


Dear friends in Christ.

May the peace and love of our Lord be with each of you. Congratulations to Bishop Daniel Garcia of the Diocese of Austin who has been appointed by the Vatican as the Bishop of Monterey, California. May God's blessings and protection be with him during this time of transition. He will be greatly missed in our diocese.

Next Saturday is a Holy Day of Obligation as we celebrate The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Mass will be on Friday evening, December 7, at 7:00 p.m. and on Saturday morning, December 8, at 8:30 a.m. To fulfill your obligation, you need to attend one of the Holy Day Masses and one of the weekend Masses as well.

Today we begin the holy Season of Advent. Most of you have already made your plans for family gathers and events during this season and during the upcoming Christmas Season. During the next four weeks we will be preparing ourselves for the celebration of the Birth of the Lord at Christmas. The Christmas Season begins on the evening of December 24 and continues until Sunday, January 13, when we will celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. So, after Christmas Day on December 25, please do not say that Christmas is over, because, it has actually just begun. Too many Catholics and other Christians have given into the secular celebration of Christmas, a celebration that is completely absent of the presence of Jesus Christ, whose birthday we celebrate. Don't fall into this trap. Celebrate these special seasons as they are meant to be celebrated. Celebrate Advent as a time of preparation, make a good confession. Our Penance Service will be on Sunday, December 16 at 5:00 pm. Also, try to spend extra time in prayer with your family.

During the Season of Advent, we usually begin decorating our homes for Christmas. I encourage you to leave your tree and decorations up and your Christmas lights shining until the end of the Christmas Season, January 13. Let us truly celebrate Christmas during the *entire* Christmas Season. I also encourage parish organizations to have their Christmas parties during the Christmas Season and not during Advent. In the USA, Santa Claus has only become an advertising gimmick. Instead of Santa coming to our parties, we should live the truth of our faith and have St. Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, come to our celebrations. He is the one who brought gifts to the poor and needy of his day. Our faith is filled with wonderful traditions that have been handed down to us these past 2000 years. The more we present our faith in the spirit and truth it is meant to teach, the more people will have a conversion of heart and think about the faith they have received.

In today's first reading from Jeramiah, Judah and Jerusalem had been conquered, and the best and the brightest had been taken into exile in Babylon. Jeremiah placed Judah's downfall on one central factor - it has lost its religious center. Because the Jews were dominated by Assyria, they had begun to give up their unique religious celebrations of faith in favor of accommodating with society. After almost 40 years of calling Judah back to its faith and true religious practices that had real meaning, Jeremiah had begun to realize that following Yahweh was possible. Jeremiah experienced many setbacks in being a prophet. But yet he realized how much he and his people needed God and God's help. In today's first reading, Jeremiah reminds a defeated, suffering people that God's promise to them is that He will be faithful. He will raise up those that do what is right and just.

The birth of Jesus was God's promise. But we can see how we, like the people of Judah, have begun to surrender our religious celebrations in favor of civil celebrations, especially Christmas. We, too, our surrendering our unique identity as Christians. Therefore, we cannot afford to overlook the season of Advent.

Christmas can wait. Right now we must remind ourselves how badly we still need God. If Christ is to come again, as is suggested in the Gospel, do we know what we want of Him? Or have our hearts "become drowsy from carousing and drunkenness and the anxieties of daily life"? Advent is our time to be on the watch. To ignore Advent, and not remind ourselves that we need God, will bring destruction as foretold by Jeremiah. To see the need for God is to bring true meaning of Christmas into our lives. During Advent, as we remind ourselves that Christ is to come again, we cannot afford to be engulfed in drunkenness and worldly cares or tangled in Christmas lights. We must be caught being true disciples of Jesus Christ.

Here is a brief reflection on this holy season of Advent: Adventem! Čekáme na Ježíše, ano, má přijít, neotálí, nezpozdí se, nemusíme se znejistěle "křečovat", jestli náhodou "nezapomněl" – ale přitom… nikde. Kde je? Ale mám-li žhavou touhu ho vidět, pak "jsem celý bez sebe", nedám se naplnit nějakými náhražkami (tak jako nás televize nebaví, když co nevidět má přijít návštěva). Nemám chuť ani energii se zabývat jinými záležitostmi – to nejdůležitější je… že má přijít! Konečně!

