Dear Parishioners.

Peace be with you. Thank you to everyone who helped out with the celebration of the Sacrament of Confirmation last Sunday. Thank you to our Catechists, Parents, to those who set up and took down the PAC, and to those who cooked the wonderful Beef and Pork Roast meal. It was certainly delicious. May God bless all of you and may the Holy Spirit truly always be invited into the lives of those who received the Sacrament of Confirmation. Be sure to pray to the Spirit daily.

Here we are on this Fifth Sunday of Lent. For the next two weeks, our statues will be covered to remind us that we are in the most solemn time of our Church year. The covering of the statues reminds us that we are to give up all that is pleasing to our senses during this remaining time of Lent and focus upon the suffering of our Lord. Let us enter into these final days of Lent with our entire being, mind, body and soul, so that we can more intensely experience the joy of the resurrection and salvation.

Our Lenten Penance Service is this Sunday, April 7, at 5:00 pm. We should have about five priests hearing confessions, so come cleanse your heart and soul before Easter to experience Holy Week with a heart that is pure.

Next Sunday is Palm Sunday, the beginning of Holy Week. Our Mass schedule for the Easter Triduum will be as follows:

Holy Thursday - 7:00 p.m.; Good Friday - 7:00 p.m.; Holy Saturday - 8:30 p.m.;

Easter Sunday - 6:30 am. 8:30 a.m. & 10:30 a.m.

The Easter Triduum, during Holy Week, is our most sacred and solemn week of the whole year. We should make it a priority to attend the celebrations on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday. Please consider putting your and your family's spirituality first, setting aside other non-religious activities that may conflict with these sacred days. Let us be faithful to God. We will have Altar Server practice for each of the above celebrations. Practice for Holy Thursday will be on Palm Sunday, April 14, following the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Practice for Good Friday will be after the 7:00 p.m. Mass on Holy Thursday, and on Holy Saturday, practice will be at 11:00 a.m. All Altar Servers who are scheduled to serve at these celebrations are asked to be at these practices. If you are not able to serve when scheduled, please find a substitute for yourself and be sure to tell them to be at the practice for that particular day. Also please call the parish office so that we will know who will be serving. Thank you to all of you for serving at God's Altar.

The weather has been much warmer lately. Usually, when summer approaches, we are tempted to dress rather lightly or skimpy for Mass. We need to remember that, as we come to Mass, we come to worship God and to receive His Son in Holy Communion. We should dress in a way that shows respect for God. The general rule that I believe is appropriate is that anyone over 6 years of age should not wear shorts to Mass. Also, girls and ladies should wear blouses or dresses that are appropriate for Mass, nothing strapless or no spaghetti straps. Some say that God doesn't care what you wear to Mass. Well, that may be so. But the question should be "do you love God enough that you care what you wear to Mass?" Do you stand in honor of His presence? Also, if you dress appropriately for Mass, you will not be cold in church from the air conditioning. If the air is blowing on you and you are cold, try to move to another part of the church.

In today's gospel, Jesus meets the woman who was caught in the sin of adultery. The Pharisees and the Scribes condemn her. However, Jesus points out their own sinfulness, which leaves them speechless. Then, turning to the woman, he offers her God's love and forgiveness. He then tells her "Go, and from now on do not sin anymore." Many people go to God and ask for forgiveness. They may say that God will forgive every sin so they have nothing to worry about. But, they often forget that Jesus said "Go, and from now on do not sin anymore." They ignore the fact that God expects a change to take place within us, that He expects us to change our way of life. This is the only qualification that God puts on forgiveness. Let us pray that we can respond to God's request so that we can truly live in the freedom of the children of God.

Something to think about: V tenatech smrti! Chycena! Bez úniku: uvnitř zdrcující výčitky, vně krvelační žalobci. A zákon neúprosně odsuzující... To byla zkušenost té ubohé ženy: a zároveň často tou naší zkušeností. Odsuzování druhých, hlodající a zdrcující výčitky svědomí, zklamání nad sebou, odsuzování sebe ("proč jsem to udělal?", "proč jsem takový bídák?"). A navíc: neutuchající výčitky, které se nedají ničím "uplatit". Kdo doopravdy poznal hloubku a "tvář" hříchu, asi zažil tyto pocity. Že to patří k pravému křesťanu? Jasná odpověď zní: ne. Ježíš odsuzuje hřích, ne hříšníka. Na rozdíl od nás, kteří tak snadno "smícháme obojí dohromady" (i to patří k naší porušené přirozenosti, že nedokážeme jasně rozlišovat). A tak odsuzujeme druhé, anebo i sebe. Obojí je koneckonců tím snadnějším způsobem, jak se vypořádat s hříchem. Ježíš jde po té těžší cestě. Nepodléhá citům, mlčí a čeká – aby zároveň poskytl čas "k prohlédnutí" těm, kdo mají kameny již připravené. Postavit se před Ježíšem se srdcem na dlani – neutéci, neschovat se. A Ježíš svou přítomností zahání výčitky... a bouře utichá. A tento velký dar odpuštění je zároveň závazkem: jdi, a už nehřeš. Jdi – neuvízni nevěřícně v minulosti, zaobíraný svými stinnými stránkami. Jdi – nezůstávej v minulosti, přijmi odpuštění, uvěř, že Ježíš vzal na sebe tvůj hřích. Uvěř a jdi – nezůstávej ležet na zemi jako poražený. Vstaň a jdi – přece Bůh tě nestvořil proto, abys zůstal vězněm smrti a černoty! Tragické totiž není prohrát a padnout, ale zůstat ležet na zemi. Ale ty jdi... a už nehřeš! Rozhodní se pro novou cestu. Řekni si: "Nechci žít jako dřív". Ježíš tě vysvobodil proto, abys žil jako svobodný člověk – ne jako zajatec... spoutaný v tenatech smrti a sebeodsuzování. Next weekend is Palm Sunday – which begins the most solemn week of our Church Year – *Holy Week*. Enlighten and prepare your hearts and minds with the excerpt below to better understand Jesus' sacrificial death and celebrate more fully His redeeming resurrection.

