Dear friends in Christ.

We have now returned to the season of Ordinary Time in which we focus upon the not so ordinary life and ministry of Jesus. In today's Gospel John the Baptist identifies Jesus as the Lamb of God to his disciples who in turn went to see and listen to Jesus. These disciples responded to Jesus' invitation to come and see. Today's Gospel does not tell us specifically what they saw or what Jesus told them, but we know that they did eat with Jesus and listened to what He had to say. The Gospel does show us that they came to understand they had found the Messiah. The actions of these disciples, and Simon Peter also, give the impression that they were awaiting God's call. The Psalmist today best describes their attitude: "I have waited, waited for the Lord..." Once they heard God's call, their response was immediate. They wasted no time pursuing John's tip about the Lamb of God, and in responding to the invitation from Jesus to come and see.

We see the same response from Samuel in today's first reading, except Samuel seems a little more confused. Samuel was waiting in the temple, keeping a time of vigil, so he even had to sleep in the temple. Samuel was "waiting, waiting for the Lord." After Samuel finally figures things out he responds: "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." We can learn from young Samuel that we, too, need to listen to God. We also, need to be patient and listen to God speaking to us in many different ways and then respond by saying: "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening." Then when we have done this, we can follow our Lord and serve Him in whatever vocation He is calling us to in life or has already called us to and which we are currently living.

In today's second reading St. Paul tells us that by God's grace we became members of Christ when we responded with our free will to Christ's invitation to "come and see." Since we are members of Christ, are we listening to Him as His disciples did, and as Samuel did to God? If we listen to Jesus we will recognize Him as the Messiah and follow Him and serve Him. Samuel and the disciples responded with enthusiasm to their calling. I pray that all of us will respond with the same enthusiasm and live out our vocation in life whether it be marriage, priesthood, religious life, or single life, in true service to our Lord.

Holy Trinity Faith Formation

Envision this: When born into a Catholic, faith-filled family, a child's religious education begins at birth with the parents and continues throughout life with many different stages and settings as they grow. Parents bring their children into the Church through the Sacrament of Baptism and faithfully take their children to Mass every weekend and holy day – and, even though infants and toddlers don't yet understand the meaning of Mass or what all is going on, they do learn how to act in church and how to, hopefully, be quiet and sit still for that hour each week. As children begin to attend school, they also begin attending children's religious classes at their parish and receive, at the appropriate ages, the rest of their sacraments of initiation, with faithful class attendance, of course.

Once a child graduates high school, they begin their own lives as young adults and, even though they may no longer be under the full-time guidance of their parents, continue to attend Mass every weekend and holy day, and maybe even extra Masses during the week as time permits. They lead a life of chastity and then, one day, meet the Catholic man or woman of their dreams and marries him/her in the Catholic Church, in the presence of God, family and friends! They attend Mass faithfully as a couple, have children of their own and begin the process of what their parents did so many years before and the beginning of this story is re-played in their own family, knowing all the while that God is with them for every trial and tribulation ... good times and bad. (Or ... maybe they take another road that leads them to heed God's call in becoming a priest or religious brother or sister, in full service to the Lord and His Church!)

Once their children grow up and have families of their own, they go one step further and take an active role with their grandchildren in upholding and teaching them their faith as well. They live their lives happily until the Lord then calls them to His heavenly kingdom to share eternal life with Him. Their children offer a Mass of Burial for them in their beloved home parish and they are laid to rest with all the graces and glories of a Catholic funeral.

How perfect and wonderful does that all sound?!? Awesome, right?!? But, as troubling as this might be to say, this story is, and always has been, somewhat of a folklore or fairy tale – but most especially in today's world. Some of us come close to living and doing as we should – and try very hard to make life happen this way – but nobody and no life is perfect ... and no one knows all of the answers ... and that's why we have <u>Faith Formation in the Catholic Church</u>.

Obviously, we have the priest in our parish, who is here to shepherd us, offer for us, and teach us in, the Mass, anoint us with the sacraments, and help us through rough patches with counsel and reconciliation. But, he is only one man, and sometimes needs help in doing what needs to be done to keep us all on the right path. Therefore, the Church has a **Faith Formation Program** – where lay people, who, with the guidance of the pastor, diocesan training, etc, help to offer faith formation to those in need.

We know that not everyone is born into a Catholic, or even Christian, home and needs guidance and education to persevere in their faith search and conversion ... parents can't teach their children all they need to know about the Catholic faith ... youth need special guidance as they reach adulthood in order to make the best decisions for the future ... and adults don't, and will never, know everything about their faith and, therefore, must strive to continue their education as well ... and so, again, that's where Faith Formation comes in to play in the Church.

There are many different aspects to our Faith Formation Program, all of which offer ways to introduce, build and improve our knowledge, faith and Love of our Lord: children have 9-12 years of 'CCE' classes; adults who are not Catholic and would like to become so, or who need to continue their faith journey as Catholic adults in the sacraments, have RCIA classes; men and women continue to grow spiritually through bible study or prayer groups; high school kids grow into faith-filled young adults through youth programs. As we all know, knowledge is strength – the more you know, the better you handle whatever comes your way – and when it comes to our faith, this couldn't be more true!

But, in order to offer these wonderful resources to everyone here at Holy Trinity, we need your help! We need <u>people</u> to serve as teachers, helpers, event coordinators and volunteers, etc. God calls every one of us to minister to His people and those in need, and being a part of our Program is a wonderful, fulfilling way to do so. We need <u>financial support</u> to provide the materials and resources used in all of these areas and, therefore, we will now have a second collection on each 4th Sunday of the month for our "Religious Education Program" (light blue envelope in your collection envelope boxes). And, we need <u>your prayers</u> for the success of each area of our Program, for those to respond to the call to help with and/or minister to those attending the classes, and for the willingness of individuals to attend, enjoy and grow from the classes and groups offered.

We want to thank and welcome Lucille D'Elia as our new Director of Faith Formation. She has been our director for the CCE Program for five years, but is excited to take on this new role to encompass all of our faith formation, which will include: CCE, RCIA, Adult Faith Formation, Sacraments of Initiation Preparation for Children (including baptisms), Youth Program, Marriage Annulments and Parish & Social Ministries.
