Failure to pay the annual upkeep fee will result in a parishioner being charged to be buried at HTC (\$1500 casket / \$250 urn); once an individual turns 18 years of age, even if they are still living in their parents' home, they are considered to be their own parish family and should, therefore, fulfill the responsibilities as any other parish family and pay the annual contribution to the HTC Cemetery Fund."

All Soul's Memorial Envelopes are available by the bulletins and <u>must be turned in by Wednesday, October 28</u>. The names offered will be prayed for throughout the month of November.

Prayer Before the Election

We pray for discernment so that we may choose leaders who hear your Word, live your love, and keep in the ways of your truth as they follow in the steps of Jesus and his Apostles and guide us to your Kingdom of justice and peace. We ask this in the name of your Son, Jesus Christ, and through the power of the Holy Spirit. Amen

Dear friends in Christ,

During this month of October we celebrate the month of the Rosary. Why should we pray the Rosary? Because it is a meditation on the life of Jesus and Mary. The prayers of the Rosary come from the Bible as well and are an expression of our life of faith. Just by reflecting on the mysteries of the Rosary you will cover the entire life of Jesus, from the moment of conception to His ascension into Heaven. So, pray the Rosary daily and enter into the fullness of the life of Jesus Christ. Mary wants all of us to have a closer relationship with her Son, that's why she gave us the Rosary to meditate upon.

October is also Respect Life Month. Let us all learn what the Church teaches about life issues, whether they are about abortion, birth control, in vitro fertilization, vasectomies, embryonic stem cell research, the death penalty, the elderly, the dying, the poor, immigration, the health care reform, and many other issues. All of these are important, but abortion is the most serious because it is the killing of a baby in the womb of its mother. It is the killing of the most innocent of life. Here in the U.S.A. we tolerate the killing of over 3,300 innocent babies every day. Let us pray that the eyes of all may be opened to this horrible tragedy that takes place every day. May the laws of our country be changed soon.

This month is also Czech Heritage Month. For those of us who are of Czech/Moravian heritage may we appreciate those who have gone before us and have given us our unique culture and language.

Here is a little meditation by Donald Schwager on this Sunday's Gospel about the tenants in the vineyard of the Lord: What does Jesus' parable tell us about God and the way he deals with his people? First, it tells us of God's generosity and trust. The vineyard is well equipped with everything the tenants need. The owner went away and left the vineyard in the hands of the tenants. God, likewise, trusts us enough to give us freedom to run life as we choose. This parable also tells us of God's patience and justice. Not once, but many times he forgives the tenants their debts. But while the tenants take advantage of the owner's patience, his judgment and justice prevail in the end.

Jesus foretold both his death and his ultimate triumph. He knew he would be rejected by his own people and be killed, but he also knew that would not be the end. After rejection would come glory – the glory of resurrection and ascension to the right hand of the Father. The Lord continues to bless his people today with the gift of his kingdom. And he promises that we will bear much fruit if we abide in him and remain faithful to him (see John 15:1-11). He entrusts each of us with his gifts and grace and he gives each of us a particular work to do in his vineyard – the body of Christ. He promises that our labor, especially what we do for him, will not be in vain if we persevere with faith to the end (see 1 Corinthians 15:58). We can expect trials and difficulties as we labor for the Lord, and even persecution from those who oppose God's kingdom. But in the end, we will see triumph. Do you labor for the Lord with joyful hope and with confidence in his victory?

The tenants in this Gospel were the Jewish religious leaders. They failed to be good tenants of the Kingdom of God. They seized God's Son, Jesus, and had the Roman soldiers to kill Him. Jesus tells them in this parable that because of their neglect of the vineyard they, the religious leaders, will be cast out of the vineyard, God's Kingdom, and it will be given to others, the Church, to produce good fruit. Now that we are the current tenants of God's vineyard, we must labor diligently with faith, trust, and hope, so as to build His Kingdom on this earth. Are you a good worker in the vineyard of the Lord? If not, it will be taken away from you. Be a good worker in the vineyard by living as a faithful witness and disciple of Jesus in all you say and do.

Kritériem není jen okamžitý užitek ("...dědictví bude naše"), ale spravedlnost a pravdivost. Copak vinaři nedomysleli, že jednou přijde sám Pán vinice? (Vira.cz)