Samozřejmě že čekání na Krista neznamená... dát výpověď v práci, přestat doma vařit a pomáhat dětem s úkoly... Taková "nedbalost" by nebyla dobrou přípravou na tu návštěvu všech návštěv. Spíš... nenechat se pohltit a zaplnit tím, co se v našem životě děje. To nejdůležitější... má teprve nastat!

Please pray for all the priests of the Diocese of Austin as we have an Advent Day of Prayer together this Tuesday, December 4.

Please check this bulletin for the Penance Services that have been scheduled at various parishes in our deanery. Try to attend with your family together to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation sometime during the Advent Season.

Advent Prepares Us for the Light of Christ

(the 2018 Season of Advent is celebrated December 2 thru December 24)

The events that come to mind when we say "Christmas" are so tremendous that their commemoration cannot be celebrated in a single day each. Weeks are needed: first, weeks of preparation, of becoming attuned in body and soul, and then weeks of celebration. This process goes back to an age when people still had time — time to live, time to enjoy.

In our modern day, we face the puzzling fact that the more time-saving gadgets we invent – the more buttons to push in order to 'save hours of work' — the less time we actually have. We have no more time to read books; we can afford only digests. We have no time to walk a quarter of a mile; we have to hop into a car. We have no time to make things by hand; we buy them ready-made. This "hurry up, let's go" atmosphere does not provide the necessary leisure in which to anticipate and celebrate a feast. Stop! Let us learn again to live each day as it is meant – a celebration of life, given to us by God – and live each day in a holy manner.

During the holy Season of Advent, we prepare ... for the coming of our Lord, Jesus Christ, which occurred more than 2,000 years ago, by His birth in Bethlehem ... and we prepare to celebrate with family and friends, offering gifts of love and hospitality – just as the Wise Men did on that wondrous night so long ago.

Christmas is the celebration of the Light of Christ being brought to all in this world through the birth of our Lord, and it is a light that should shine from each of us in all that we do and say. Celebrating Advent, as family, and with friends when possible, is a good way to strengthen and brighten this Light to make it all the more meaningful on Christmas morning and all the days of our lives. The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary

(December 8)

St. Ann conceived Mary, not by the power of the Holy Spirit as Jesus was conceived, but by normal means. However, when she was conceived in her mother's womb, Mary was without the stain of original sin. This was a special grace granted by God. Truly, this was what God had willed for all mankind, as it was with Adam and Eve, who were also without sin. However, sin entered the world when Adam and Eve fell from grace and because of that, we are born with the stain of their sin.

Jesus, our Lord and Savior, is also the Savior of His mother. He saved her from sin before she was born, at the moment of her conception in St. Ann's womb. In doing so, He also prepared her womb for His Presence. Jesus, who made all things (Jn 1:2), created His own mother, creating her perfectly pure and sinless. He later, under the power of the Holy Spirit, dwelled in that flawless womb under her Immaculate Heart. To prepare her for her role as mother of the Savior, "Mary was enriched by God with gifts appropriate to such a role" (*Lumen Gentium* 56).



In the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we praise and thank God for his love and graciousness to Mary whom He had prepared to be the Mother of his Son. And we thank Mary for her generous and courageous acceptance of God's invitation, "I am the handmaid of the Lord, let it be done to me as you have said." (Lk 1: 38)

In the second reading from Paul's letter to the Ephesians, Paul recalls the free and loving choices of God: of the Jewish people to prepare for and await the coming of the Messiah and of Paul himself, the Christians in Ephesus and all who share Christian faith to "receive grace and peace from God our Father," "chosen in Christ before the creation of the world." (Eph 1: 1, 3)

God's love and invitation to Mary are similar to God's love and invitation to each one of us, "chosen by Him in Christ before the creation of the world." God invites and asks us to respond generously to Him and to partner with him in whatever He has planned for each one of us.

In the same way that the angel assured Mary, "Do not fear, Mary, for God has looked kindly on you," God tells us not to fear to respond to him and assures us of his help and grace. God tells us not to fear in loving and serving Him and our neighbor for love of God.

And we also have the love and support of our loving Mother, "Holy Mary, conceived without original sin, pray for us."
