33rd **Sunday in Ordinary time:** The closing of the liturgical year reminds us that being a disciple of Jesus is not easy. Faithfulness to Christ brings opposition and ridicule. We are privileged to be disciples, but the journey will involve the cross.

Dear friends in Christ,

Praised be Jesus Christ! If you have not yet made your pledge to the Catholic Services Appeal of the Diocese of Austin, please do so as soon as possible. If you are not able to make a monetary donation at this time, please check on the pledge card that you will pray for the diocese and mail in your pledge card. You will receive a "thank you" for your prayers and the diocese will not send you a follow-up letter asking for money. Let us all do our part to support the Diocese of Austin by pledging either monetarily or through prayer.

The Gospel reading today is taken from a section which the Church entitles the 'Eschatological Discourse' of Jesus, that is, a discussion between Jesus and his apostles in the Temple about the end times, the end of the world. When will this happen? Jesus tells us in the Gospel of Matthew, "As for the exact day or hour, no one knows, neither the angels in heaven nor the Son, but the Father only." However, Jesus did say that the Temple and Jerusalem would be destroyed, and this event happened in the year 70 A.D., about 40 years after the death of Jesus. So, about the time that the gospels were being written, between 65 and 110 A.D., the people believed the end of the world was very near. This belief is very much reflected in the New Testament writings. The words of Jesus, which we read in today's Gospel, however, suggest that there will be a long period between the destruction of the Temple and the end of the world. We are now living in that period. No one can say when the end of the world will take place. Jesus tells us that the Church will be persecuted before the end comes. This has happened throughout the Church's history. Today there are many people who speak out against the Catholic Church and especially against the Pope. I believe that the number of people who speak out against the Church will continue to increase. The Church must remain faithful to Christ even if the people do not remain faithful. All of us make up Christ's Church, and we must remain faithful to Him even if it means dying for Christ and for His Church.

Jesus also advises his disciples to be patient, to pray and to be watchful. This is what Jesus advises us to do each day of our lives also. We do not know when our earthly existence will come to an end. The question is, 'Will we be ready to die when it is our time?' I hope that all of us will be able to say that we have done what we can do to prepare ourselves for our death. You teenagers and young adults, are you prepared to die? When I was much younger, I would party with my friends. We never thought about the possibility of our lives ending that night or sometime in the near future. We all believed we had a long life to live. We were not prepared to meet our God. Are all of you ready to meet God in heaven or are you walking the fence and could fall either into heaven or into hell? Is the only service you offer to God lip service? There are many who say that as long as you declare Jesus as your personal Lord and Savior you will be saved. Jesus becomes our personal Lord and Savior at our Baptism. However, just saying that He is your Lord and Savior is not enough. In Matthew 7:21, Jesus tells us, "Not everyone who cries out 'Lord, Lord' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only he who does the will of my Father in heaven." Only if we try to live our lives as Jesus asks us to, will we be able to enter into heaven. Hearing this should be enough for us to want and to try to do God's will. If we cannot admit our need for God now, how are we going to admit our need for God and accept Him when we die. That is the question each one of us needs to ask ourselves today.

The Church teaches that, when we die, we will go either to Hell, to Purgatory, or straight to Heaven. We may ask 'What is Hell and for what reasons would a person go there? A person goes to Hell by totally rejecting God and the life which he has called us to live. Hell is total separation from God. It is a place in which our desires are never satisfied. I believe that in Hell a person is so engulfed in their own desires, whether they be sexual, or desires for power and control, or popularity, or whatever they may be, that they burn away at the person's soul and the person exists in total agony. For only in God do we experience complete satisfaction and happiness.

Many of us try to do the will of God but still fall into sin from time to time. What will happen to us? At the time of our death we will probably go to Purgatory where we will be cleansed from our sins, our impurities and imperfections, so that we may be able to enter into God's presence. We must endure this purification process because anything that is impure or imperfect cannot become part of that which is all perfect and all pure, that which is God. Once perfected, we then enter the kingdom of God.

Many people have probably gone through their purgation process here on earth. Those who have given their life for God through martyrdom, who have died for the kingdom of God, have already been cleansed and have entered into God's Kingdom. Once a person is in God's presence, they never want or desire anything else. They experience complete happiness and satisfaction through the glory of God.

Living the life Jesus asks us to live will not be easy, but He will give us the strength and courage to do it if we only ask Him to and also if we try to live our lives according to His teachings. How can we know that we are not being misled by the many who claim to be preaching in the name of Jesus? Jesus promised that He would be with His Church until the end of the world and that the powers of Hell would not prevail against it. We are the Church founded by Christ and He continues to guide us through the guidance of the Pope. Many people say that there isn't any difference between the Catholic Church and other Christian Churches. That is not so. Anyone who studies Church History can clearly see that Christ established one Church which came to be called the Catholic Church by the year 100 A.D. Because He promised it the guidance of the Holy Spirit, it is the only Church that can say that it teaches the truth as given to us by Jesus Christ Himself. May we always remain faithful to the teachings of Christ, the teachings of His Church. If we do this then we will have nothing to fear and it will make no difference when the end of the world comes, for we will be ready to die and to be with God, to fully abide in His love and share in eternal life.
