

Dear friends in Christ,

May the peace and love of our Lord Jesus Christ be with each of you.

Some of you can remember the beginning of television. Almost nobody had one. It was a luxury. Today a television is regarded as a necessity. Almost everybody has at least one. The same is true with cars and pickup trucks. In a few years they moved from being a luxury to being a necessity. Isn't it strange how today's luxuries become tomorrow's necessities? Telephones have become a necessity. What about personal computers and cell phones? Luxury or necessity? Sometimes it is very difficult to tell one from the other.

Some of our so-called necessities are things that we did not have just a few years ago. For most of our lives, we got by without them. Most of the world's population is getting by without them right now. But to us, they are necessities, things we must have. In actuality, we do not have to have most of these things, these are things that we simply want. They make life more pleasant, more convenient, and maybe more productive. But if we had to, we could function quite well without them. When you get right down to it, the things we need are few in number and simple in quality.

The Gospel reading for today makes this quite clear. Jesus sent his disciples on their first mission, telling them what to do and what to take with them. The list was short: a walking stick, a pair of sandals, one tunic and one friend. They were not to take food, or a traveling bag, or money or a change of clothes. The instructions Jesus gave to His disciples might seem a little strange, but Jesus knew that they would be taken care of. They were to take the necessities, not the luxuries. I wish Jesus would have told me what to take and what not to take when I went on vacation. I am sure my load would have been a lot lighter. However, the list in today's Gospel is not meant to be a list for you and I to follow when we go on vacation. We do need to take money and/or a credit card. But it does give us some insights in what we really need.

The first insight in today's Gospel is that our material necessities are few. Most of us do not really need half of the things that we have. However, we become convinced by advertisers that we really need the products which they are selling. As a result, we end up with a lot of things we do not need. It is nice to have these things, but we do not need them.

I have a TV in the Rectory. It is nice to have but I could live without it. I have a remote control which I use to change channels and to adjust the volume on the TV without getting out of my chair. At one time in my life I had to get out of the chair to change channels and adjust the volume. If I had to I could live without it and do all this manually again. And the same is true with many other material possessions. They are nice to have, but not really a necessity of life.

What we really need in life is to do something that is worth doing. Jesus sent his disciples out on a mission in today's Gospel. He sent them out to help people. They had something to do besides just making a living for themselves. The same is true for you and I. All of us have to make a living, but we are also sent on a mission to help others just as the disciples were. By virtue of our baptism we are disciples of Jesus. We can help others in many different ways. Maybe you could help a child to learn to read. Serving Christ does not require a college degree, unless you are going to be a priest, then you must have a Masters. All we need is an awareness of people and a willingness to help them. Then we will always have something to do that is worth doing.

One other thing Jesus did was to send someone with them so that they would not be alone and so that they could encourage one another when they got discouraged. We all need someone to lift us up from time to time. The thing is that we should not look for someone to be our friend, but instead, we need to look for someone whose friend we can be.

A man was on one of the mean streets of a big city in a shiny new car. A little boy saw this car and asked, "Mister, where did you get that car?" The man said, "My brother gave it to me." And the little boy replied, "Wow, I wish I could be a brother like that." Of course, the man thought the boy was going to say, "I wish I had a brother like that." But the boy got it right. His wish was to become a brother who was generous and helpful to others.

What do we really need in life? We need to become a friend to another person, to be of help to someone else. In doing so, we will be Christ to others.
