

#### Dear friends in Christ,

Thanksgiving week is upon us. Please try to attend Mass with your family to celebrate what Thanksgiving Day is all about...giving thanks to God. We will have Mass on Wednesday evening at 6:30 pm and on Thursday morning at 8:30 am. Come and give thanks to God and then afterwards celebrate with your family at home.

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, the last Sunday in the Church Liturgical Year. As we close out this year, it is the Church's hope that all of us have listened to the words of Jesus throughout the year and that our commitment to Jesus Christ, as King of our lives, has been re-affirmed.

But what does it mean that Jesus Christ is King and that we are His subjects, those whom He rules over? Today many people do not really understand what a King is or what purpose he serves. Today, kings have given way to presidents, governors, prime ministers, dictators, and other forms of leadership. All of these leaders do, in some way, possess kingly powers and authority, but none of them are equivalent to a king, especially the greatest King of all, Jesus Christ.

Because the people of Jesus' time were looking for an earthly king who would be a strong military leader and overthrow the Romans, Jesus turned out not to be what they had in mind. The inscription that Pilate had put over Jesus, "This is the King of the Jews", in a way, was correct. Jesus was and is a King in the line of King David, but Jesus is not a King over a certain geographical area as Pilate thought. Jesus is King over the whole world. The only problem is that most people do not recognize Jesus as their King, or if they do, they are not obedient to all of His commands.

The Kingship of Jesus is different than most other kingships in that, as King, Jesus serves His people in three ways.

First of all, Jesus as King, served us by saving us by dying on the Cross. Not many kings have been known to do that.

Secondly, Jesus continues to serve each of us through His Church. Jesus joins us together in a visible Body, of which He is the Head, as St. Paul says in the second reading in his letter to the Colossians: "It is he who is head of the body, the Church." St. Paul goes on to say: "And you are the Body of Christ. Every one of you is a member of it."

<u>Thirdly</u>, Jesus serves us by giving Himself to us in the mystery of the Eucharist. Jesus gives us His own Body as food for the journey through life every time we receive Him at Holy Communion. Jesus nourishes us and strengthens us so that we are able to serve Him and be protected by Him each day.

Many have rejected Jesus Christ as their King. And as any good King Jesus continues to wait for us with arms wide open as they were on the Cross. Are we willing to accept this invitation from Jesus or are we going to just pass through His Kingdom on Sundays then continue on without Him the rest of the week? The decision is for each of us to make. I pray that we will all accept Christ as our King every day of the week and that when our earthly life has ended we will hear the words of Jesus which the thief heard in today's gospel: "I assure you: this day you will be with me in paradise."

Pray the following prayer together with your family and dedicate your family to Jesus Christ our King.

#### Act of Dedication of the Human Race to Jesus Christ the King

Loving Jesus, Redeemer of the human race, look down upon us as we kneel before you on this feast day. We belong to you and we wish always to be yours. In order that we may be more closely united with you, each one of us freely consecrates himself today to your most Sacred Heart. We pray, Lord, that you will be king, not only of the faithful ones who have never abandoned you, but that you will be King also of those who have abandoned the faith. We pray especially for them, that they may soon return to their Father's house and to their Father's love. We pray also that you will be King of those who are kept away from the Church because of false opinions or misunderstandings. Call them back, Lord, to the truth and unity of the faith, so that soon there may once again be one flock and one Shepherd. Grant to your Church, Lord, assurance of freedom and immunity from harm. We pray for peace and tranquility among all the nations of the world. May all peoples praise your divine Heart which has loved us and saved us. To you be glory and honor forever. Amen.
