Dear friends in Christ,

Thank you to everyone who worked hard to make our June Fundraiser such a great success. We apologize that we ran out of food so quickly. We had no idea how many would come due to the Coronavirus and it being just the drive thru, but the response was amazing. Thank you to everyone who help to prepare the meal and the to-go boxes and those who set up for traffic control. All of your work and efforts are much appreciated. May God bless all of you in return.

Today the Church celebrates the Feast of Corpus Christi, the Body and Blood of Christ. Since the time of the Apostles the Church has believed and taught that Jesus is present, body and blood, soul and divinity, in the Holy Communion that we receive at Mass. The bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Jesus during the consecration in the Eucharistic Prayer. The appearance remains the same, but the substance changes. This is not a symbolic presence, but, it is the REAL PRESENCE of Jesus. That is why we take such care of the Blessed Sacrament, the Eucharist, and offer to the Real Presence of Jesus our Adoration and Praise. That is why we have our annual Corpus Christi Procession to give a more public witness of our belief in this Real Presence. The early Church Fathers wrote about this presence, as did St. Paul in his letter to the Corinthians (1 Cor. 10:16–17, 11:23–29). May we all be careful of how we speak about the Holy Communion that we receive at Mass. We should speak of it as the Body of Christ and the Blood of Christ, not just bread and wine. Jesus continues to feed and nourish us so that we may have the strength we need to live the life He has given us to live. We pray that one day all Christians will once again believe what the Apostles and the early Church believed about Jesus' Real Presence in Holy Communion.

Donald Schwager writes: [Why did Jesus offer himself as "food and drink"? The Jews were scandalized and the disciples were divided when Jesus said "*unless you eat my flesh and drink my blood, you have no life in you.*" What a hard saying, unless you understand who Jesus is and why he calls himself the *bread of life*. The miracle of the multiplication of the loaves (John 6:3-13), when Jesus said the blessing, broke and distributed the loaves through his disciples to feed the multitude, is a sign that prefigured the superabundance of the unique bread of the Eucharist, or Lord's Supper. The Gospel of John has no account of the Last Supper meal (just the foot washing ceremony and Jesus' farewell discourse). Instead, John quotes extensively from Jesus' teaching on the bread of life.]

[...At the last supper when Jesus blessed the cup of wine, he gave it to his disciples saying, "*Drink of it, all of you, for this is my blood of the covenant, poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins*" (Matthew 26:28). Jesus was pointing to the sacrifice he was about to make on the cross, when he would shed his blood for us – thus pouring himself out and giving himself to us – as an atoning sacrifice for our sins and the sins of the world. His death on the cross fulfilled the sacrifice of the paschal (passover) lamb whose blood spared the Israelites from death in Egypt. Paul the Apostle tells us that "Christ, our paschal lamb, has been sacrificed" (1 Corinthians 5:7). Paul echoes the words of John the Baptist who called Jesus the "*Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world*" (John 1:29). Jesus made himself an offering and sacrifice, a gift that was truly pleasing to the Father. He "*offered himself without blemish to God*" (Hebrews 9:14) and "*gave himself as a sacrifice to God*" (Ephesians 5:2).]

[Jesus chose the time of the Jewish Feast of Passover to fulfill what he had announced at Capernaum – giving his disciples his body and his blood as the true bread of heaven. Jesus' passing over to his Father by his death and resurrection – the new passover – is anticipated in the Last Supper and celebrated in the Eucharist or Lord's Supper, which fulfills the Jewish Passover and anticipates the final Passover of the church in the glory of God's kingdom. When the Lord Jesus commands his disciples to eat his flesh and drink his blood, he invites us to take his life into the very center of our being. That life which he offers is the very life of God himself. Do you hunger for the *bread of life*?]

The Season of Summer begins in about a week from now and it has definitely gotten hot. Usually during summertime, we are tempted to dress rather lightly or skimpy for Mass. We need to remember that, as we come to Mass, we come to worship God and to receive His Son in Holy Communion. We should dress in a way that shows respect for God. The general rule that I believe is appropriate is that anyone over 6 years of age should not wear shorts to Mass. Also, girls and ladies should wear blouses or dresses that are appropriate for Mass, nothing strapless or no spaghetti straps. Some say that God doesn't care what you wear to Mass. Well, that may be so. But the question should be "do you love God enough that you care what you wear to Mass and are you willing to do something special for Him?" Do you stand in honor in His presence? Also, if you dress appropriately for Mass you will not be cold in church from the air conditioning. If the air is blowing on you and you are cold, try to move to another part of the church.

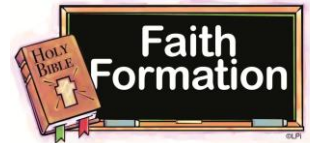

Do všech zákoutí tohoto světa. K lidem, kteří jsou nám přátelsky nakloněni, i k těm ostatním. Protože on chce, aby všichni lidé došli k poznání pravdy a ke spáse. Aby se všichni mohli s ním - vzkříšeným - trvale radovat. A proto nás, křesťany, potřebuje a proto nás vysílá do světa, když nás přítom sytí svým tělem a svou krví. (Pastorace.cz)

Our program may have looked very different these past few months, but in many ways it was the same. We still celebrated our Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Holy Communion with our Second Graders. Our RCIA participants celebrated the reception of their Sacraments during the Pentecost Vigil. We are currently waiting for a Confirmation date from the Bishop's office, but I am sure that will take place soon. Learning about our Catholic faith did not stop. We had to learn in different ways, but in the end it worked.

Now everything is opening up and most importantly, so is our church. It is time for families to come back. Through the past few months, we have enjoyed watching Father Stephen on TV and attending Mass from our living rooms. Now we must remind our children that as Catholics, the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass truly belongs being celebrated as a group, with our Priests and in person. We know that the Eucharist is so very important to our faith and for that we must gather together in church. We are closely following the safety guidelines and there is social distancing taking place with every other pew marked off, masks being worn, and hand sanitizer available at every entrance.
