The Masses for the Solemnity of Mary will be Sunday night, December 31 at 12:00 Midnight this year and Monday, January 1 8:30 & 10:30 am. There is NO vigil Mass on Sunday afternoon.

Dear friends in Christ.

May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the unity of the Holy Spirit be with you all. Our new confessional in the back of the church is ready for use. When the green light is "on" it means the priest is in the confessional. When the red light is "on" it means that someone is going to confession at that time, so please do not enter the confessional. You may enter when red light is "off" or the door is open.

This weekend we begin the Season of Advent. The Advent Season is from Sunday, December 3, through the beginning of the Vigil Mass of Christmas on December 24. The Advent Season is a time of watching and waiting for the Birth of the Lord. It is a time of preparation. How are you going to prepare yourself during this time of Advent? **Our Advent Penance Service will be next Sunday, December 10 at 5:00 pm.** Four priests will be hearing confessions. Be sure to plan to make a good confession before you celebrate the Birth of the Lord at Christmas. Please check this bulletin for the **Penance Services** that have been scheduled at various parishes in our deanery. Try to attend with your family together to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation sometime during the Advent Season. The Christmas Season begins on the evening of December 24 and continues until Monday, January 9, when we will celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. So, after Christmas Day on December 25, please do not say that Christmas is over, because, it has actually just begun. Too many Catholics and other Christians have given into the secular celebration of Christmas, a celebration that is completely absent of the presence of Jesus Christ, whose birthday we celebrate. Celebrate Advent as a time of preparation, make a good confession and spend extra time in prayer with your family.

During the Season of Advent we usually begin decorating our homes for Christmas. I always recommend that you wait until the Third Sunday of Advent, *Gaudete Sunday*, before you turn on your Christmas lights. Also, I encourage you to leave your tree and decorations up and your Christmas lights shining until the end of the Christmas Season on January 9. Let us truly celebrate Christmas during the entire Christmas Season. I also encourage parish organizations to have their Christmas parties during the Christmas Season and not during Advent. In the USA Santa Claus has only become an advertising gimmick. Instead of Santa coming to our parties, we should live the truth of our faith and have St. Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, come to our celebrations. His feast day is Wednesday, December 6. He is the one who brought gifts to the poor and needy of his day. Our faith is filled with wonderful traditions that have been handed down to us during the past 2000 years. The more we present our faith in the spirit and truth it is meant to teach, the more people will have a conversion of heart and think about the faith they have received. Try to celebrate the feast of St. Nicholas in your home. You may want to exchange a small gift on that day or maybe put a stocking up the night before and put a gift in it for your children before morning. You could put fruit in it and maybe a gold coin. Think of various ways you can celebrate this feast day. You can find a lot of ideas on the internet also. I know that you may be getting tired of my repeating this every year, but I feel that this is something that needs to be said and needs to be thought about.

In today's Gospel Jesus says: "Be watchful! Be alert! You do not know when the time will come." Jesus is telling us that we must always be prepared for His Second Coming into the world and also for the day when we will leave this earth by our bodily death to stand before Him in judgment. As we all know, either one of these two events can happen at any second, any hour or any day. Are you ready? Are you watchful? Are you alert? Our Opening Prayer, the Collect, for this Mass says: "Grant your faithful, we pray, almighty God, the resolve to run forth to meet your Christ with righteous deeds at his coming, so that, gathered at his right hand, they may be worthy to possess the heavenly Kingdom." We all need a greater resolve to run forth to meet Jesus. We all need a greater resolve to be faithful to Him and to all His teachings. Many things in this world distract us from the Truths Jesus proclaimed. May we have the courage to accept His Truth and try to live it day-by-day. To be watchful and ready, and, to avoid the dangers of our distractions, we must pray daily, from our hearts, seeking a closer relationship with our Lord. Only then will we be ready to meet Him when he comes again.

Please pray for all the priests of the Diocese of Austin as we have an Advent Day of Prayer together this Tuesday, December 5.

May all of you have a very blessed Advent Season.

Are You Ready for Advent?

