Dear friends in Christ.

This week, we begin the month of November. There is much to prepare for as we enter into this festive time of year.

Congratulations to Pete Zenner, John A. Valenta, and Gina Vrabel, who were selected, and have accepted, to be on the Pastoral Council. Thank you to Helen Havelka, Jerry David and Bill Montreuil for their past three years of service. May God's blessings be upon them all for being willing servants of the Lord.

We had a wonderful Parish Mission this past week with Fr. Ricardo Pineda. Thank you to everyone who responded to God's call to attend the Mission. Now let us all go forth and live what we have learned. Thank you to those who prepared the meals each day and the reception: Moravian Club, KJT, CCE and the Confraternity of Christian Mothers. Thank you to our altar servers, the choir, organist, and anyone else who helped out with the Mission. May God bless you in return.

Tuesday, November 1, is the Feast of All Saints, a Holy Day of Obligation. See this bulletin for the Mass schedule and attend Mass with your family. Wednesday, November 2, is All Souls Day and we will have several Masses so that you can come and pray for your loved ones who have died. During the month of November, we pray for the souls in Purgatory. We pray for all those who have died and are on their way to Heaven. We pray that they may quickly pass through the purifying process in Purgatory and soon join the saints in Heaven. We do this because of what we read in Sacred Scripture in passages that pertain to the Church's teaching on Purgatory: Praying for and making an offering for the dead - 2 Maccabees 12:43-46; the need to make up for transgressions - Mt 5:25-26, Lk 12:58-59; nothing profane can enter heaven – Rev. 21:27; cleansing fire – 1 Cor 3:12-15; David, though forgiven, still punished for his sin – 2 Sam12:13-14. Jesus paid the price for our sins in general, but we still must make up for the individual sins that we do. Let us pray that we can truly be one of those Holy Ones of God.

Also during this month, we remember those who have served our country as we celebrate Veteran's Day on November 11. We will also celebrate Thanksgiving Day on November 24. We have much for which we are to be thankful. Maybe, during this month, we can count all of our blessings and give thanks to God for them – every day.

In today's Gospel, we heard a story about Zacchaeus and how he had a restless heart. Last week, we heard a parable about the tax collector who went into the Synagogue to pray and how he asked for God's mercy. Today, we heard about the "chief tax collector", a person who was hated more than the regular tax collectors because he got most of the money that the other tax collectors had cheated from the people. Yet this little man was willing to make a fool of himself just so he could see Jesus. That's how restless his heart was, and it would not rest until he became a follower of Jesus Christ. Notice that it was Jesus who reached out to Zacchaeus first and told him that He was going to stay at Zacchaeus' house. Zacchaeus accepted this offer of Jesus because he knew that there was something missing in his life, that his heart was not complete, even though he had plenty of money. Just by hearing the words that Jesus spoke to him, Zacchaeus acknowledges the wrong he has done and seeks our Lord's forgiveness. Zacchaeus repents of his sins by giving half of his belongings to the poor and by paying back four-fold to anyone he has defrauded. Jesus accepts his offer and recognizes Zacchaeus as a true son of Abraham, his father and our father in faith. However, the Pharisees and the other people grumble and complain that Jesus is eating with a sinner. Notice how it was always the sinners who recognized and accepted Jesus' offer to be His follower. Those who should have noticed Jesus for who He was could not. In a sense, the lost were being found and the so-called found were being lost. St. Augustine said, "Our hearts were made for Thee, O Lord, and they are restless until they rest in Thee." Is your heart restless as the heart of Zacchaeus or St. Augustine was? Jesus is saying to each of us, "I mean to stay at your house today." Are we willing to recognize ourselves as sinners and open our hearts to Jesus as Zacchaeus did in today's gospel? If we are, then Jesus will say to each of us: "Today salvation has come to this hous
