

December 17/18 - Fourth Sunday of Advent: The mystery of the Incarnation occurred through Mary and yet, through the Holy Spirit given to us in Baptism and Confirmation, we, too, are called to embody the presence of God. Dear friends in Christ,

Today is the 4th Sunday of Advent. Christmas is just around the corner. Christmas begins the evening of December 24 and continues until Sunday, January 9. Keep your Christmas lights shining brightly all throughout the Christmas Season. Let us celebrate this season in its fullness. During the Christmas Season, there are several important Feast Days. During the Octave of Christmas, we have The Nativity of the Lord on December 25, St. Stephen on December 26, St. John on December 27, The Holy Innocents on December 28, The Holy Family on December 30, St. Sylvester on December 31, and Mary, the Holy Mother of God on January 1. In the remainder of the Christmas Season, we have The Epiphany of the Lord on January 8 and The Baptism of the Lord on January 9. Try to attend as many of these Masses as possible. The Lord has given us so much, and so many ways, in which we can truly experience His love and presence in our life and in the life of our family. Let us accept all He gives us and be united with Him and with one another.

Have you received the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession) this Advent? You may still do so at St. William in Round Rock this Monday and Wednesday. I will also be hearing confessions here this Thursday from 3:15 pm - 4:30 pm and 7:30 pm - 8:30 pm. Prepare yourself to celebrate the upcoming Christmas Season in its fullness by receiving the love and forgiveness of God in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Recently, we had to replace the Sound System in the gym in the PAC. The total cost was about \$4,800.00. We are also having to replace the Sound System in the church. The estimated cost is a little over \$12,000.00. Sound Systems do not last forever. Humidity and other factors can have a harmful effect on the entire system, including the speakers. We are accepting donations to cover the cost. If anyone has anything left over after your Christmas shopping, please consider a donation for these expenses.

In these readings for today, there are four points which I will briefly elaborate upon. First, the readings all point to the fact that Jesus is the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecy. In the first reading, we hear how the prophet Isaiah says, "Therefore the Lord himself will give you this sign: the virgin shall be with child and bear a son and shall name him Immanuel." Isaiah predicts this event to happen in the future and the fulfillment of this prophecy confirms the truths which Isaiah has spoken. Matthew, in his gospel, recalls these words spoken by Isaiah to remind us of this prophecy and that it was fulfilled in the conception and birth of Jesus, by a virgin named Mary. This is important because it stresses the fact that it was by divine initiative, by the Holy Spirit, that Mary conceives Jesus, and not by her relationship with a man. This point emphasizes the divinity of Jesus and the presence of God in all that had taken place. "Immanuel, God is with us."

Second...the readings emphasize the fact that Jesus fulfills prophecy by being a descendent of David. Joseph was a descendent of David and Joseph passes on this line of royalty to Jesus by being Jesus' foster father. Therefore, Jesus inherits the physical ancestral blood of David even though Joseph was not the biological father. This makes Jesus not only the physical descendent of David, but his spiritual descendent as well. "Immanuel, God is with us."

Third...the readings want to stress the miraculous conception of Jesus. Many of the important figures of the Old Testament, such as Samson, Isaac, and John the Baptizer in the New Testament, were conceived in some miraculous way, which was meant to show the people that the child was chosen by God. "It is by the Holy Spirit that she [Mary] has conceived this child," by the Spirit of God. So Jesus, the Son of God, was chosen for a specific mission, and that was to be our Savior. "Immanuel, God is with us."

Fourth...the readings also emphasize the importance of being a faithful servant of God. Each person, whether it be Isaiah, St. Paul, Joseph, or Mary, are examples of good and faithful servants of the Lord. They were willing to remain faithful to God, no matter what other people said about them. You can imagine all the gossip which was spread throughout the town where Mary and Joseph lived and also that which was probably said about them at the local synagogue by the Pharisees and Sadducees. You can be sure that Mary was accused of having an affair with someone and that she and Joseph had to endure many unwarranted accusations. There were people back in those days that were just as evil and slanderous as many people of today. However, Joseph and Mary, having full trust and confidence in God, were willing to endure all that was needed so that God's plans could be fulfilled. They were, and continue to be, faithful servants of God... dedicated to giving witness to the presence of God in the world. "Immanuel, God is with us."

All of us, by virtue of our baptism, are called to be servants of God. As servants, we are to give our whole self to God, not expecting anything in return except eternal life with Him. In last weekend's gospel, we heard Jesus explain how John the Baptizer was given the special mission of preparing the way for Jesus. We, too, are given a special mission and that is to prepare the way for the second coming of Jesus. When we strive to be good and faithful servants of God, then we accomplish that mission in our own unique way. All of us, being servants of God, are given a task, as St. Paul says many times, to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ. We can do this only if we have a close relationship with God. With a close relationship with God, we accomplish our mission in life and are prepared for the coming of Christ. "Immanuel, God is with us."

By our active participation at Mass and through our own prayer life, we come to appreciate the true meaning of Christmas and the love God has for us, which He so perfectly expressed by sending us His Son, Jesus Christ. "Immanuel, God is with us."

What is Christmas all about?

The story is told of a mother who was very busy getting ready for Christmas. The mad rush of the season was on. One day, hurrying from store to store, 'breaking tackles' with last-minute shoppers, she lost her little boy. Frantically retracing her steps, she found him two blocks back with his pug nose flatly pressed against a frosted plateglass window. When he saw his mother, he exclaimed, "Look mom, it's Jesus! See the Baby Jesus on the hay!" The mother jerked him away saying, "We don't have time for that!"

What a shame! That sword of sorrow that pierced the heart of Jesus must symbolize, to some extent at least, the people who spend inordinate hours gift-hunting, decorating lavishly, planning and attending Christmas parties, mailing large numbers of Christmas cards, or even baking or cooking too much. All of this activity, however, can distract us from the real meaning of Christmas. People can become so preoccupied with preparations that they lose sight of the Star of Bethlehem.

Really, what is Christmas all about? It is God breaking into human history in a decisive and unique way. It is the Father offering His Son as the light of our life. It is God puncturing history; the eternal all-mighty God entering time and the human condition!

The Scripture readings in the Christmas Masses indicate that the Son of God came as the light to remove the darkness, to reconcile the lost and the least, the forgotten and the forlorn, the high and the mighty.

At Bethlehem, God brought joy to the sad, hope to the despairing, courage to the fearful, peace to the disturbed, love to inspire all the living. This is what Christmas really is!

What about us? Bethlehem seems so far away. Geographically it is not so far, maybe a long day's flight. Spiritually, however, we might be far away. How far are we from repentance and faith, decision and dedication? How far are we from trading fear for faith, hatred for love, uselessness for purpose and physical death for eternal life?

The other day I was going through some papers and I came across this Christmas prayer by Robert Louis Stevenson. It would seem to be a good way to end my Christmas message.

Loving Father, help us to remember the birth of Jesus - that we may share in the song of the angels, the gladness of the shepherds and the worship of the Wise Men. Close the door of hate and open the door of love all over the world. Deliver us from evil by the blessing which Christ brings and teach us to be merry with clear hearts. May the Christmas morning make us happy to be with our loved ones and the Christmas evening bring us to our beds with grateful thoughts, forgiving and forgiven, for Jesus' sake. Amen.
