Dear friends in Christ,

Greetings to each of you in this holy Season of Advent. Preparation for Christmas is an important theme for Advent, but more is involved. Advent gives us a vision of our lives as Christians and shows us the possibilities of life. The vision of life that Advent gives us is twofold: it looks back to the first coming of Christ at Bethlehem, and it looks to the future when Christ will come again. In the interval between these two events we find meaning for our life as a Christian.

In today's Gospel we hear how John the Baptist received his call to preach directly from God. His mission was to proclaim a baptism of repentance as a sign that the people were willing to change their ways and be faithful to God. This, he said, would prepare them for the coming of the Messiah. Jesus was not the warrior Messiah that many people expected. He was a humble teacher who preached love and peaceful reconciliation rather than war. Claiming God as his Father, Jesus said He had come to bring good news of salvation to the people, and even insisted that John baptize Him.

Just as John the Baptist prepared the way for the coming of Jesus, so to, we who are followers of Jesus, must continue to bring the same message to the world. In this Advent season, we recall His coming into our world to bring the light of salvation into the darkness of sin. By first reforming our own lives and then living in accord with Christ's teaching of unconditional love for all people, we can "prepare the way of the Lord" in our own day.

In the history of our salvation destruction and chaos entered the human race when sin came into the world. Through His life, death, and resurrection, Christ triumphed over sin and made it possible for us to participate in the blessings of God's eternal love. We can share in Christ's victory and extend its embrace to others by believing in Him and dedicating our lives to His way of love. To do this we must prepare ourselves as John the Baptist tells us. A good way to begin is by going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation, Confession. Our Communal Penance Service will be on Sunday, December 16, at 5:00 pm. Prepare yourselves for Jesus and you too will be victorious over sin and death.

Here is a little mediation on the need to experience Jesus in our lives:

Otázka na tělo: těšíš se doopravdy na setkání s Kristem? Asi moc ne, že? Proč? To je jednoduché: Ježíše znáš (a známe) tak málo! Jak se můžeme těšit na někoho, koho osobně neznáme, koho jsme nikdy nepotkali tak jako jiné lidi! Těšíme se vždycky na někoho, kdo je nám sympatický, blízký, příjemný. Těšíme se na toho, s kým je nám dobře – protože se cítíme "jako doma", uvolněni, bez křeče a zábran. My lidé potřebujeme učinit osobní zkušenost, setkat se s druhým. A kdo z nás se může "pochlubit" takovou zkušeností s Ježíšem? A pak není divu, že se na něj nemůžeme kdovíjak těšit!

Bez studu si můžeme přiznat, že se těšíme spíš na návštěvu dlouholetého přítele než na Krista. Nemusíme být v rozpacích, když uznáme, že je nám tak příjemně v blízkosti takového člověka... Klidně si to přiznejme... a přiznejme si také to, že "je to tak dobře", že s takovým člověkem jsme tak rádi! Ano, vždyť všechno autenticky lidské (přijetí, objetí, pohlazení, pozorné naslouchání, vcítění se) je... Boží! Právě skrze druhé lidi můžeme už teď poznávat a zakoušet (a to je velmi důležité – my lidé potřebujeme zakoušet) Boží přijetí. Toto objevil už sv. Augustin: "Bůh je všechno pro tebe. On je všechno to, co miluješ". Všechno to, co milujeme, je vlastně samotnou Boží dobrotou (vylitou ve stvoření). Takže když toužíme po blízkosti dobrého přítele... toužíme vlastně po přítomnosti Boží. To dobré, co prožíváme v autentickém vztahu, je předchutí toho, co jednou naplno prožijeme s Bohem... až ho uvidíme tváří v tvář. A není tedy tak úplně pravda, že se skoro nikdo netěší na Krista. Spíš platí: všichni se na něj těší. (From Pastorace.cz)

This week, we will celebrate some important feast days. Wednesday, we will celebrate Our Lady of Guadalupe; Thursday, St. Lucy; and Friday, St. John of the Cross. I encourage you to look up the story of each of these saints and try to attend Mass on any, or all, of these days.

May the peace and love of our Lord be with you in this holy season.

8 Ideas for Celebrating Advent

Each December brings the same temptation for Catholics: Join one's daily focus with the commercially oriented Christmas frenzy in nearly every corner of modern American society or avoid it for the sake of focusing on living and breathing the meaning of Advent in preparation of the *real* Christmas season. The tension between the movement of society and Christmas is perhaps not too different than what occurred at the time of Jesus.

