Apparently the man only thought of himself, he did not think about those who were in need and who could have used the grain for food. This man lacked compassion and concern for other people. In today's first reading, it says, "Vanity of vanities, say Qoheleth, vanity of vanities! All things are vanity!" Qoheleth is telling us that the things of this world are useless in comparison with the things of God. We work and toil for things and then they are quickly gone, or we leave them at our death to other people who waist them or throw them away. Qoheleth says to enjoy them now. Do not store them up for the future, because the future dreams you have may never come. Use them for the benefit of yourself and for the benefit of others. Only then do these things have value. I often see so many people who save money and things all their life and then they die before they can enjoy what they have saved. Or, they save it for their children or grandchildren to have, who fight over what is left, or they waist it away on useless things. Do good with what you have. Be thankful for it and, if there is something left over when you die, make plans that it will be used in a way that it will not be wasted by others. There are many charitable organizations, including your parish, who could use it for the good of many people. Use wisely what God has given you. Enjoy it while you are still able to do so, but keep others in mind as well.
