Dear friends in Christ.

Today we celebrate the Second Sunday of Lent. What have you done to make this Lent more meaningful to you? Did you attend Stations of the Cross this week? It is important that we reflect upon the suffering of Jesus if we are to really enter into this Lenten Season. The Season of Lent is meant to help us to prepare ourselves for the celebration of the Paschal Triduum: Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Resurrection of the Lord, 72 hours from Holy Thursday evening until the evening of Easter Sunday, equaling the time of three days. So many people tell me that they do not experience God's love in their life or the life of their family. When I ask them if they attend Mass every week, pray every day, read the Bible daily, pray the rosary daily, attend special devotions such as the Stations of the Cross, First Friday and First Saturday devotions, they say "no". Well, it does not surprise me then if you are not experiencing Jesus in your life. You are not giving Him the opportunity to be present in your life. We need to do our part in our relationship with Jesus. It is like a marriage relationship, both must give 100% of themselves to the relationship if it is going to be meaningful and if it is going to be what it is meant to be.

In last Sunday's gospel we heard how Jesus spent forty days in the desert and also how the devil tempted Him and how Jesus resisted those temptations. Jesus spent this time in the desert in order to prepare Himself for His mission in life. In today's gospel Jesus takes Peter, James, and John on the mountain with Him in order to help prepare them for Jesus' upcoming passion, death, and resurrection. Jesus wanted them to see His transfigured body, that is, His glorified body, and also he wanted them to see Moses and Elijah so that Peter, James, and John would be strengthened in faith and know that he is truly sent by God. I believe that for Peter, James, and John this moment in their life is what we would call a Kodak moment. I am sure that all of us have had times and experiences in our life that we wish would never end, like your wedding day, or maybe a birthday party, a trip to a special place, the baptism of your son or daughter, or maybe just spending an evening or day with your friends, and you wanted to capture this experience on your camera or video recorder so that you could enjoy that experience again later on in life. This is what Peter tried to do in today's gospel. He wanted to build three booths because he wanted the experience to last forever. The booth or tent was seen as a special place where God dwelt and Peter wanted to capture this moment so that it would not end or go away. However, God reminds Peter that this is a heavenly experience and that he is still on earth and therefore it must come to an end. This experience is meant to encourage the apostles to continue their journey with Jesus through His death and on to His resurrection. This encounter will also fill them with hope as they experience a small portion of the Father's love for the Son. It helps these three apostles to realize that life on earth is not the end or the goal for which they strive, but that their ultimate goal is to live a glorified life in heaven.

In the First Reading we heard how God made a covenant with Abram. Abram was Abraham's name before God changed it to Abraham. Here God promises Abram many descendants and a new land in which he will live. With the making of this covenant Abram begins his journey to a land flowing with milk and honey, a land where Abram's people will grow and prosper.

In the Second Reading St. Paul reminds us that our life here on earth is only temporary and that "we have our citizenship in heaven." In heaven we will be given new bodies, bodies that are glorified as the body of Christ; bodies which will not experience any pain or suffering. We are reminded that our goal is to live with God in heaven.

All of today's readings remind us that we are all on a journey, a journey which began in our mother's womb and will end, not with our death, but with our resurrection in heaven when we will be united with our glorified bodies of which St. Paul speaks, which is similar to the glorified body of Jesus Christ after his resurrection from the dead. This season of Lent helps us to reflect upon our journey in life. These forty days of Lent remind us of the forty years which the Israelites spent in the desert before entering the Promised Land in Canaan. They spent forty years preparing themselves for their new home. These forty days of Lent remind us of the forty days in which Jesus spent in the desert while being tempted by the devil. These forty days remind us of our own need to prepare ourselves for our new home in heaven. During this season of Lent, let us look at our lives to see what we can do to make these times of preparation and change easier both for ourselves and for our families. Let us keep our eyes focused on the resurrected Christ to be strengthened in faith and hope as we strive to reach our final goal which is eternal life with God -- a life of eternal glory, eternal happiness, eternal joy, eternal peace, eternal good health, which we find in the eternal love of God.

