Since most of us are not able to attend Mass publicly and, therefore, aren't able to physically receive the Eucharist, please remember that, when you are watching Mass live, you should say the following prayer during Holy Communion:

Act of Spiritual Communion

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things, and desire to receive you into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace you as if you were already there and unite myself wholly to you. Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.

The **church building is open** during the week and weekend and you are welcome to come and pray, have a time of adoration, etc, but please be vigilant of the maximum occupancy of 10 people rule so that we can remain open!

The **parish office** is only open right now on Tuesdays & Fridays, but we are still answering the phone and emails the rest of the time, so don't hesitate to contact us if needed.

Just to confirm, our May Hospitality Sunday and Senior Citizens' Supper are both canceled.

Dear friends in Christ,

Peace be with you! The month of May begins this Thursday and it is the month of our Blessed Virgin Mary. Everyone is encouraged to pray the rosary daily with your family or alone. Ask Mary to intercede for us in this time of pandemic.

Fr. Brian Eilers, Pastor of St. Patrick Parish in Hutto, has moved here to Holy Trinity and will live here and continue ministering to the people of St. Patrick Parish. Fr. Brian and I both belong to the priestly fraternity of Cor Jesu (Heart of Jesus). In this fraternity the priests support each other in their ministry and live according to a Rule of Life. One form of this fraternity of priests is that the priests, two or more, live together in a community setting in a Cor Jesu household. This gives us the opportunity to pray together daily and offer support and sharing of ideas on a daily basis. Fr. Brian is one of the founding members of this fraternity and I have been a member almost since its beginning in 2002. You may not see him very much since he will be at his parish most of the time during the day. May we truly exemplify the Heart of Jesus in our priestly life that we share.

In today's Gospel we hear about how the two disciples of Jesus walked with Him on the road to Emmaus. They did not recognize Him at first, but "They had come to know him in the breaking of the bread." This is why we always need to be conscious of what the Mass is all about and why we are here to participate in this celebration. The Mass is truly a place where we encounter the Risen Lord, in a very special and unique way, just as the two disciples encountered Jesus on the road to Emmaus and then recognized Him in the breaking of the bread. We could say this is the first Mass Jesus celebrated following His resurrection. Because of Jesus, the Mass is the best thing we do in life. The Mass should not be something we have to do, but instead, the Mass should be something we want to do as often as possible. It is truly a special encounter with God. Unfortunately, there are those who have the idea of Mass only as an obligation, rather than the great treasure that it is.

This special encounter with God began when Jesus was with his Apostles at the Last Supper. He prayed for them and He prayed with them. Then He fulfilled His great promise and instituted the Mass. He gave them His Body and Blood. He commanded that they continue this Mass until the end of time. That is why we are here. We are keeping Jesus' command. We are celebrating the Eucharist.

If you ever study the history of the Protestant revolt, you will read how priests were hanged for offering the Sacrifice of the Mass. In England and Ireland, it was forbidden and had to be done in secret at the risk of losing one's life and the risk of having one's property confiscated. Yet, those who had the faith were willing to take this risk in order to receive their Lord in Holy Communion. The same is true in many parts of the world today. Would we be willing to do the same in order to receive the Body and Blood of Christ at Mass? You cannot compare this with your inability to receive Holy Communion due to this coronavirus pandemic. This is not the same and one should not make comparisons between the two.

At the Last Supper with His Apostles Jesus took bread, broke it, and made it His Body. He took wine, blessed it, and made it His Blood. He commanded His Apostles to do this always as a way of remembering Him and as <u>THE</u> way of making Him present to them forever. When the early Christians did this, they referred to it as the "Breaking of the Bread" as we heard in today's gospel. Jesus gives Himself to us in the form of a meal because sharing a meal together is one of the greatest expressions of friendship. We should try to see that in the assembly of people gathered here at Mass, how we are friends with one another and united with each other in the name of Jesus.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "The Sunday celebration of the Lord's Day and his Eucharist is at the heart of the Church's life. 'Sunday is the day on which the paschal mystery is celebrated in light of the apostolic tradition and is to be observed as the foremost holy day of obligation in the universal Church." Thus, the "Breaking of the Bread" is the main reason we gather here each week and each day. St. John Chrysostom says, "You cannot pray at home as at church, where there is a great multitude, where exclamations are cried out to God as from one great heart, and where there is something more: the union of minds, the accord of souls, the bond of charity, the prayers of priests." And so, in our parish churches, the most visible sign of our being recognized as people who have the Catholic faith is to come together for Mass and share the "Breaking of Bread" as Jesus did at the Last Supper. The Mass is the heart and center of Catholic worship. It makes the difference in our belief.

When we receive the Eucharist together, receiving Holy Communion, we are participating in the greatest act of worship we can do together as Catholics. Theologians have referred to the Eucharist as "the bread of angels," "bread from heaven"; it has been called the medicine of immortality for Jesus said, "He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me." It is a promise from Jesus that He will take us to heaven if we receive Him and follow Him. What a great and wonderful promise and gift our Lord has given us. Let us always show our appreciation to our Lord for this great gift by spending a few minutes in prayer giving thanks to Jesus for giving us His Body and Blood. We should never receive Holy Communion at Mass and then just walk straight out the door. This is like slapping Jesus in the face after you have received Him. Go back to the pew and say a prayer and stay at Mass until the prayer after Mass is completed. After all, you would not go to someone's home and eat dinner with them and then after you take the last bite get up and run out the door. No, you would stay a little while longer visiting with them before you leave and thanking them for the wonderful meal. Even more so we should stay with the Lord until all is completed, thank Him, and then go home and live what we have received.

K úvaze: Cesta emauzských učedníků je i pro nás ... cestou k poznání Krista. Učedníci se cítí vedle tohoto neznámého člověka dobře, a proto chtějí, aby s nimi zůstal. A jejich prosba nevyjde naprázdno a něčeho nečekaného se dočká. U stolu při lámání chleba se poutník konečně dá poznat. A ihned jim zmizí z očí: už ho nepotřebují mít před očima, protože ho vidí srdcem, dokonce mají ho v srdci. Toto setkání je tak strhující, že nemohou mlčet o tom, co viděli a slyšeli, a proto se rychle vydají na cestu k apoštolům (ještě tu hodinu se vrátili!). I nás toto velikonoční období zve, abychom nově odhalili Krista v jeho slově a v eucharistii. Ani Boží slovo, ani eucharistie nejsou vůbec slabými prostředky Kristovy moci. Naopak. Jen máme na svém srdci závoj, který brání vidět živého Krista. A o odstranění tohoto závoje můžeme prosit i my, abychom poznali Vzkříšeného, který se i teď setkává s námi: tehdy jako dnes v podobě poutníka, kráčejícího po našem boku, a přece nepoznaný.
