

## Dear friends in Christ,

May the peace and love of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all. This weekend is Labor Day weekend. Labor Day should be a day that we give thanks to God for the work He has given us to do. Are you doing the work that God has planned for you, or are you only doing your own work? We must remember that all the work we have been given to do is a gift from God and should be done in a way that gives Him greater glory and honor. We need to do it for God and not just for our own benefit and satisfaction. If we approach our work with this mindset, then it will have a whole new meaning and purpose in our life. Are you doing the work that God has for you? Always be open to how God is calling you to do His work in the world. This may lead to a change of employment for you and be a test of faith, calling you to depend upon God to lead you into a new adventure in life. May your faith sustain you to do the work that God has for you.

There is a phase in life that parents prefer to know little about. Children grow up and many of them move off to college or too soon move out of the house. Parents may not be too sure they want to know what their child is doing at this time in life. Some parents remember their own college days, which may have been one which was wild, possibly drunken and maybe even hedonistic. "Surely our kids are not doing what we did!" they may say to one another. Usually, when children move off, they start casting off the rules and regulations which they had to live under at home. They are going to experiment with life. While they are testing life and its limits, we pray hard that our children remember something of what we tried to teach them while they were still at home. Also, when children move off to college, they are exposed to ideas and insights never before encountered. Often this leads to the "cynical years," ones in which we pray we do not kill the kids on their visits home from school. What really disturbs parents is not that they question, but that they reject. They challenge our lifelong beliefs and value systems. They test us, but not as immature teenagers. They test us with minds that are growing in knowledge. They reach a point at which it is very difficult to argue with them and they can even shake our own beliefs. What gets questioned most is our faith, our religious beliefs and values born from them. This can really hurt and scare any parent. The typical college student begins to talk of religion and the rules of the Church as being only man-made and oppressive.

From one point of view, religion and the teachings of the Church are oppressive. But the letter of James wants us to see our religious law not as something that merely prevents us from doing bad things, but as something that compels us to do good. He tells us that if all we do is listen to the Word of God and the beliefs that come from it, then we are deceiving ourselves. James says we must also act on the Word of God and on our beliefs. What our college students often see in religion is what Jesus saw in the Pharisees. We must remember that, despite the constant bashing, the Pharisees were good people. Jesus never questioned this. They were believers in God who wanted society molded in God's law. In their efforts, however, they succeeded only in creating burdens that were too hard for men to carry. They stepped away from teaching the law of God to trying to enforce rituals made by man.

Jesus tried to emphasize the freeing aspect of living the Law. In the book of Tobit (4:15), we read, "Never do to anyone else anything that you would not want someone to do to you." Jesus says, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you" (Mt 7:12). The Pharisees were imposing human ritual, human burdens, on the people. Jesus was trying to free them. We do have the Word of God, and our Church has many teachings derived from the Word. Our college students see human-made law all too well, and they challenge us on this. So we should ask: Are moral teachings of the Church human-made or God-made?

When we say no to abortion, for example, are we creating a burden for women, or is God giving us a sense of freedom by valuing life? Though, from one point of view, an anti-abortion stance seems to be burdensome, from another it frees us to value life and to find joy within it. Are the teachings of the Church on human sexuality infringements on doing our own thing, or do they create a freedom to live in a world of care and respect? Is the command "Love your enemies" a burden, or is it freedom from hate and anger?

Our rules and rituals are gifts to us. As was the intention of Moses, they are there to help us remember who we are in a world sometimes unfriendly to faith. They are there as a guide in a world with far too many options. They are there to help us remember who we are in a world in which it is easy to get lost. Just as God gave Moses the Ten Commandments to help the people live a better life, in the same way God has given us the Church and its teachings to help us live better lives, lives free from the slavery of sin and its temptations. Let us be thankful for a God who cares enough about us to give us guidance through the rules and ritual which we have in the Church. He has truly given us a special gift. Let us show our appreciation by living them in our lives.

Our Bazaar is only two weeks away. Please volunteer to help out so that the work load will be much easier for everyone. Also, pick up extra raffle tickets and sell as many as possible. As you saw in our financial report, the Bazaar has to make up where our weekly collection is lacking. Thank you for your hard work and dedication to your parish.

Saturday, September 8, is the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. I encourage all of you to pray the rosary together as a family and to celebrate Mary's birthday. Make a special birthday cake in honor of Mary and give thanks to God that, through her, He gave us our Savior and the opportunity to share in eternal life with Him.

Please pray for rain. May God's blessings be upon you all.
