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Here we are at the week of Thanksgiving. What does this holiday mean to you? Thanksgiving is a day set aside by our country to give thanks to God for the way in which He has blessed our land. We should attend Mass together as a family and give worship and thanks to our God first of all before we do anything else that day. See the Mass schedule in this bulletin for Thanksgiving Day Masses. Then after we have given thanks to God and have enjoyed a meal with our families, we can sit back and enjoy the Thanksgiving Day football games. As a Catholic family it would be good to reflect upon how much you have to be thankful for as a family and as individuals. Count your blessings and share your thankfulness with other members of your family. We as Catholics realize just how much we are blessed each day. That's one reason why we celebrate the Eucharist, the Mass, every day. Eucharist means "thanksgiving". It is our ultimate thanksgiving prayer to God. We give thanks to the Father for giving us His Son, Jesus. We give thanks for the gift of salvation and for Jesus' dying and rising from the dead. We give thanks to Jesus for giving us His Body and Blood in Holy Communion at Mass, through which we are nurtured and strengthened in our faith. We give thanks for His constant presence with us when we are trying to live a life of faithfulness to Him. Also, we give thanks for the gift of the Holy Spirit who leads us in this life of faith. We give thanks for the gift of the Catholic Church which Jesus gave us through the Apostles. We express our thanksgiving as we give to our Lord in our weekly collections at Mass and in our special collections through the year. With this in mind, have you expressed your thankfulness to our Lord by giving to the annual Catholic Services Appeal? We do need to support our Church not only locally, but in our diocese and throughout the world as it is the Church founded by Jesus through His apostles. Let us give thanks to Him for this great and awesome gift.

Today we celebrate the great Solemnity of Christ the King. Our Gospel reading today is taken from Luke 23:35-43. It is the passage of Jesus on the cross. In this passage the soldiers and the two criminals, who were also nailed to a cross to the left and to the right of Jesus, speak of Jesus as being a King. One of the criminals says, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Jesus responds by saying, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise." The criminal recognizes that Jesus' kingdom is not of this world. Even though His kingdom is not of this world, we have the opportunity to already be living in His kingdom as is stated in our second reading today taken from St. Paul's letter to the Colossians. This letter expresses the Kingship of Jesus. Do we recognize Jesus as King of our lives? Are we living as if we are living in His Kingdom? Are we trying to be His obedient subjects? If Jesus is truly our King then we will put being obedient to Him and to His Catholic Church as the top priority in our life. We will be faithful to Him and to His teachings. We will try to serve Him to the best of our ability seeking His Will and His guidance in our lives by being in communion with Him through prayer and through faithful reception of the Sacraments. May we all strive to live in His Kingdom so that when our earthly life is completed we will be singing the words of today's Responsorial Psalm, "Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord."
