To serve as a Mass Minister, Catechist or CCE Volunteer, on a parish council, etc, you must be certified in the diocesan Ethics & Integrity in Ministry (EIM) course, but please don't let this stop you from volunteering, as it is an easy process that only takes 2 hours of your time every three years. EIM Policies require all clergy, religious, seminarians, employees and adult volunteers serving in any EIM compliance-required ministry to submit an EIM Application for Ministry (www.austindiocese.org/application) (one-time only) and attend an in-person EIM Workshop (www.austindiocese.org/initial-eim-training) within 60 days, and update/renew compliance at least once every three years. Online EIM Training (www.austindiocese.org/onlineeimtraining) is available for existing applicants who have previously attended a workshop and are due to update/renew their EIM compliance. Dear friends in Christ,

May the grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all. Today we welcome Fr. Jim Olnhausen. May his words of wisdom help us all to grow in faith, hope and love.

This week we will celebrate the 4th of July, Independence Day. We give thanks to God for the freedoms we enjoy that were won at the cost of thousands of lives. May we take some time to give thanks to God for our country and may we pray for our country so that all people will come to appreciate what they have. Please pray for all of our lawmakers in Congress and especially for our President. God bless America!

Today is the Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. In today's Gospel Jesus is telling the seventy-two to trust in God for all their needs and not to worry about being rejected. Jesus tells them not to carry extra sandals or purses or other provisions. However, this is not a command for us not to go through life without insurance or plans or savings or friends. It is a simple reminder that our ultimate trust must be in God and His desire to provide for us. Jesus is not telling us to be lazy, but neither is He telling us to be self-sufficient. Many of us go through life too weighed down by our own efforts to provide for our security as if there were no gracious and giving God. Jesus urged His disciples to seek contentment, not promotion. Happiness in life is not having what you want, but wanting what you have. How many marriages or careers would be saved if we could learn this? Be content with what you have instead of continually seeking something else in life. Don't be like the cow who is always looking at and wanting the green grass on the other side of the fence not realizing that the grass on its own side is actually greener than the grass on the other side. Many times we do the same and when we get to the other side we realize we are not any happier, or any more satisfied, or any more fulfilled than we were before.

Jesus knew that not every announcement of the good news would be well-received. He knew that sometimes the disciples would encounter the same kind of rejection he faced. Jesus tells His disciples to brush the dust of the towns off their feet when they are rejected. He is telling them to brush off the defeat and rejection of one house before they move on to the next. Too often we drag the accumulated residue of our rejections and defeats like over-stuffed suitcases. Jesus is telling us to lighten up and drop off the excess baggage of old failures. Do not carry those old wounds around with you. Continue doing what is right even though it is not accepted by some. Put your faith in God, not in other people. Don not be afraid to proclaim your Catholic Christian life to others by the example you give in living your life and by what you say. We must announce the same Word of God to all people, to those who accept us and to those who reject us. Accepted or rejected, it is still the Good News of Jesus. Focus upon this Good News and not upon being rejected and you will live a happier and more joyful life.

May all of you have a most blessed week and a wonderful 4th of July.

Myšlenky: Zeptejme se sami sebe: chtěli bychom být takto vysláni jako Ježíšovi učedníci? Tak, jak o tom mluví evangelium? Bez jakéhokoliv zajištění? A jen s Ježíšovým slovem? Jistěže si dovedeme celkem snadno a rychle vysvětlit, že to tak nejde. Že potřebujeme mnoho věcí pro život nebo pro službu v církvi, bez kterých se dnes neobejdeme. Farář, obcházející venkovské farnosti pěšky, bez mošny a bez opánků, tedy bos, by asi mnoho neuspěl. Ale evangelium není psáno proto, abychom z něho vyvozovali absurdní závěry. Je přece jen psáno proto, aby mu člověk rozuměl, aby ho bral vážně, aby ho přetavil do svého života. Takže se musíme ptát: o čem vlastně dnešní evangelium je? Jak máme rozumět Ježíšově výzvě: "Proste pána žně ... o dělníky"? A konečně - jak je to s posláním těch, kdo mají nést dál evangelium?

Především ti poslaní nemají na starosti všechno. Mají jít tam, kam chce Pán sám přijít. K těm, které chce oslovit. A je jim předem řečeno, že zřejmě všude neuspějí a že nejsou posláni jen do přátelského prostředí, tedy jako ovce mezi vlky. Nejsou posílání jen tam, kde budou najisto přijati. Mají počítat s neúspěchem. Jistotu však mají v tom, že jsou poslání Mesiášem. Že to není jejich poplašený nápad.

