As written in our Cemetery Policies & Procedures: "Annual contributions of at least \$20 per family are collected each October for cemetery upkeep and maintenance. Failure to pay the annual upkeep fee will result in a parishioner being charged to be buried at HTC (\$1500 casket / \$250 urn); once an individual turns 18 years of age, even if they are still living in their parents' home, they are considered to be their own parish family and should, therefore, fulfill the responsibilities as any other parish family and pay the annual contribution to the HTC Cemetery Fund."

This collection is a unique, global effort for the entire Church to provide for the building up of over one thousand local churches in Asia and Africa, the Pacific Islands, and parts of Latin America and Europe. Dear friends in Christ,

Peace be with you! Please continue to pray for a greater respect for life, from the moment of conception to natural death, during this Respect Life month. And, in being the month of the Rosary as well, it would be good to offer your daily rosary for this intention. May our Blessed Mother Mary intercede for the lives of the unborn and may her prayers gain forgiveness for the horrible crimes being committed by the killing of babies in the wombs of their mothers through the procedure known as abortion.

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou amongst women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus.

Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen

May the eyes of all people be opened to see the evils of abortion and all other evils against the dignity of life.

In today's Gospel, a group of people came to Jesus asking if it was lawful to pay taxes to the emperor. This was a loaded question. They were hoping that Jesus would get himself in trouble by answering it. And that could have happened easily. If he said yes, the people would have branded Him a traitor. If He said no, the Romans would have charged him with insurrection. But He did neither. Instead Jesus answers: "Give to Caesar what is Caesar's, but give to God what is God's." In reality, this response did not answer their question. He was telling them to figure it out for themselves, what belongs to Caesar and what belongs to God. We must realize that we cannot separate the spiritual from the physical world. They go together and we must deal with both, with the Caesars of our world and with God.

In today's Gospel, Jesus also uses good old common sense. He tells them: "Show me the coin used for the tax." Someone handed Him a Roman coin, a denarius. He held it up and asked the people: "Whose inscription is this?" They said, "Caesar's". Then Jesus said, "Give to Caesar what is Caesar's." Jesus knew that Rome did not look kindly on those who did not pay their taxes. Besides, the people owed Caesar something because he built and maintained roads which they used, like the state and federal governments do for us now. Paying taxes was a matter of common sense.

We need to apply this logic of Jesus to modern issues as well. We have all read and heard how drug use is up among young people. Some youth may be wondering, "Should I, or should I not? We need to apply common sense to that question. First of all, it is illegal. If you get caught, serious trouble may follow. You could also get addicted. I know a number of young people who were drug addicts at one time in their life. They did not intend to get hooked, but they did. Now their lives are messed up and may never get straightened out. Could that happen to you? Is it worth the risk? Think about it.

Thinking things through and applying a little common sense can also help us avoid a lot of grief. If the Jews had listened to Jesus, they may have averted tragedy. Because of their resentment towards the Romans, they became rebellious. Finally, Nero sent his armies to end the unrest. They laid siege to Jerusalem in 70 A.D. and they slaughtered close to a million Jewish people. The Jewish state was no more and they did not regain their homeland until 1948. If they had listened, and if they had thought, that tragedy might have been averted.

The same can be true in our own lives. We cast upon ourselves many unnecessary problems. These problems could be prevented, if only we would think. Let us consider an example. There is a man with a wife and family. He has a good home, loves his wife and children and he is respected by his friends. He has a bright future with much promise. But even with all this, the man is having an affair with another woman. He gambles his home and his family's happiness against a brief romance. To do that is sinful and stupid. That man needs to use his head. Ten minutes of intelligent thought could spare him and his family a lifetime of regret. The same can be said for a woman who does the same thing.

Often, we forget that our faith is not something just of the heart or just of the head. It is a combination of both, enmeshed in prayer. If we follow Christ, we need a loving heart and we also need intelligence and a close relationship with Jesus through prayer. We can never stop thinking, praying and loving. Listen quietly and you may hear a voice from eternity saying: "You have a brain. Use it!"

Saturday morning, October 28, we celebrate the feast of Sts. Simon and Jude, Apostles. Please consider attending the 7:30 am Mass to honor these two special saints.

Fr. Bill Casey was born on November 3, 1955, and is a native of Philadelphia, PA. He is a 1979 graduate of Temple University of Philadelphia. After graduation, he served as an officer in the U.S. Army, but gave up his military career in order to study for the priesthood. He entered the Congregation of the Fathers of Mercy and has been a member of the community since 1986. He is a graduate of Holy Apostles Seminary in Cromwell, CT.

Fr. Bill attributes his call to the priesthood to the Divine Mercy, his love for the study of Sacred Scripture and his strong devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

Fr. Bill served as Superior General of his Congregation from 1997 to 2009. He has worked extensively with Saint Joseph Communications since 1995 and has appeared on Eternal Word Television Network since 1999.

The Congregation of the Fathers of Mercy was founded in 1808 under the title of "The Missionaries of France." The order was founded for the purpose of evangelizing the French people after the Catholic Faith had been subjected to years of attacks and persecution during the French Revolution. After the suppression of the order by a new revolutionary regime some three decades later, many of the priests of the community came to America, and the Fathers of Mercy eventually became an American order.