Beginning soon, we will have a Williamson County Sheriff's Deputy in our parking lot every Sunday from 7:30 am to 12:30 pm. They will be monitoring the driveways and traffic in front of our church and they will also be monitoring our parking lot. This is being done for everyone's safety as we have more traffic on FM 1105 in front of the church and more activity in our parking lot as well. If you have any questions, feel free to speak to me.

May all of you have a blessed week and be sure to attend Stations of the Cross on Wednesday evening.

Lent – A Time for Spiritual Spring Cleaning

Well, it's Lent again. Every year it's the same thing. Christmas is over and I'm constantly thinking about how far away Lent is. I always think to myself how the season of Lent is so spiritually benefiting to me. How wonderful it is. How valuable it is. And I'm always glad...it's weeks away. I think it's often hard to transition from the spirit of Christmas, to a spirit of penance. But the reality is, that if you do practice Lent, in the spirit it is intended to be practiced, it's certainly not easy. But of course, I don't think it's supposed to be.

The What and Why of Lent

Lent is a time to meditate on the Passion of Our Lord – to think about how much He has given for us – everything. It is a time for us to look into ourselves and think what we can offer back to Him. Especially the attempt to overcome things inside us that are not very nice – a time to put into practice a new virtue. Through Lent, we reflect on the life of Jesus, and through Him, we take a deeper look into our own lives. It's a time to make an honest assessment of where we are on our path (and some times struggle) for holiness. Throughout my 10 years of being Catholic, I have given up various things for Lent, including coffee, alcohol, movies, news, Facebook, restaurants, time out with friends, and certain foods. I have also given up other things that often seem to come easy to me. Like discussing others behind their backs, complaining, being 'worst case scenario', defensive...and more things like this. And each year I'll add things as well. Like spiritual reading, being nice to people that I don't want to be nice to, smiling more, being more patient, listening more, being more charitable...i.e. things that do not come natural to me. And after years of giving up things and adding certain penances during Lent, my understanding of the sacrifice that Jesus made for us has grown deeper and deeper, resulting in a deeper gratitude to Our Lord and greater changes within me. When you think about it, Lent is kind of like a Spring cleaning, but for the soul.

This year, I have added another thing too. Saying a prayer called "The Litany of Humility" each day...preferably at the start of my day. I am hoping that any pride I have about myself and my own abilities I can keep in check during this season of Lent, and beyond. I am including the prayer, hoping that it may help you too. God bless us this Lent, and every Lent. May we all live for God and our neighbors more, and for ourselves less.

Litany of Humility –

O Jesus, meek and humble of heart, *Hear me*.

From the desire of being esteemed, Deliver me, O Jesus.

From the desire of being loved, *Deliver me, O Jesus*.

From the desire of being extolled, Deliver me, O Jesus.

From the desire of being honored, *Deliver me, O Jesus*.

From the desire of being praised, Deliver me, O Jesus.

From the desire of being preferred to others, Deliver me, O Jesus.

From the desire of being consulted, *Deliver me*, *O Jesus*.

From the desire of being approved, *Deliver me*, *O Jesus*.

From the fear of being humiliated, *Deliver me*, *O Jesus*.

From the fear of being despised, Deliver me, O Jesus.

From the fear of suffering rebukes, Deliver me, O Jesus.

From the fear of being calumniated, *Deliver me*, *O Jesus*.

From the fear of being forgotten, Deliver me, O Jesus.

From the fear of being ridiculed, *Deliver me, O Jesus*.

From the fear of being wronged, *Deliver me, O Jesus*.

From the fear of being suspected, Deliver me, O Jesus.

That others may be loved more than I, Jesus, grant me the grace to desire it.

That others may be esteemed more than I, Jesus, grant me the grace to desire it.

That, in the opinion of the world, others may increase and I may decrease, Jesus, grant me the grace to desire it.
