FROM THE DIOCESE OF AUSTIN: It has recently come to our attention that individuals have received emails that appear to be from the Bishop, requesting gift cards or other monetary items. These messages are form of phishing called "CEO Fraud". They are fraudulent and should be ignored. Basically, the hacker creates an email address and defines the properties (display name, from and reply-to addresses) to appear as though they are from the domain in question, in this case making it appear the message came from bishop@austindiocese.org. When this is done properly it isn't until you click reply (or look at the email headers) that you'll see the email came from a gmail / yahoo / etc. account and not from austindiocese.org. Below are links to some pertinent resources from KnowBe4, an end-user security training company, that add insight to the way we can police this situation. The Diocese is already partnering with KnowBe4 to provide training to all employees at the Pastoral Center and is currently strategizing a way to offer this service to the whole diocese.

Dear friends in Christ,

Listed in this bulletin are the Penance Services of the parishes in our deanery. Please plan on going to Confession sometime before Christmas. Here at Holy Trinity, we will have our Penance Service this Sunday, December 15, at 5 pm. It is one of the best ways that you can prepare your soul to celebrate the birth of the Savior. Our being cleansed of all sin in the Sacrament of Reconciliation brings joy to all the saints and angels in heaven. When we go to confession, we not only please God, but we make it possible for us to experience joy on a much deeper level and we experience the love and grace of God.

Today we celebrate the Third Sunday of Advent. "Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I say rejoice! The Lord is near!" (Philippians 4:4,5). This verse is taken from today's entrance antiphon. It expresses the theme of this Sunday's readings.

It seems that most of us seem to be a very forgetful people. Sometimes we are so forgetful that we even forget to be happy. It seems that so much of our lives is taken up with looking at problems, that we barely have time to sit back and just relish what is good about it all. It is so easy to get ourselves into a way of looking at life that the first thing we look for are the problems. There is so much that is good and beautiful, but the problems always seem to get our attention. Sometimes we forget to be happy. We look at the weeds in our lawn, rather than pay attention to the few beautiful flowers that are so wonderful to look at. Problems have a way of taking over. One problem reminds us of another problem. Sometimes one problem seems to cause another problem and so on, until that's all there is. But that's not the truth of how things are.

We can even get into this way of seeing things when we think about our faith and the Church. If every time you think or talk about the Church, the first thing that comes up are all the problems, then maybe it's time to stop and remember all of the wonderful gifts we have in the Church. It is so important for us as a community to remember our blessings. If we don't, then we lose the proper perspective of things within the Church and within our life.

On this third Sunday of Advent we are given a reminder and a promise of joy that comes from the God who has come and is coming. Isaiah is full of the promise of joy. He calls for the wilderness and the wasteland to bloom and bring forth flowers. He even says that it should be rejoicing and singing. And then in the Gospel, Jesus reminds the disciples of John that the blind see, the lame walk, lepers are cured, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the Good News is proclaimed to the poor. Jesus is the one who has brought all of the promises of Isaiah to completion. During this Advent Season we are celebrating the fact that Christ has already come. Evil no longer rules the world. Christ does. We are called upon to believe that God is the God of life and joy, not of death and gloom.

As we prepare to celebrate Christmas, the coming of the Prince of Peace and the source of our joy, perhaps we should think of creating some gesture that would reflect in some small way the meaning of this feast. There is no better gift to give to Jesus than the gift of your own self. See what you need to do to make some sign that you believe that Christ has come and is still present in our world. If you do this, then when Christmas arrives, you will know in a very real way that some of the wilderness in our world has been allowed to flourish and bloom.

K úvaze: Je možné, aby ten, kdo přináší dobré věci, byl odmítnut? Možné to je, když se nám to "nehodí do krámu", do našich představ. Odmítnout Krista, protože neodpovídá našim "očekáváním", je tím nejčastějším kamenem úrazu ? včera jako dnes. A dokonce tak velký prorok jako Jan Křtitel měl "s Kristem problémy": kdo by tedy neměl? Vždyť Kristus nás stále vyvádí z konceptu: Jan očekával okamžitý konec, rázné zakročení vůči hříšníkům, a Kristus koná něco jiného. Jiný příklad: u kříže lidé chtěli zázrak, a Kristus opět jedná jinak - žádný zázrak neudělá. Šťastný ten, kdo se nepohoršuje nad Kristem, kdo nad ním nezlomí hůl! Ano, je možné opustit Krista, protože se nám nelíbí, protože je jiný, než bychom chtěli. Přijmout ho vyžaduje stále novou otevřenost, schopnost překročit svoje schémata. Kristus je dnes jiný než včera ?Od nás se proto vyžaduje velká důvěra, doslova slepá důvěra, která často není schopná vidět, pochopit: uvěříme spíš Kristu nebo svým "představám"?

