PROTLIFE

As you may have seen or heard, we at Holy Trinity, along with Armor of God Catholic Radio, are sponsoring one of the biggest parish-hosted speaking events in recent memory. The false compassion of the Doctor Assisted Suicide movement, which many thought had ended with the infamous **Dr. Jack Kevorkian's** 1999 prison sentence, was

actually just getting started. In a country that has been desensitized by abortion, assisted suicide hasn't been met with the same resistance and is picking up steam around the country. As with abortion, the well-funded assisted suicide movement promotes half-truths and often downright lies. Yet, over the past month, as we have been speaking with parishes around Central Texas, we are often surprised by how little is known about the proliferation of this movement and the threat to society's most vulnerable. Many think that in a state with a lengthy pro-life record like Texas that we have nothing to be concerned about. Think again! The voting demographic in Texas is rapidly changing, the largest assisted suicide lobby group in the US is now here in greater Austin, and the potential of a Supreme Court decision always looms. The Court has already ruled against a challenge to Oregon's assisted suicide law by the Bush administration in 2006. Please consider joining us next Saturday evening, January 11, at 6:30 p.m. in the PAC Bldg, as we welcome Canadian documentary film maker, and international speaker, Kevin Dunn, in his only Texas appearance. He is joining us just days before he makes his return to the global Catholic television network, EWTN, to discuss this important topic. See – and share – the enclosed flyer!

Dear friends in Christ,

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! Today we celebrate this great feast of Epiphany, a day where, in some countries, gifts are exchanged. Today, though, we celebrate the day when Christ was shown to the world. It was a star that stirred the curiosity of the three men, known as astrologers, kings, magi, or wise men, and led them to Bethlehem, to the manger where Jesus lay. However, this was no ordinary star. This star is a signal from heaven to earth. It inspires these three men to make a journey of thousands of miles. This star even frightened King Herod. Why did God choose to use a star to announce the birth of His Son, Jesus?

The ancient cultures believed the stars were gods, and that the fate of men on earth was controlled by those gods. Stars that stayed in formation, or constellation, were considered good omens. Lost travelers could find their way home by the guide of these predictable stars. But when stars moved, such as comets or planets, the gods were restless. And when the gods were restless, men were afraid, for the ancient gods were dangerous. When bad things happened on earth, most people believed one of these moving stars caused the problem. Our word "disaster", which means "bad star" or "evil celestial influence", is a reflection of this old belief. It is a silly old superstition, isn't it? At the time of Jesus' birth, astrology was big business. An astrologer was an expert in the art of mapping stars. This skill made the astrologer a man of great mystery, a wise man, with kingly status, and often brought him great wealth. The Magi in today's gospel reading were such men. When they observed the special sign in the heavens, they assumed it was the sign of the birth of a special child. Their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh were fitting for royalty. Someone once said that only WISE MEN would have brought such gifts. If it had been WISE WOMEN, they would have brought diapers and blankets and baby food! Maybe so. But the wise men brought gold for a king, incense for a priest, and myrrh, which is a balm for suffering and death. All three of these gifts reveal something to us about Jesus. Jesus is the King of the world, He is the Priest for all time, and He did suffer and die for you and me. Did the wise men know all this? Probably not. But they did know this child must be a special child.

Their journey to Bethlehem had some unexpected turns. The wise men assumed a kingly child would be found in a castle, in a capital city, born to a family of royal lineage. When the star moved them toward Bethlehem, they turned aside instead to Jerusalem, the home of King Herod. It was difficult for them to imagine a royal child born in a tiny shepherd village, to a poor couple, in a stable for animals. Jesus is born among the poor and the outcast and it is the wealthy astrologers who are first to recognize and worship Jesus in Matthew's Gospel. Sometimes in our life, God calls us to follow Him to unexpected places in unexpected ways. So always expect the unexpected in your life.

The star came to rest over Jesus. For us, Jesus is the Star of the world. To know Christ, and to worship Him, is the destination of every life's quest. And notice that, after having worshipped Jesus, the wise men left for home by a different way. I am sure that this experience must have had some impact on their lives. And so it is with us. When a person has met Jesus, and truly worshipped Him, and offered to Him the treasures of their heart, they too, live their life in this world in a different way. You cannot go home the same way again.

It is the tradition that on the Feast of the Epiphany that we bless our homes by marking them with blessed chalk with the current year and the initials of the Three Wise Men -- Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar -- and these letters also stand for the Latin phrase "Christus Mansionem Benedicat", which means "May Christ bless this dwelling". The initials of the Wise Men in Czech are KMB. Mark your home above the front door so that all may know that your home is a Christian home. With this bulletin you will find the blessing prayer and instructions on how to mark your homes.

Are your Christmas lights still shining? The Christmas Season continues until Sunday, January 12, 2020. Keeps those lights on until the end of the Christmas Season to give witness to the true Light of the world, Jesus Christ. Let your lights be an Epiphany of the Lord to those who see them.

Long-Range Plan for Holy Trinity Parish: At our June 14, 2018, Pastoral Council Meeting, the idea that we needed a Long-Range Plan for our parish was discussed. With all the new homes being built in our area, we know that our parish is going to grow. A Long-Range Plan Committee was formed, and, in August of 2018, we sought guidance from the Diocese of Austin. They recommended a few architect firms for us to contact to help us with the planning. RBDR Architects from Waco was chosen by the Committee and the Pastoral Council. For the past 10 months, they have been gathering information from parishioners, statistics for future growth in Williamson County, Jarrell ISD, Georgetown ISD, Jarrell, Texas, and also from our weekend Mass attendance count. After many meetings and discussion, a Long-Range Plan is now in existence for our Parish. This plan will be presented to the parishioners of our parish on Monday, January 27, at 6:30 p.m. in the PAC. All parishioners are invited and encouraged to attend. May we move forward, in unity, continuing to meet the needs of our parish and continuing to build the kingdom of God in Corn Hill and the surrounding area.

Epiphany House Blessing

Using blessed chalk,
mark the current year and the initials of the
Magi above the outside doorways to your home.
Place a cross in between each of the letters.
It should look something like this.

20+C+M+B+20

After completing the above markings, pray the following prayer:

May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us; and may we seek and serve, in everyone we meet, that same Jesus who is Lord of all people forever and ever. Amen.

The legendary names of the three Magi are:

Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar.

(KMB in Czech)

The initials C-M-B also stand for the Latin words

"Christus Mansionem Benedicat" which means:

"May Christ bless this dwelling."

The markings over the doors should be left all year round as a sign that yours is a Christian home.
