Dear friends in Christ.

Peace be with you. Please pray for those of our parish who will receive the Sacrament of Confirmation next Sunday, March 31. May the anointing of the Holy Spirit truly strengthen and reinforce the gift of grace that they received at Baptism.

The message in today's Gospel is one that many people do not want to think about, so they tend to ignore it. Jesus speaks about some recent tragedies of which the people were well aware. It seems that some Galileans had protested the Roman's building an aqueduct. Pilate had his soldiers mix in with the Jews during a synagogue service and then attack the protesters, killing them, and thus "mingled with the blood of their sacrifices." Another all too common but sad experience is related regarding a tower that was being constructed. It caved in killing a number of the workers. Certainly, the Lord could have included the many of the tragedies we hear of every week: natural tragedies like earthquakes and fires, man-made tragedies like famine and war, horrible tragedies of our society, like children killing children, the internet used to hurt people, particularly children, the devastation of drugs, etc.

Most of the people of Jesus' time believed that the people who died in the synagogue, and in the collapse of the tower, were killed because of their sins. This reminds me of when the hurricane hit New Orleans. Many fundamentalist Christians said God was punishing them because of their sins. This, of course, is *not* what we believe.

When Jesus spoke about the events of His day, He said that in all these situations the people who died were not being punished by God. They, like all of us, suffered from the effects of evil and death in the world. What happened was horrible. Death is horrible and, most of the time, comes much sooner than it is expected. Our time on this earth is limited. We must make the best use of it as we can. The reading goes on to present the parable of the fig tree which is going to be cut down if it doesn't produce fruit. In the second reading, St. Paul tells the Corinthians, "Whoever thinks he is standing secure, should take care not to fall."

These are not pleasant messages. We come to Church seeking union with God, praying for our needs. We hope to leave with good feelings. All of us like a warm fuzzy feeling inside ourselves. But religion is a lot more than warm fuzzies. Religion is being tied to a God who said "Follow me," and then was crucified. Nothing warm and fuzzy about that. This Sunday we are warned, "Whoever thinks he is standing secure, should take care not to fall." There is nothing warm or fuzzy about that, but there is a deep reality being invoked.

Jesus Christ was not only Son of God and Messiah, He was also a prophet. And, as a true prophet, He did not evade the message that people needed to hear. He loves us too much to keep the truth from us, even if it is painful. And the truth is simple: we must fight evil and do good, repent and bear fruit as the gospel says, or we will suffer eternal death.

A brief meditation: Obrať se právě dnes... Na takovou výzvu bys mohl namítnout: "Raději zítra, teď nemám čas. Raději jindy, musím se připravit". Jenže... ta nejjednodušší cesta je: obrať se dnes. Ne zítra. Ne jindy. Sami ze své zkušenosti víme, že odložená záležitost se postupem času stává stále větším břemenem.

Obrácení (právě dnes) je "výhodné" především pro tebe samotného! Je to jako bys využíval lukrativní nabídky, která se ti nabízí jen určitou dobu. Tím, že neotálíš a "vezmeš", získáš především ty sám. A opačně: zdráháním se o něco ukrátíš ty sám. Ve stejném duchu hovoří i Ježíš: neobrácení znamená ztrátu, zmar. Jak napovídá pozorné čtení evangelia, Ježíšova slova nejsou varováním, že neochota k obrácení přivodí "tragickou smrt" (v podobě určitého nenadálého neštěstí či nehody). A kromě toho by nebylo správné pochopit Ježíšova slova "ve stejném smyslu" pro všechny posluchače. Vždyť samotné evangelium nám prozrazuje, že s nejvyšší naléhavostí je Ježíšova výzva určena těm, kdo dosud nepřijali evangelium. Pro ty však, kdo přijali Krista do svého života, už není smrt a odsouzení (Ř 8,1).