Očekávat Krista znamená někdy pasivně čekat, ale někdy vyjít - jak se o tom mluví v prvním čtení. A někdy to opět znamená udělat skok ? víry, důvěřovat Kristu, který mi zrovna ukazuje svoji novou, mně dosud neznámou tvář. Vidíme tedy, že očekávat není tak snadné, vyžaduje to neustálou bdělost, vnímavost pro ten či onen krok, který se ode mě v tuto chvíli vyžaduje. Jan Křtitel zvládl "perfektně" první kroky: hlásal příchod Mesiáše, rozpoznal ho při křtu. Pak už začal mít s Kristem "problémy": je to opravdu on? Nespletl jsem se? I tak velký prorok jako on potřeboval pomoc "zvnějšku", aby se neztratil ve svých "úvahách" a názorech. Nějak podobně můžeme být na tom i my: na začátku svého prvního či druhého obrácení (v dospělosti) jsme asi velkoryse přijali Krista, se širokým srdcem, s naprostou poddaností jeho slovům, jeho vůli ("jak on chce"). Postupem času jsme možná narazili na "zádrhele", začali jsme narážet na Kristovo evangelium: ono je totiž nebezpečné, protože dělá křížek přes rozpočet? A šťastný ten, kdo má odvahu dát Kristu šanci, neskoncovat s ním. Málokdo z nás se asi rozhodne pro jednoznačné odmítnutí Krista jako někteří farizeové, spíš se vydáme na cestu, spíš "necestu" indiference, netečnosti. A pokud jsme v takovém stavu, tak advent volá: Probuď se! Zkus to s Kristem ještě jednou!

During my first Christmas here at Holy Trinity, I was absolutely amazed by the beautiful way the church was decorated. As a newcomer, I asked who decorates the church for Christmas. When I was told that the teenagers of the parish decorated the church, no one was more astonished than me. Let teenagers decorate a sacred and old-fashioned church for a major holy day?? Whose idea was that? No matter whose idea it was, they do a great job each year, and it remains a wonderful, true tradition here at Holy Trinity.

After the last Mass on the Fourth Sunday of Advent, the current Confirmation classes will gather for the task of preparing our church for our Christmas celebrations. First, they go to the attic and bring down all of the various boxes full of wreaths, trees and all sorts of Christmas decorations. The Confirmation II class is in charge and they take the lead on where things should go. It is so amazing to hear the kids discussing what looks good where and how, where some wreath should go, does it look the same as last year or what they remember from when they were younger. The older (and taller) boys usually climb the ladders and put the hanging decorations up. While standing below them and handing them items, the other teens are providing direction.

The manger, which is quite heavy, is put on the altar by some of our handy gentleman parishioners, but the placement of the figures requires the special touches of the girls of the Confirmation classes. Father Stephen keeps Baby Jesus in the Sacristy with him until Christmas and the three wise men are kept on the other side of the Altar so that they can journey slowly to the Christ child. Placing animals and shepherds in the manger requires a lot of concentration and much discussion.

Finally, when all of the trees are wired, the wreathes are hung, the communion rail is decorated, the pews are adorned with greenery, and the manger is complete with figures and straw, the Christmas lights are turned on for a brief moment to make sure they all work. A sense of wonder and awe fills the room and the teens know they have set the stage for a beautiful liturgical celebration.

This tradition is one that truly is so very meaningful here at Holy Trinity as it gives the teens a real sense of ownership and purpose. They know that the parish is their home, too, and they take pride in making it look beautiful ... not only for themselves and their families, but for all who come to visit this very special place called Holy Trinity Catholic Church of Corn Hill, Texas.
