Dear friends in Christ.

Peace be with you. This weekend is our Bazaar to-go Meal and Raffle. We welcome all who are coming for the to-go meal. May you all have safe travels. Thank you for your support.

This week we celebrate the feast day of a few well known saints. Monday - St. Matthew; Wednesday - St. Pius of Pietrelcina (Padre Pio); Saturday - Sts. Cosmas and Damian. May we follow their example in living our life of faith and may they intercede and pray for us.

How many times have you heard the statement "It is not fair"? You may hear it said by someone every day of your life. You who are parents probably hear your children say it quite often. I have heard it said at the dinner table "It is not fair" when as child did not get to sit in the place they wanted to sit but their sister or brother got to sit there instead. I hear "It is not fair" sometimes from people who are suffering from cancer or some other illness.

When will we just stop fighting this inequality and accept the truth? Life is not set up to be fair, not if "fair" means that everyone gets the same thing. People really need to understand this in today's day and time as so many are crying out because life is not fair. Some will get cancer. A few will strike it rich. Some will be born beautiful. Others will have natural athletic talent. And, of course, a precious few will be rich, beautiful, athletic and healthy. While some others will be poor, uncoordinated, and ordinary. Our sense of fairness and God's fairness are often two different things in life.

And oftentimes we think that what we believe fairness to be is the way that it should be and not the way that God has it to be.

We see this in today's gospel passage. I invite you to read the scripture passage immediately before and after this parable. In the preceding section of scripture the disciples ask about their reward for the sacrifices they made to follow Jesus. And following this parable the mother of James and John asks Jesus for special places of privilege for her two sons. Jesus is troubled by people trying to get a position, trying to be first in line when the blessings are distributed. So He responds, "The first will be last, and the last will be first." In other words, Jesus turns such speculation around. In things of this world it may sound like good business to try for first place. But the philosophy of "look out for yourself" and "the early bird gets the worm" is not the way the Kingdom of God works, according to Jesus.

So He drives home the point with the story of the farm laborers. Some of them labor for twelve hours, others only work nine or six or three hours. Those who were hired later were very fortunate to have gotten hired for any work that day. But the farmer in today's story kept going back for more workers. And when he pays them, he pays those who came last, first, and the same amount as the others who had worked all day. Probably those who worked all day thought they would get twice as much. How could he pay them the same amount? Though they were hired for this sum, and though they were grateful for a job when they were hired, that gratitude evaporated under the hot sun of their envy. So they say, "Master, you are not fair!"

Today's parable, though, is not about fairness, but about the generosity of God. This unpredictable outrageous generosity of God strikes you differently depending on where you are standing in line. But you can be sure of this, when we line up before God on that final payday, you will be glad just to be in a line where you will receive just what God has promised you. And I do not believe that you will want to get out of that line.

Let us be a people that is thankful for everything we receive, no matter how little or how much it may seem to be here on earth, for our reward will be great in heaven, more than any of us can imagine, and all of us will want to accept the fairness of God and not care who is first or who is last in His Kingdom. We will just be glad to be there!

Generosity – Divine Intimacy Meditation ROMAN CATHOLIC SPIRITUAL DIRECTION

Generosity: the Presence of God

Fill my heart with Your spirit of generosity, O Lord, so that I may know how to give myself wholly to Your service.

Generosity is very similar to magnanimity but has a wider scope, including not only great things, but anything which concerns the service of God. It urges the soul to do all with the greatest devotion. Generosity is the virtue which teaches us to spend ourselves, without counting the cost, without ever saying, "It is enough"; it teaches us to give ourselves completely, and to work with the maximum of love, not only in great things but also in little ones, even the least. Only when we are not hampered by the bonds of selfishness can we be really generous, that is, capable of giving ourself wholly to the service of our ideal, to the accomplishment of our mission, without thinking of self, without letting ourself be detained by personal preoccupations. If we really understood that our vocation comes from God, and that He has prepared for us all the graces we need to correspond with it most perfectly, we should not allow ourselves to be disheartened by the sacrifices it requires. Selfishness, preoccupation with self, and discouragement are all enemies of generosity; they are "earth and lead" which weigh down our spiritual life, making it more fatiguing and keeping us from soaring to the heights. Why should we reduce ourselves to walking at "a hen's pace" (Teresa of Jesus, Life, 13) when God has made us capable of flying like the eagle? St. Teresa laughs somewhat mischievously at those who are afraid of doing too much for God, and under pretext of prudence, measure their acts of virtue with a yardstick: "You need never fear that they will kill themselves; they are eminently reasonable folk! Their love is not yet ardent enough to overwhelm their reason. How I wish ours would make us dissatisfied with this habit of always serving God at a snail's pace! As long as we do that we shall never get to the end of the road. Do you think that if we could get from one country to another in a week, it would be advisable to take a year over it?" (Interior Castle, III, 2). The quickest way to reach our goal is generosity, which is the fruit of love and at the same time the generator of love.

"O Lord, how little we do for You! Indeed we cannot consider as signs of great virtue and mortification, these little acts which are of no weight or bulk, like grains of salt which a bird might carry in its beak. Sometimes we attribute importance to trifling things we do for You which, however numerous they may be, cannot be considered of much value. I am like that myself and I forget Your favors at every moment. I do not say that in Your great mercy, You do not value these little acts of virtue; but I have no wish to set store by them myself, or even to notice when I do them, since they are nothing.

"Forgive me, then, O Lord, and blame me not if I try to take comfort from anything I do, since I am of no real service to You: if I served You in great matters, I would set no store by these nothings. Blessed are they who serve You by great deeds! If merely envying them and desiring to imitate them counted in my favor, I should not be wanting in pleasing You! But I am of no worth, my Lord; do You put value into what I do since You have such love for me.

"O my God, grant that I may no longer be content with serving You in a small way, but let me do so to the greatest extent of my powers. Help me to make You a complete gift of my soul, emptying it of everything, so that You may take out and put in just what You like, as You would with something of Your own. You refuse to force our will, You take what we give You, but You do not give Yourself wholly until we give ourselves wholly to You. You like everything to be done in order, and You do not work within a soul unless it is wholly Yours, and keeps nothing back" (Teresa of Jesus, Life, 39 – 20 – Way of Perfection, 28).

"O most loving Word of God, teach me to be generous, to serve You as You deserve: to give and not to count the cost, to fight and not to heed the wounds, to toil and not to seek for rest, to labor and not to ask for any other reward save that of knowing that I do Your holy will" (St. Ignatius).
