Dear friends in Christ,

This past week, we began the holy season of Lent. There are three aspects to the season of Lent and they are prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Increased prayer helps us to grow in our relationship with Jesus, fasting helps us to gain a spiritual hunger for our Lord and helps us to gain self-control of our appetites and desires, and almsgiving helps us in our need to live as Jesus did in service to other people. These all help to prepare Christians to celebrate the resurrection of the Lord. Lent helps to remind Christians of their sinfulness and the need to return to their baptismal innocence.

During the Lenten season, we, as Catholics, pray the Stations of the Cross every week, usually on Wednesday or Friday, as we meditate on Jesus being arrested in the Garden, brought before Pilate, scourged, crowned with thorns, carrying His cross, being crucified and then buried. By meditating on these last events of Jesus' life, we come to have a greater appreciation of the Resurrection of our Lord from the dead so that we can truly celebrate Easter with abundant joy. **Please join us every Wednesday evening at 6:30 pm for the Stations of the Cross.**

In today's Gospel, we hear how Jesus took time out of His earthly journey for a little retreat. His retreat lasted for forty days. He knew that, in His humanity, He needed to stay in close touch with His Heavenly Father. So, He goes out into the desert to be alone with Him. He was very much aware of the Father's presence in His life. Do we have such an awareness of the Heavenly Father's presence in our life?

We Christians possess the most valuable treasure in the world, Jesus Christ. Sometimes we are out of touch with this great treasure, this great gift. Why? Maybe it is because we think that we own or possess Jesus, and therefore, we do not let Him possess us. Or, perhaps, we focus only on some of the external things in our life and miss that which really matters. For example, if a man or woman is highly involved in a particular sport, he or she might identify him or herself as a golfer, a football player, a hockey player or a body builder. Or a person might identify themselves with a physical characteristic. Quite often, we identify ourselves with our work. We might work as a doctor, engineer, farmer, rancher, mechanic, or carpenter, nurse, or plumber, but we are infinitely more than that. We are Christians.

We are tempted to identity with a physical quality, a social role, a significant experience or a personality trait. But, in doing so, we miss something. We miss that which is the most significant aspect of our existence. We miss a dimension that remains hidden. We are not just physical beings. We are also spiritual beings ... every one of us. At the level of our deepest being, our deepest selves, we are sons and daughters of the Most High God. We are brothers and sisters of the Lord Jesus Christ. He is within us. We have the capacity to be Jesus in the world.

The journey with the Lord during Lent is a journey of spiritual self-discovery. All of the practices we embrace during Lent, the additional times for prayers, daily Mass, Stations of the Cross, the fasting we do to remember the suffering of the Lord, the seeking forgiveness for our sins by going to confession, all of these practices are wonderful ways of strengthening our spiritual lives. They remind us that we each have the capability of making the Lord present in the world. God can and will use each of us to transform the world if we just allow Him to do so.

All of us are on a journey in life. Now, in this season of Lent, we are on a journey, from Ash Wednesday to Easter, that travels through Good Friday. We are on a forty day retreat with our God. We are called to a deeper understanding of our personal passions, the suffering we willingly embrace because others deserve to be loved with a sacrificial love. For our young families, this suffering might mean being tired all the time because the baby and little children take so much out of you. For those with older children, the suffering might be the continual battle against the forces of immorality attacking the children. For those who are retired, the suffering might mean not having the time to do the things you dreamed of doing in retirement because it is far more important to care for your sick spouse. We are called to unite our acts of sacrificial love with Jesus on the cross.

Jesus journeyed to Jerusalem to radically transform the world. He invites us to join Him on the journey during Lent. May our Lent be, for each of us, a journey of discovery, or maybe one of rediscovery...the rediscovery of the Life of Christ. Living the Life of Christ is the valuable gift we so often ignore. From the outside, it may seem to be an antique. But, when we really open it up and look inside, we find that it is a life that is new each and every day. Live that life and journey through this life with our Lord. Stay in close touch with Him.

Here is a brief reflection on this Lenten Journey: Postní putování se může stát vysilujícím asketickým cvičením (pouhým odříkáním vyprazdňujícím náš život), namáhavou cestou pouště daleko od zabydleného domova zvyků (pokud se snažíme "vykořenit" nějaké špatné zvyky), pomalým klopýtáním a "upadnutím" kvůli celkovému oslabení (a tím upadnutím míníme např. podléhání netrpělivosti a zlobě vůči bližním, třeba kvůli maličkostem) – nechceš-li podlehnout, nechceš-li padnout vysílený, znechucený (s pochybovačnou otázkou "je toto pravé prožívání postní doby?"), pak… se posiluj Božím pokrmem, Božím slovem. To je ta výbava na cestu, "proviant", který ti umožní dojít až do Jeruzaléma, místa smrti a vzkříšení.

May the Lord bless you all with a spiritually renewing Season of Lent.

Celebrate the Feast of Saint Joseph

on Tuesday, March 19, with Mass at 6:00 p.m.,

followed by a *St. Joseph's Altar Celebration* in the PAC sponsored by the *Confraternity of Christian Mothers*

The Altar will be blessed by Fr. Stephen and then participants will be able to enjoy the meatless foods provided on the altar.

In keeping with tradition, donations for those in need will be appreciated for the benefit of the Caring Place in Georgetown.

The farmers looked out across their barren fields, sweat beading down their faces from the hot sun and a cloudless sky. Dried-out crops popped beneath their feet. As they walked across fields that should be spotted with the bright colors of life, dust kicked up around their legs. They looked to the sky, searching for a cloud, but none were in sight. It was the 1600s and a great famine had set in for the great agricultural island of Sicily.

With no rain, no crops, and barely a single hope left, the people of Sicily began to pray. They turned to St. Joseph, their patron saint, and pleaded for rain. In return, they vowed to honor St. Joseph with a large and plentiful feast. After what seemed like an eternity of unanswered prayers, the heavens finally burst open like an overfilled wine cask and the rain poured down upon dusty fields and withered crops.

To honor their promise, the Sicilian farmers prepared a grand feast. The grand feast became a tradition throughout Sicily and Italy, and is now known as the St. Joseph's Altar. On March 19, St. Joseph's feast day, Italians carried on the tradition and, when many immigrated to America, they brought the tradition with them. Today, many parishes still celebrate St. Joseph's Altar on March 19.

Regardless of heritage or nationality, Catholics across the world have embraced the tradition as a very real reminder of the blessings bestowed upon us by God through the intercession of His saints. It's a day to celebrate and share those blessings, yet it is also a day to celebrate the family. It was the family that God chose for His Son to begin the work of salvation, and He chose St. Joseph as the patriarch of this family. This is why St. Joseph was chosen as the patron saint of families. In the Holy Family of St. Joseph, Mary, and Jesus, we find the perfect example for all Christian families to reflect.

A Novena to St. Joseph begins this Sunday, March 10, and the prayer can be found in this bulletin.