How to Enter into Holy Week

This is what it's all for – those forty days of prayer and penance. We've been watching with Christ in the desert these weeks to be able to enter into His Passion with Him.

Holy Week offers us a set chronology from Palm Sunday to Easter, enabling us to walk step by step with Jesus through His Passion. The actions of Holy Week do not just symbolize what happened over two thousand years ago, but through the mystical time of the liturgy enable us to enter into them and participate in the realities that present us. We enter into Holy Week primarily through the liturgy, but also by reading the Gospels and taking more time for silent prayer.

Beginning with Palm Sunday, we literally greet Christ in His procession into Jerusalem with palms. We greet Christ with the crowds and children, singing Hosanna and acclaiming Christ's kingship. We recognize that the blessed one who comes in the name of the Lord has entered into our midst. We quickly, however, must also recognize that we are the same crowd that both acclaims Him and brings about His Crucifixion. Palm Sunday becomes Passion Sunday as we read the Gospel account of the Passion and literally shout: "Crucify Him! Crucify Him!" Those dreadful words show that He truly died for our sins – our sins have brought our Savior to this moment.

Early in Holy Week Jesus enters Bethany, taking time to prepare with His friends, especially through the anointing of His feet. He reenters Jerusalem, cursing the fig tree, and cleanses the Temple as the high priest plots His death. Monday has been referred to as Fig Monday and Wednesday as Spy Wednesday, while Judas spies upon Jesus to prepare his betrayal. These events help us to place ourselves at Jesus' feet with Mary Magdalene, seeking cleansing like the Temple, and to reflect on how we have betrayed Jesus.

Maundy Thursday, named for the mandate that Jesus gave His disciples at the Last Supper, begins the great liturgical drama of the Triduum. The fact that we name the day for Jesus' new commandment to love others as He has loved us shows us the Holy Thursday's deep theological meaning. Jesus invites us into His mission of self-gift for others, flowing from the Father's love. It's a day when priests are asked to renew their priestly promises at the Chrism Mass (though this is ordinarily moved earlier in the week). We commemorate the great gifts of the priesthood and the Eucharist, which are realities present to us sacramentally, but are portrayed to us in a more pronounced way at the Holy Thursday Mass.

At the end of the Holy Thursday Mass we begin our accompaniment of Jesus through His Passion. He is processed away from the altar, representing His captivity, as it is stripped, and conveyed through a solemn procession to the altar of repose. We chant the great hymn, Pange Lingua, that Thomas Aquinas composed for the first feast of Corpus Christi. The third verse brings us to the Lord's Supper:

On the night of that Last Supper, Seated with His chosen band, He, the Paschal Victim eating, First fulfils the Law's command; Then as Food to all his brethren Gives Himself with His own Hand.

With Jesus at the altar of repose, we try to make good the failure of the Apostles in the Garden to keep watch even for one hour. It is a tradition to visit the altars of repose of at least three churches, as we keep watch with Jesus on this night of His abandonment.

Prayer, silence, and fasting make Good Friday a particularly powerful day for uniting ourselves to the Cross. The hours between twelve and three on Good Friday, when Jesus hung on the Cross, have been considered a sacred time for prayer and silence. I would encourage you to try to get off of work these hours and spend them in church or praying as a family. Watching the Passion of the Christ before or after those hours of silence can help our imagination to enter into the mystery of Jesus' suffering. In the Stations of the Cross we can place ourselves in the place of so many of its figures, but especially Simon of Cyrene, as we reluctantly carry the cross of our lives with His Cross. The culmination of the day comes in another liturgical reading of the Passion and our veneration of the Cross.

There is a different kind of silence that settles over the world on Holy Saturday: God is dead and we await with sorrowful anticipation the triumph of Christ. Some continue the fast of Good Friday into this day to prepare for the Vigil. In the midst of the darkness of the suffering of the past days, and of the sinful world, the light of the Vigil fire breaks forth, representing the new life and the renewal of faith as it carries through the church. The Vigil brings new life to the initiated, while everyone embraces the fruits of the Resurrection as they renew their baptismal vows. The Vigil places our redemption in a cosmic perspective, recapitulating creation and the covenants God has made with His people. And then comes the celebration!
