



Even if you cannot be physically present in a church or adoration chapel with the Blessed Sacrament, you can unite yourself spiritually to the Eucharist as you spend this time in prayer. Thank you for praying with us as we seek to spend time with our Eucharistic Lord.

Dear friends in Christ.

Peace be with you. Today, Sunday, March 5, we are celebrating the Sacrament of Confirmation at Sts. Cyril and Methodius Church in Granger. Several of our youth and one adult are being confirmed. Let us pray for them and congratulate them on the reception of this vital Sacrament for daily living asking the Holy Spirit to be with them all the days of their life.

In today's bulletin is the schedule for the Penance Services in the parishes of our deanery. Please plan on making a good confession and receive the love and forgiveness of God in this Lenten season.

Be sure to come to the **Stations of the Cross** every week during this season of Lent and do all you can to help yourself to grow in the love and life of Jesus. Stations of the Cross are every Wednesday at 6:30 pm.

In today's gospel about the Transfiguration of Jesus we have what you might call one of those "Kodak Moments." You know, one of those moments you want to capture and never let go of. Peter, James, and John go up on the mountain with Jesus and are privileged to see Jesus Christ in all of His glory. Prior to this event the apostles were already filled with faith, they had been called, they had accepted that calling, and in the person of Peter they proclaimed Jesus to be "the Messiah." We are a people of faith. What have been moments in our lives when we experienced a transfiguration moment, when we have experienced the glorified Christ in our own life? Could it have been at our First Holy Communion, or maybe when we receive Jesus every time we go to Communion, or when we go to confession, or maybe your wedding day, or maybe when you visited a friend or when you experienced the birth of your child? One of my Transfiguration experiences was at my Ordination to the Priesthood. I was filled a great amount of joy and also with a lot of hope, hope concerning what was yet to come in my life as a priest. I believe that when Peter, James, and John were on the mountain and experienced the Transfiguration of Jesus, it also filled them with much hope, this experience filled them with enough hope so that they were able to witness the passion, crucifixion, and death of our Lord on the Cross. Despite these tragic events, the apostles had to have known that Jesus would keep His promise and return to them in three days.

We are told that HOPE is one of the three Theological Virtues. Remember those three -- Faith, Hope, and Charity! But what exactly do we mean by the virtue of Hope? The Catechism of the Catholic Church defines hope as: "the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit." It is hope which sustains us in times of despair and abandonment because our eyes are focused on something greater than that which we experience at those moments of confusion and uncertainty, our eyes are fixed on the Kingdom of Heaven. Christian hope takes as its model the hope of Abraham, who was blessed abundantly by the promises of God fulfilled in Isaac, and who was purified by the test of the sacrifice. This is the hope which Abram had in today's first reading taken from the book of Genesis. Because of hope, Abram was able to leave his land and journey on to that land God had promised him. Through this hope Abram becomes a new man which is signified by the changing of his name from Abram to Abraham. In Romans 4:18 it says that "Hoping against hope, he believed, and thus became the father of many nations." Do our transfiguration experiences, our experiences of the Risen Lord, fill us with that kind of hope, a hope which lets us be dependent on God and willing to follow and serve Him in any way that He calls us to? Or, do we often fall into despair, thinking that all is lost, that we can never be forgiven, that there is no hope, that things will only get worse in our lives? If this is the case then when we receive our Lord at Holy Communion let us ask Him to fill us with that great gift of hope, with a hope that fills us with joy and peace. Perhaps we need to pray that greatest prayer of hope which was given to us by the Lord Himself, the "Our Father." There is no greater prayer of hope. Pray it slowly every morning and every evening and concentrate on what you are saying and you will never lose hope in your life.

I pray that your life will be filled with many Transfiguration experiences, as that of Peter, James, and John, experiences of the Glorified Jesus. These experiences come every day in our lives. Ask the Lord to help you recognize them so that these experiences will always fill you with much faith, hope, and love.

May you have a most blessed second week of Lent.

Second Sunday of Lent: Clothed in Light



THE GRACE I SEEK: to believe that Jesus will transform my whole being in himself

IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, AND OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. AMEN.

Jesus, the Lord of Life, has given himself to you in the Eucharist. He is gazing upon you, his beloved child, with great love at this very moment. Pause for a few moments and wonder at his gift for you. Allow yourself to rest in his loving gaze.

Thank Jesus for the gift of himself in the Eucharist.

ASK FOR THE GRACE: Jesus, help me to trust you to envelop me daily with your light and grace.

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — Read slowly, 3-4 times. Allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you through this passage.

"The LORD said to Abram: 'Go forth from the land of your kinsfolk and from your father's house to a land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you; I will make your name great, so that you will be a blessing.'" (Genesis 12:1-2)

REFLECTION QUESTION — Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.

As you continue this journey of Lent, how has the Lord revealed his blessings to you? Recall concrete examples of the physical and spiritual blessings he has showered upon you. How do these blessings transform your heart so that you are a blessing to others?

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — Read slowly, 3-4 times. Again, allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Let the Holy Spirit speak to you through this passage.

"Jesus took Peter, James, and John his brother, and led them up a high mountain by themselves. And he was transfigured before them; his face shone like the sun and his clothes became white as light. [...] Then Peter said to Jesus in reply, 'Lord, it is good that we are here.'" (Matthew 17:1-2, 4)

REFLECTION QUESTION — Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.

The Lord leads us to a place of intimacy with himself, and in that intimacy he transforms us in his light and goodness. Gazing upon the Eucharist, ask Jesus to lead you to intimacy with his heart. Rest in that heart, and say with the disciples, "Lord, it is good that I am here."

Remain in silence with the Lord. Allow him to speak in the silence, in your heart. Receive his presence. If it helps, write down what you sense the Lord communicating to you during this time of prayer.

CLOSING PRAYER — O God, who have commanded us to listen to your beloved Son, be pleased, we pray, to nourish us inwardly by your word, that, with spiritual sight made pure, we may rejoice to behold your glory. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. (Collect, Second Sunday of Lent)

SUNDAY MASS CONNECTION — At every Mass, Jesus offers himself to the Father for us. We can always join our own offerings with Jesus at Mass. This Sunday, offer your longing to be clothed in Christ so that you become a blessing to others, just like Jesus.
