Dear friends in Christ,

Today is the 4th Sunday of Advent. Inserted in this bulletin is my annual Christmas Letter.

In today's Gospel, we are confronted with decisive babies. We hear about two pregnant women, Elizabeth and Mary. Mary was anticipating the birth of her son, whom an angel told her would be the Son of the most High God. Elizabeth was expecting the birth of John the Baptizer, who would prepare the way for the son of Mary, Jesus. The event we heard in today's Gospel seems really insignificant when compared to Caesar Augustus and the Roman legions who ruled with an iron hand. But those two little boys, John and Jesus, would prove to be more decisive than all the emperors and armies of Rome. Our thoughts today, this last Sunday before Christmas, focus on the decisive babies of history.

We never know what a baby is going to bring with them into the world. Today's tiny hand may hold the key to some bright new tomorrow. We always think of babies as small and weak. They are helpless and depend on us for care. But yet I believe we depend on them more than most of us realize. Many times the world has seemed hopeless and then a baby was born. That baby then became the pioneer of a new way of thinking and living.

In 1809 the most important thing in Europe was Napoleon and his army. He conquered one nation after another and it seemed that he would rule the world. Napoleon was the headline of every newspaper. Everyone spoke about him and they trembled at the thought of the little French dictator. It seemed to be a very dark year. The world was without hope. But it in this darkness there was much light being born. Some of the babies born that year were: Charles Darwin, Abraham Lincoln, Alfred Tennyson, Edgar Allen Poe, Felix Mendelssohn, and Oliver Wendell Holmes. The world was not as hopeless as it seemed. The Napoleonic wars were all but forgotten by most people, except for those who specialize in that period of history. But yet the contributions of those babies born in 1809 still continue to influence the thinking of mankind.

All babies have one thing in common. They need help in order to survive. Without you or someone like you, they will never make it. This is no less true of the decisive babies we hear about in today's Gospel. John needed Elizabeth and Zechariah. Later he needed his friends and disciples else his life would not have been decisive. Jesus needed Mary and Joseph. Later, he needed Peter and Andrew, James and John and the other Apostles. We never know when we will be assisting a decisive baby whom God wills to work miracles in the world. These babies need you.

Jesus is the most decisive baby in the history of mankind. We sing His praises every week. But I ask you the question: How decisive has He been in your life and mine? Each of us must answer that question for ourselves. Jesus cannot be decisive in our life in a general sort of way. One poet has said: "Though Christ a thousand times in Bethlehem be born, if He's not born in me, my soul is still forlorn."

We cannot take it for granted that His coming has made any real difference in your life and mine. That may or may not be true. Most of that depends on you and me. If we take Him seriously, then His coming is a decisive factor in your life and mine. Otherwise, we can go on living as though he had never been born. What is different in your life because Jesus came? How deeply have your attitudes been affected by him?

There is no doubt that Jesus came to change history and to change the world. But all of that stops at each person's doorstep. Christ is the most decisive baby born in the history of the world. How decisive has He been in your life? Let us reflect upon this question as we celebrate His birth this week.

Christmas is just around the corner. Christmas begins the evening of December 24 and continues until Sunday, January 13. Keep your Christmas lights shining brightly all throughout the Christmas Season. Let us celebrate this season in its fullness. During the Octave of Christmas, we have some important feast days: The Nativity of the Lord on December 25, St. Stephen on December 26, St. John on December 27, The Holy Innocents on December 28, St. Thomas Becket on December 29, The Holy Family, on December 30, St. Sylvester on December 31, and Mary, Mother of God on January 1. Of course, December 25, December 30, January 1, and January 13 are all Holy Days of Obligation, so I will definitely see you at Mass on those days, unless you are traveling out of town. The Lord has given us so much and so many ways in which we can truly experience His love and presence in our life and in the life of our family. Let us accept all He gives us and be united with Him and with one another.

Here is a little meditation on Mary and Elizabeth: Obyčejné setkání dvou obyčejných žen? Ano i ne! Ano, protože se toto setkání odehrává "obyčejně", na prostém místě (v domě někde na horách), ne v chrámu (anebo aspoň v synagóze). A že to byly dvě obyčejné ženy, o tom není pochyb – Maria patřila k chudým, Alžběta byla už pokročilého věku. A přesto... a přesto. Bůh sestupuje... do obyčejnosti, sklání se k všednosti... A proto ten jásot, proto ten "hlas prostoupený radostí" ("jak jsem si zasloužila... hle, dítě se živě a radostně pohnulo"). Bůh sestupuje k člověku, a tak se šeď stává jasem, spektrem duhových barev. A člověk tančí.

Pokud je pravdou, že tyto dvě ženy jsou obyčejné... tak musíme přece jen upřesnit, že Maria byla něčím výjimečná – otevřeností vůči Bohu. Otevřeností tam, kde se zdálo, že jsou cesty zavřené (jak počít dítě bez muže?). Otevřeností tam, kde se Boží Slovo zdálo tak těžko přijatelné, tak neuchopitelné... Ona však překročila práh "neochoty" a "uzavřenosti", práh toho "jak se to může stát". Maria přijala Boží Slovo a počala.

A proto její obyčejný pozdrav... přináší dotek Ducha, radost evangelia – toho evangelia, Slova jásotu, už přítomného ve fyzickém nitru, ale také v duchovním nitru Matky Kristovy.

I obyčejný pozdrav se stává neobyčejným. I obyčejné věci se stávají neobyčejnými. Duch Boží nečiní nové věci, ale činí věci novými, prozářenými Božím jasem. A člověk tančí.

May your Christmas be filled with the meaning and love it is meant to bring to each of you so that you may experience God's love in its fullness.
