Dear friends in Christ,

Praised be Jesus Christ! Now and forever! Amen. We had a wonderful Parish Mission this past week with Fr. Bill Casey. Thank you to everyone who responded to God's call to attend the Mission. Fr. Bill reminded us of our call to holiness and what we need to do to make our families holy. He also reminded us of our responsibilities as Catholics and how we are called to live our faith at home, at work, and in public. May we all go forth and try to live our Christian values and restore in our country what has been lost. Thank you to those who prepared the meals each day and the reception: Moravian Club, KJT, CCE, and the Confraternity of Christian Mothers. Thank you to our altar servers, the choir, organist, and anyone else who helped out with the Mission. May God bless you in return.

Today's readings tell us what happens when we use the Common Sense and Wisdom God gives us and also the Gospel tells us what happens when we *do not* use these two important elements. The reading taken from the Book of Proverbs, and the Gospel, praises those people who are industrious and reliable. The reading from Proverbs puts a special emphasis on a woman who puts her energy and talents to good advantage. Their families benefit from such industriousness. Such a woman takes advantage of the available tools that keep families well clothed and fed. This reading also praises "the woman who fears the Lord." Because of her faithfulness to her family and to God, she will be rewarded for her labors, for all that she does.

Today's gospel tells us about investments. This gospel sounds like an article that might be written for the *Wall Street Journal*. It is about being industrious and about being reliable. In these readings, we find a little thread of wisdom woven throughout them. The woman in the reading from Proverbs is concerned about others more than about herself. The men in the Gospel are concerned about their master's money more than they are about their own. Two of the men are industrious stewards with their master's money. The third man is more worried about his own well-being. Being industrious and reliable do not interest him. He did not put to good use what his master gave him.

The main lesson of today is that God is in charge of our lives. God gives us Common Sense and Wisdom, along with many other talents and opportunities, which vary from person to person. We are expected to act responsibly and industriously with all we have received.

Today's readings come to us near the end of the Church year. They remind us that there is judgment awaiting all of us. The Master, God the Father, returns to ask what we have done with our lives. How are we going to respond to this question? The letter of Paul to the Thessalonians tells us that we are "all children of the light and children of the day. We are not of the night or darkness. Therefore, let us not sleep as the rest do, but stay alert and sober." St. Paul is telling us to not be lukewarm in our faith, nor to be lazy in living out our faith. He is telling us to be industrious and reliable, using the common sense and wisdom God gives us to the building of His Kingdom on earth. What return are we going to be able to show for what God has given us?

This week, we will celebrate Thanksgiving Day. What does this holiday mean to you? Thanksgiving is a day set aside by our country to give thanks to God for the way in which He has blessed us as individuals and how He has blessed our nation. We should attend Mass together as a family and give worship and thanks to our God first of all, before we do anything else that day. See the Mass schedule in this bulletin for Thanksgiving Day Masses. Then, after we have given thanks to God and have enjoyed a meal with our families, we can sit back and enjoy the Thanksgiving Day football games. As a Catholic family, it would be good to reflect upon how much you have to be thankful for as a family and as individuals. Count your blessings and share your thankfulness with other members of your family. We, as Catholics, realize just how much we are blessed each day. That's one reason why we celebrate the Eucharist, the Mass, everyday. Eucharist means "thanksgiving". It is our ultimate thanksgiving prayer to God. We give thanks to the Father for giving us His Son, Jesus. We give thanks for the gift of salvation and for Jesus' dying and rising from the dead. We give thanks to Jesus for giving us His Body and Blood in Holy Communion at Mass, through which we are nurtured and strengthened in our faith. We give thanks for His constant presence with us when we are trying to live a life of faithfulness to Him. And we give thanks for the gift of the Holy Spirit who leads us in this life of faith. We certainly have much for which to be thankful. Sometimes we get so caught up in the events of our lives, our country and the world that we fail to see God's blessings. Remain focused on the Lord and give Him thanks. Take time to see the blessings in your life.

Next Sunday is the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, and will be the last Sunday of our liturgical Church year. Be thinking about how you may truly dedicate your life, and the life of your family, to Jesus Christ the King. Is He really your King? Are you his faithful subjects?

Please continue to pray for the Souls in Purgatory during this month of November, as we remember those who have died. May they rest in peace.


In Christ, Fr. Stephen Nesrsta, farář

It's Thanksgiving week, and everywhere I look, everyone is talking about thankfulness.

You don't need me to remind you that this is a time to be thankful. I'm sure that, like me, you're hearing it everywhere.

Sometimes, when I'm doing these thankful exercises, I start out specific and work my way into general things. I might think about the food that feeds my family; the work that provides the money for the food, the store in town where I buy it; the farmers who work so hard in the fields around our house; the system that allows us to have access to so much food.

Other times, I do things the opposite way. I might see the blue sky and the lovely weather of a late fall day and, in being thankful, turn my attention to my specific patch of land, and then to my old farmhouse — which, though I love it and hate it at the same time, is a house nonetheless. Then I'll look inside the house, beyond the stuff and junk, to the people who make this old house a place where I want to be.



At the heart of my thankfulness is my faith.

I look at the person I almost was, at the path my life was taking, and I thank God for the series of interventions that led me to this point, where I live in a home filled with kids and a dog and a husband, with family just down the road.

I can't help but be thankful for the divine hand that led me to Mother Church, that saved me from the person I almost was. And when I think about my conversion to the Catholic Church, I can't help but think about Mary.

Mary has been many things to me over the last 12 years. She has been a lovely statue, a nice idea, a remote figure in a Bible story. She has been the gentle touch during a sob-fest, a shoulder to rest my head on, the hand I hold when I don't know how to pray. She has been inspiration for pursuing a dream. She has been confidence in my parenting journey. She has been comfort during storms and trials.

But most of all, for me, she has been an example and an inspiration. As my mother, she has never let me down, has never hurt me, has never pushed me away. As my comrade-in-arms, she has never failed to encourage me, never stopped me from trying to do good, never pointed anywhere but heavenward.

I can look to Jesus with some measure of love because of Mary. I can think of Him holding me close because I have experienced the love of His mother.

That's what she does, you know. She leads you to her Son. This Thanksgiving, allow Mary to point you in the direction of her Son in a new and special way.
