Dear friends in Christ,

Praised be Jesus Christ! Now and forever! Many schools have begun or will begin classes this week. Let us pray for all students, teachers and parents. May God's blessings be upon them and may they have the courage to live their faith and be witnesses of God's love to one another.

This Tuesday, August 22, we celebrate the Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Mary was made Queen of Heaven after her assumption into Heaven. Please try to attend Mass this Tuesday as we honor the reality of Mary's special place in God's Kingdom.

Thursday is the Feast of St. Bartholomew, one of the twelve apostles. We honor him as he gave his life for Jesus Christ and for His Church.

Many people ask questions about the Church's teaching on important issues like abortion, sterilization, in vitro fertilization, vasectomy, tubal ligations, gay marriage, end of life issues, feeding tubes, breathing tubes, and many others. It is important to know what the Church teaches about these topics. For information you can go to the Catechism of the Catholic Church and also to an excellent website <u>www.ncbcenter.org</u> (National Catholic Bioethics Center). This website will answer most, if not all, of your questions. Please take some time to explore it and be up-to-date on these issues.

Today, in the Gospel, we see the extraordinary faith of the Canaanite woman. Jesus recognizes her faith and heals her daughter. She was not part of the "Chosen People", but Jesus answers her request. Today Jesus is challenging us to live the Gospel of justice and charity, reaching out to other people who are suffering from the demons of poverty, racism, unemployment, war, family breakup, hunger, abandonment, or from one of the other thousands of demons that exist in the world today ... demons that strike innocent people, regardless of where they live or who they are. We are to live the Gospel, not just mouth it to others. We are to live the justice and charity that we are commanded to live by Jesus Christ.

Our religious tradition gives us thousands upon thousands of examples of people who lived a life of justice and charity. Examples that range from the time of Jesus to the present. People like St. Nicholas, St. Wenceslaus, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, or St. Francis of Assisi. Also people like Angelo Roncalli, who became Pope John XXIII. In 1943, while he was Archbishop Roncalli, he went to an extreme effort to help rescue Jewish refugees from the Nazi Holocaust. There were no boundaries to his Catholic Christianity.

We also have people such as St. (Mother) Teresa who went to Beirut to help rescue orphans from the bombing, almost all of whom were Muslim. In her eyes, they were all children of God, made in His image and likeness. That was all that mattered.

I believe St. Pope John Paul II says it all in his encyclical Evangelium Vitae, "The Gospel of Life". St. John Paul II says, "Every innocent human being is absolutely equal to all others." He would have no difficulty helping the Canaanite woman in today's Gospel.

And, of course, we have people in our own parish who help people of other faiths, such as those who volunteer and work at places of charity and assistance. What better place to find examples of people living true justice and charity than within our own parish community.

In today's Gospel, Jesus grants the Canaanite woman's request to show that God's love has no limits and accepts no boundaries. Today, Jesus challenges us to go beyond our boundaries and to be like God, who shows mercy to people of all races and all backgrounds. How are we going to respond to this challenge? Jesus hesitated before responding to the Canaanite woman who begged him for help. We, too, need time to pray and reflect on our lives so that we will know how we are to help others. Let us not forget that our first priority in life is to love God and to love others as ourselves. How well are we living this commandment? Think about it.