For most Americans, the days between Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day are a time to be with family, to be thankful for all we have, and to give whatever we can to those in need. There's certainly nothing wrong with that! But it's not news that Christmas has been secularized. For Christians, this season should be about so much more than what our culture offers us. Every year, I hear Christians bemoaning the secularization of Christmas—yet, the solution seems so simple. If we want Christmas to be a religious holiday for our families, the way to get beyond the red and green M&Ms and the hustle and bustle is to take the time to prepare ourselves spiritually. To make Christmas mean something, we must observe the traditional season of Advent.

The Church has such a beautiful rhythm of celebrating the various seasons of the Christian story. The four weeks before Christmas (a little after Thanksgiving until December 25th) is the season of Advent. Advent (not New Year's) is the beginning of the Christian Year and it's considered a 'little Lent.' It's quiet. It's somber. It's full of waiting and hoping. Just as there can be no real celebration of the Resurrection without the pain of Good Friday, there can be no real Christmas without the expectation of Advent.

St. Charles Borromeo writes, "Each year, as the Church recalls this mystery, she urges us to renew the memory of the great love God has shown us. This holy season teaches us that Christ's coming was not only for the benefit of his contemporaries; his power has still to be communicated to us all...The Church asks us to understand that Christ, who came once in the flesh, is prepared to come again. When we remove all obstacles to his presence he will come, at any hour and moment, to dwell spiritually in our hearts, bringing with him the riches of his grace."

Isn't that beautiful? But that kind of preparation doesn't just happen *to* us. We have a part to play. We have to offer this time to ready our hearts for Our Lord. If you really commit to observing Advent, your December is going to look very different.

For most American families, by the evening of December 25th, we have been eating, buying, Christmas music-listening, gift-giving, gift-receiving, tree-trimming, and cookie-baking for over a month. We're sick to death of it: Get the tree out by the road! Take the decorations down the day after Christmas! Turn that blasted music off!

If you observe Advent, before Christmas Day arrives you might not be tree-trimming and you might not be holiday-cheering. But, you will know every verse of "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" by heart and you'll be itching to belt out "Joy to the World!" on Christmas morning.

You'll be reflecting, reading, praying, and waiting. It will be a sacrifice. What will it look like for your family? You might decide to forego all the Christmas parties that happen during Advent. You might avoid the malls, which blare Christmas music starting in October. You might decide to keep gifts super simple, so that you're not doing any scrambling during the quiet of Advent and can, instead, focus on waiting for Jesus. The practicalities of how you decide to observe Advent will vary from family to family. But if you do set aside this time as a holy preparation, it's a surefire thing that in comparison to the bustle around you, your family will look quite odd.

Before you label me as the modern Ebenezer Scrooge, let me tell you a secret: We don't delay the merry-making because we hate the Christmas season: we observe Advent because we *love* Christmas.

If we observe the quiet Advent Season of expectation, then on Christmas Day, it will feel like CHRISTMAS! And it lasts for *twelve* days. It's a Christmas-lover's dream come true! We've been waiting and waiting and waiting. We've been lighting candles and watching the wax melt a little lower each night. We've been setting up a Jesse Tree and remembering God's story of Redemption for the world and how the Incarnation is the point on which it all spins. The tree-trimming, the carol-singing, the feasting, the celebrating — there are twelve whole days of it! We wait and wait through the long days of Advent like a pregnant woman in her last month. Then, when we celebrate the joyous Birth of Our Lord, it's time to kick up our heels! And we do. We really do.

As you contemplate what Advent will look like in your home, consider this inspiration from St. Charles Borromeo: "Beloved, now is the acceptable time spoken of by the Spirit, the day of salvation, peace and reconciliation: the great season of Advent. This is the time eagerly awaited by the patriarchs and prophets, the time that holy Simeon rejoiced at last to see. This is the season that the Church has always celebrated with special solemnity. We too should always observe it with faith and love, offering praise and thanksgiving to the Father for the mercy and love he has shown us in this mystery."

Make your Advent season one of focus: Ignore the rushing and the bustling. Prayerfully prepare yourself for Jesus' coming. Christmas Day is approaching. Have you made room in your heart for the Christ Child?