Dnešní věta "neobrátíte-li se, podobně zahynete" je pro nás tedy zbytečná? Ne. I nám připomíná, že odchýlení se od Boží cesty, vykroucení se, od-vrácení od Boží tváře je "k naší škodě". Platí totiž jasný axiom, že bez Boha není život – a čím víc se před Bohem bráním, tak tím víc sám trpím a ubližuji si. A tak výzva "obrať se právě dnes" se dá v tomto duchu chápat jako "buď sám k sobě dobrý". (Pastorace.cz)

The Parents' Role After Confirmation

As parents, it's easy to know our roles in our children's life when they are still in childhood. We know as babies they get baptized and then, after two years of formal religious education, they receive the Sacraments of First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion. When our children get to junior high and start preparing for Confirmation they are preparing for graduation into adulthood in the Catholic faith.

In a way, Confirmation is a step into adulthood in the Faith, as it completes the Sacraments of Christian Initiation. At this point, it's tempting to think that this means there is no work left to be done; that, as parents, we must now step aside and allow our child to make their own decisions in how they grow in the faith. Unfortunately, this can result in teenagers skipping Sunday Mass and not continuing to grow in their faith. Because of this, many see the irony in what happens after Confirmation, even referring to it as the Sacrament of Exodus.

Yet, this couldn't be further from the truth. In fact, in many ways, it's just the beginning of the road, both for you and your newly confirmed child.

The Parent's Role Does Not Change After Confirmation

Many may be surprised to hear this, but your role as a guide in your child's faith journey does not cease once they receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. You are still the primary educator of your child. In fact, you as the parents are the first evangelizers to your children! The Church teaches us that, as parents, we have the first responsibility for the education of our children; that we must educate them to fulfill God's law, putting the state of our soul above the material world (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, #2222-2223). What a beautiful and awesome responsibility! Yet, it is often the most difficult of responsibilities and the home can be one of the toughest places to evangelize.

As children grow older, they become more involved in life outside the home. School, sports, friends, a job, and social media can sometimes create an environment of isolation for each individual. It makes it difficult to remain the primary guide and teacher of faith in the home.

Supporting the Christian Life

So, how do we continue to help our children know their faith to encourage them to a deeper, more mature relationship with God? How can we be an evangelizer to our children? Here is what it looks like:

- 1. **Be a good example yourself.** Show them what it means to be obedient to the will of the Father in Heaven. Go to Mass as much as possible. Pray.
- 2. **Know your Faith!** As members of the Church, we have the responsibility to continue to educate ourselves in our faith and what it means to be Catholic.
- 3. **Be present to your children**. This means, in particular, being available to answer their questions and to discuss matters of the Faith at home.
- 4. **Pray with and for your children.** It's a simple action, yet extremely important, especially as your child grows into adulthood.
- 5. **Remind them to frequently receive Confession and the Eucharist**. It is these sacraments that strengthen the graces we received at Baptism and Confirmation.
- 6. Have them continue to attend CCE on Wednesday evenings in the high school class here at Holy Trinity.
- 7. Have them be part of our parish Youth Group and spend time with other Catholic youth.

Sealed with the Gifts of the Holy Spirit

You never cease being a parent to your child, even though your role develops over time. Still, as a parent, you have the beautiful and awesome responsibility to continue to support their life in the Church. At no point in their lives does this support end. Through Confirmation, the Holy Spirit seals gifts within us called the Gifts of the Holy Spirit: wisdom, understanding, knowledge, fortitude, piety, counsel, and fear of the Lord. We're given these tools to face the challenges of daily life with a heart united to Christ instead of united to the world.

It's these gifts that give us the strength to live out the Faith and deepen our relationship with the Lord. These gifts also help us fulfill our responsibility as Christian parents. So, let us remember as parents and guardians of the souls that God has entrusted to our care, that, while our children decide to become fully initiated into the loving arms of the Church, we must always remain vigilant – sometimes through action and always through prayer – that they continue to be an active member of the Body of Christ.