Není možné tedy obejít otázku: zda a kde má dnes Pán takovéto lid? Najde je? Kdo jsou tito dělníci? Jen kněží? To jistě ne! Mezi nevěřící, neznající evangelium, mezi ty, kam chce Pán přijít, jsou posláni především laici, křesťané, žijící ve světě, stýkající se se sousedy, příbuznými, známými, spolupracovníky. Ti, kdo byli křtem, biřmováním a dalšími Božími dary obdarováni pro dobrý křesťanský život ve světě, pro schopnost být Kristu svědky a tak mu připravovat cestu. Každý z nás, kdo je Kristův, je někam poslán, vyslán, jde tam, kam chce sám Pán přijít. A nemusí jít o nijak mimořádné úkoly, jde jen o běžné okolnosti života. Je však třeba jít tak, jak o tom čteme v evangeliu. Bez měšce, bez mošny, bez opánků. Jak tomu rozumět? Tak, jak tomu měli rozumět Ježíšovi učedníci. Ti se měli vydat na cestu bez zdržování a bez zajištění. Odkázání na to, co dostanou, s vědomím, že také nemusí uspět. Jak jsme na tom my dnes? Jistě, máme peněženku, tašky a několikeré boty. Ale chceme-li připravovat v této zemi Kristu cestu, pak jsme bezmocní, bezbranní a chudí podobně, jako Kristovi učedníci. Nemáme nic, čím bychom si zaplatili jistotu, že budeme úspěšní. Vůbec nevíme, jak dopadneme. Jsme bosí jako otroci v Izraeli - před těmi, kdo Krista neznají, možná nic neznamenáme. A toto všechno by nás nemělo odradit, naopak, to nám může dodat důvěru. Důvěru v moc a sílu Boží, která se má v nás projevit. Důvěru v bohatství Ježíše Krista, který chce k těm, kdo ho neznají, přijít. Není tedy třeba, abychom se báli a vymlouvali, že jsme neschopní, nevýznamní, chudí a nezajištění ve své službě evangeliu. Je třeba jediné: abychom byli skutečně Kristovými učedníky a bychom se iím opravdu nechali den po dni posílat. Bez strachu, že se něco stane, když neuspějeme, bez představy, že si svou úspěšnost ve svědectví evangeliu musíme zajistit. Bůh je podle našich měřítek marnotratným rozsévačem. Rozsévá všude možně a ví, že někde se semeno uchytí tak, že přinese opravdový užitek. Připojme se tedy k němu. Buďme s našimi bližními a přinášejme jim zvěst evangelia, zvěst o odpouštějící Boží lásce k člověku, zvěst o Boží budoucnosti. S klidem a mírností a s vědomím, že Ježíšovu zvěst máme přinášet, ale nesmíme ji vnucovat. Nejsme-li přijati, jděme dál. Je možné, že po čase uspěje někdo jiný. Bůh má přece více možností než my. The Fourth of July and an Approach to the Bible

In the days when states were still "the colonies" and men wore powdered wigs, a new way of thinking captured the intelligentsia of the western world. "The miracle stories in the Bible and the lives of the saints may be quaint, entertaining, and even have symbolic meaning. But certainly, we should not take them literally! Oh, God exists, for sure. But if the Creator made such a marvelous world, humming along according to the laws of nature which he designed, why would he ever step in and work against those rules? So let's not be naive."

Thomas Jefferson went so far as to take scissors and cut all the supernatural stories right out of his Bible, leaving only the moral teaching of Jesus. Others insisted on keeping their bible intact, but reading the miracle stories with a nod and a wink, just like they read Greek mythology. This movement, known as the Enlightenment, was just too sophisticated to take literally such primitive fantasy.

To tell the truth, the Enlightenment raised a very good question. Why would the creator of nature violate natural laws? Perhaps because not everything we experience in this fallen world is so "natural" after all. The first chapter of the Book of Wisdom tells us that death is really not "natural." God designed human beings to live forever. It was by the envy of the devil that death came into the world, and the spiritual death resulting from the sin of our first parents had a disastrous impact on all of creation. One of the foremost Enlightenment philosophers, Gottfried Leibniz, said that the world we live in was the best of all possible worlds. Genesis and the book of Wisdom beg to differ.

So perhaps God works miracles, and defies seemingly "natural" laws, to restore nature, to rescue his creation from the degradation and misery that sin has let loose in the world. Plus, in the case of truly natural laws, if He created nature, he is above nature. "Nature" comes from the Latin word for birth. Nature is that which has been born, which has come into existence. Our God, unlike the gods of the Greek and Roman myths, has no beginning or end. He was, He is, and He is to come. He is therefore transcendent, above nature, *super*-natural.

This is point Mark's gospel is making when it tells us about Jesus calming the storm, healing the woman with the flow of blood, and raising Jairus' daughter (Mark 5:21-43). Standing in front of Jesus, we are in the presence of Mystery. He does not plead or conjure or recite incantations. He does supernatural things not through petition but by word of command. Sophisticated skepticism is a useless response to Him. So is fear. If I want to experience the saving, life-giving power that He offers me, the only useful and appropriate response is faith. Before the tragedies and challenges of life in this imperfect world, this is what faith says: "I can't. He can, and I think I'll let Him."

Many children were ill in Palestine on that day. But Jairus believed that Jesus could do something about the sickness assaulting his daughter, and let him, despite the ridicule of his friends. Many adults physically touched Jesus on that day as he made his way through the crowd, but only one woman believed Jesus could heal her. She had the boldness to reach out and touch him with expectant faith, and healing power flowed out of him, changing her life forever.

If the Eucharist is truly the Body and Blood of this supernatural miracle worker, why we don't see more healing, miracles, and sanctification going on in the lives of communicants?

Maybe it's because many who shuffle forward in communion lines each Sunday are like the nameless people who bumped into Jesus in the square but were too busy to notice and too jaded to expect anything. Or maybe it's because we're just too "enlightened" to take such quaint Bible stories too seriously.