Saints Elizabeth and Zechariah heard the news that the birth of Jesus was coming (Luke 1:39-45). Mary and Saint Joseph alone traveled to Bethlehem, where Jesus would be born, for the census (Luke 2:1-5). Jesus was not born in a home or inn surrounded by others; it was a modest event to the human eye with the Holy Family alone being present (Luke 2:6-7). There were some shepherds (Luke 2:8-20) and Magi (Matthew 2:1-12) that later arrived to participate in the blessed event. As we can see, from the very beginning the birth of Christ went unnoticed by most of the corporeal world. We too should not fear having a different rhythm and set of habits for the upcoming holiday season as we prepare through Advent for the true meaning of Christmas: The Nativity of our Lord.

The Directory of Popular Piety and the Liturgy provides us many insights into celebrating Advent with the heart and mind of the Church. It provides three key themes for the celebration of Advent: "a time of waiting, conversion and of hope" (No. 96). The theme of waiting is to remember the initial coming of Jesus 2,000 years ago in the city of Bethlehem as well as our current waiting for "his final, glorious coming as Lord of History and universal Judge" (No. 96). Conversion is at the heart of the Advent celebrations as we too seek to repent and be ready for the coming of Christ. Hope speaks of our hope of all that is possible by Christ's grace as we grow in holiness.

Perhaps it might be beneficial to revisit some less often quoted words concerning Advent and Christmas. In the period of Advent, for instance, the Church arouses in us the consciousness of the sins we have had the misfortune to commit, and urges us, by restraining our desires and practicing voluntary mortification of the body, to recollect ourselves in meditation, and experience a longing desire to return to God who alone can free us by His grace from the stain of sin and from its evil consequences.

With the coming of the birthday of the Redeemer, she would bring us to the cave of Bethlehem and there teach that we must be born again and undergo a complete reformation; that will only happen when we are intimately and vitally united to the Word of God made man and participate in His divine nature, to which we have been elevated.

Returning to the *Directory* mentioned above, here are some of the suggested, although not exhaustive, means of celebrating Advent with the mind and heart of the Church:

1. The Advent Wreath is a four-candle wreath used to solicit a sense of waiting and progression while recalling the "various stages of salvation history" that culminates with the coming of Christ (No. 98).

2. Advent Processions have either been to announce the birth of Jesus Christ to the world or to recall the journey of the Holy Family to Bethlehem (No. 99). This is seen in many parishes and neighborhoods under the name *posadas*.

3. *Marian Devotion* throughout the season of Advent recalls both the "women of the Old Testament who prefigured and prophesied her mission" (No. 101) and recalls Mary's faith and role in the events preceding the birth of Christ. Some examples of such devotion include: the Novena of the Immaculate Conception that progresses through the Marian passages from Genesis 3:15 to Luke 1:31-33, and devotions to Our Lady of Guadalupe. These devotions are rooted in and flow towards their corresponding liturgical celebrations (No. 102).

4. Vespers [Evening Prayer] from the Liturgy of the Hours is a means of preparing for Christmas through the daily rhythm of the Church's liturgical prayer and in a special way through Vespers from December 17th-23rd with the "major antiphons" (No. 103). There are many apps for smart phones for accessing the Liturgy of the Hours easily and the clergy are already praying these liturgical prayers (Code of Canon Law 1174 §1).

In the hope of promoting the themes of waiting, conversion, and hope, I would like to humbly add some additional ideas for celebrating Advent:

5. The Sacrament of Confession to renew and deepen our conversion to Christ. Confession is also called the Sacrament of Conversion (CCC 1423).

6. Daily Reading of Scripture to recall the major events of salvation history and prophecies related to the coming of Christ by reading these passages, within their broader context. Some examples: Genesis 3:15, Genesis 49:10, Numbers 24:17, 2 Samuel 7:16, Isaiah 11:1, Isaiah 7:14, Jeremiah 23:5, Micah 5:2, Luke 1:1-80. The Jesse Tree is also a wonderful tool in this practice.

7. *Eucharistic Adoration* to spend time before the Blessed Sacrament, the Sacrament of the Presence of Christ. This is an excellent opportunity to contemplate the mystery of Jesus as Emmanuel, "God with us" (Matthew 1:23).

8. Increased Care for the Poor to remember Jesus who was born in the humblest of circumstances and "emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men" (Philippians 2:7).

There is not a person on earth that does not hunger for the gift of joy, hope, and meaning. Especially in the times we find ourselves in, we hunger for it even more. Nothing will bring us a better sense of these gifts during the Advent Season than celebrating Advent with the heart and mind of the Church, basking in the grace of God as we prepare for Christmas Mass and Christmastide.
