

RCIA Classes to Begin - Tuesday, September 13 - RCIA is the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults -- a process for welcoming new members into the Roman Catholic Church. It is a community journey that leads to a transformation of mind and spirit. The RCIA is mainly for non-Catholics who want to become Catholic, but adult Catholics who have not received all of the Sacraments (Communion, Confession, Confirmation) may also come into full communion with the Church through the RCIA process. #### Dear friends in Christ.

Praised be Jesus Christ! Here we are in the month of August. People are wrapping up their vacations, children are getting ready to return to school. Let us pray for all parents, children, and teachers. May they all respond to God's calling to be faithful witnesses of His love to one another.

We have an important Holy Day coming up soon. Monday, August 15, is the Holy Day of the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Mass will be held at 12:00 noon and at 7:00 pm. Please plan to attend Mass as we celebrate Mary's entrance into Heaven.

In today's second reading, we hear about the faith of the ancients. Chapter 11 of Hebrews speaks about the faith of Abel, Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, and many more. Hebrews says that "Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen". Even though none of those mentioned here ever saw the promised Messiah, they had hope that eventually God's promise to His people would be fulfilled. Their faith was based on what they had personally experienced of God's presence in their lives. They knew that what they hoped for and what they could not see would one day become a reality. They allowed themselves to be led by God even though they did not know where He was taking them, as we heard about Abraham in this reading today. They were always prepared for the realization of the Kingdom of God.

This is what Jesus asks of us in today's Gospel as He says, "You also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come". We live our lives in faith with the hope that is certain of the realization of the Second Coming of Jesus into the world and of our ultimate resurrection with Him. In faith, we believe that Jesus comes to us every day in the Eucharist that we receive in Holy Communion. In faith, we believe He walks with us in our daily lives. And, in faith, we believe that He will come again. In the same way He ascended into Heaven, He will descend once again upon the earth. Are you prepared for this? Do you live your life each day with this hope? Let us pray, every day, for an increase in faith so that we will be prepared to meet our Lord when He comes again and when we receive Him in Holy Communion.

**Seeing Brokenness** ... Confronted with the immensity of the world's suffering, and our powerlessness to protect one another from sorrow and death, many times we simply turn our faces. One of the great weaknesses of our culture is our readiness to deny the reality of human suffering, except for those times when it touches our own lives in a way we can't avoid.

There is a pervasive tendency to escape by numbing ourselves with TV or alcohol. We quickly turn to buying things, to being extremely busy, or to mouthing religious clichés, all rather than to see. But do this at peril to our souls. Though we might be tempted to turn our heads away, unless we are willing to see the great suffering of the world, there is something of the beauty of God's face that we will never see.

Shortly before I was ordained a priest, my classmates and I were challenged by our retreat master to spend time with those who wear their brokenness on the outside: persons with disabilities, the hungry, the grieving, the imprisoned and all those who are so often quickly dismissed. He told us that – in doing so – we would see the truth of our own brokenness and our deep solidarity with all those who suffer. He also told us that there we would meet the God who comes in powerlessness. He told us that, if we did not meet God there, we might never meet God. I think he was right.

No One Cries the Wrong Way

Merciful God, open my eyes to see my sisters and brothers who suffer. Open my eyes to see what you see. Amen.
