will be better understood and made easier to bear.

In speaking to the Apostles in today's gospel, Jesus knew that they would each have a heavy cross to carry. Here, Jesus is telling the apostles that their ministry will not be easy. They have to rely totally on Jesus for their strength if they wish to carry out the mission which He will entrust to them. We, too, must rely totally on Jesus' help so that we will be able to carry the cross which we are given. So, when something in your life seems to be going the wrong way, go to Jesus crucified and ask Him to strengthen and assist you in your time of need. He will help you. For no one knows more about having to endure pain and suffering than Jesus Christ himself. Look at the cross and see how much He suffered for us. Jesus definitely understands suffering and is always ready to help us endure the sufferings which we experience. He may not help us in the way we expect Him to, but it will be in the way we most need to be helped. Remember, our way is not always the best way to do things. Let go of things and do it God's way. "...and whoever does not take up his cross and follow after me is not worthy of me."

I would like to end with the poem on the right which pretty much sums up what our attitude should be toward the crosses we have to carry.

Old Business

1. June Fundraiser – The June Fundraiser was a huge success both financially and socially. Fr. Stephen thanked all who helped in any way.

2. Corpus Christi Procession – The annual Corpus Christi Procession will be held on Sunday, June 18, after the 8:30 a.m. Mass. Each organization that sponsors an altar was given an agenda.

New Business

- 1. Tree Removal and Replacement Three trees on the south side of the church were cut down because they were hollow and a danger to cars and people. They will be replaced at a later date with new trees. Marla Tonn will look into what type of trees would be best, an approximate cost, etc.
- 2. EIM Workshop Our annual workshop will be held in the PAC Bldg on Saturday, July 22.
- 3. Czech Deacons Visit The Czech deacons will be visiting from July 18 through August 17.
- 4. Fr. Stephen's Vacation Fr. Stephen will be on vacation from June 18 through July 1, but will be here to celebrate the weekend Masses.
- 5. PAC Parking/Dumpster Area Because of weight shifting when the garbage truck stops and starts in front of the dumpster, damage is being done to the asphalt in that area. Numerous solutions were discussed.

Ministry/Committee Reports

- 1. Social Ministry Lucille D'Elia reported that the parish needs funds for our own social ministry. The 5th Sunday second collection will now be split between our social ministry and the Jarrell Food Pantry.
- 2. RE Program Lucille reported that a High School Course will be added to our children's CCE Program. Vacation Bible School will be held on Saturday, June 10. 95% of the cost of VBS has been covered by private donations.
- 3. Cemetery There will be a Cemetery Work Day on Saturday, June 24. The cemetery fund is in good shape.

Finance

The finance committee met on April 20, 2017. Tommy Sladecek reported that, even though we made major repairs to the parking lot and roads, we are in sound financial condition. Mass collections are up and expenses are stable. We currently have no major capital improvements planned for the upcoming fiscal year.

Other Business

- 1. The addition of the 10:30 a.m. Mass on Sundays, starting June 11, still requires more volunteers to help with music, lectoring and Eucharistic ministry.
- 2. The Bible Study was well attended and they expressed the want to continue with opportunities for more adult education.
