



Dear friends in Christ,

May the peace and love of our Lord be with each of you. Tuesday, February 2, is the **Feast of the Presentation of the Lord**. Try to attend Mass to honor our Lord Jesus as we celebrate His being presented in the Temple and consecrated to God. This feast is also known as Candlemas day. It is the tradition of the Church to bless candles at this Mass that will be used at Mass and at home throughout the year. So, bring your candles and place them on the table in the sanctuary and I will bless them during Mass.

Wednesday, February 3, is the **Feast of St. Blaise**. St. Blaise was a bishop in Sebaste in Armenia in the late 200's and early 300's. He was a very holy man. He was also known for working several miracles to save the lives of people. One miracle was when he saved a boy from choking on a fish bone. No one could get the bone out, but Blaise was able to save the boy's life. On the feast of St. Blaise, it is our tradition to bless the throats of the faithful. We will have the blessing of the throats only on Wednesday, February 3, at the end of Mass. So, if you would like to have your throat blessed please come to Mass on Wednesday.

In today's Gospel Jesus does an exorcism by casting out an unclean spirit from a man. Oftentimes it is the unclean spirits, evil spirits, that give testimony to who Jesus is. They truly know the truth about Jesus and recognize Him as the Son of God. That is why in today's Gospel the unclean spirit says, "I know who you are -- the Holy One of God." Jesus, being both God and Man, has authority over these evil spirits even in His humanity. This, of course, makes these spirits all the more angry as they see it as an act of humiliation that a human being would have authority over them. We too, through the name of Jesus, can cast out these demons from our life. But, we can only do it in Jesus' name. That is why God has given that authority to the Church, to those who have been consecrated in Christ by Ordination. The person must be in the state of complete grace for this to happen. That is why it is reserved to a very small number of priests to perform exorcisms. They must be living a very holy life in the example of our Lord Jesus Christ to its fullness. This is not something to play around with. May we all try to live this holiness of life so that we are all in constant union with Jesus and with His Church and thus avoid the dangers of the evil one. As St. Paul says in the second reading today in his letter to the Corinthians, "...be holy in both body and spirit." He is saying that the person who is not married should only be anxious about pleasing the Lord. He or she is free from trying to please their spouse since they are single, so that all their attention should be on doing the will of God and serving Him. This is but one of the reasons that the Church ask that priests and religious brothers and sisters, not be married, so that they can devote themselves completely to the service of God. Please pray that all priests, religious brothers, and religious sisters can be faithful to their calling.

Creating a Sacred Space in Your Home

St. Theresa Parish in Austin has created and shared with us this resource for living in and building a domestic church. This information on the importance of establishing a sacred space in your home was originally shared with their parish community in the Spring of 2020. Setting Up a Prayer Table/Corner in the Home (from Our Sunday Visitor)



A few sacred tangible items placed in view makes praying more touchable for our kids. A prayer table or prayer corner set up in a gathering area of the home can help to draw our attention to the sacred rather than the secular.

To create this prayer corner, simply place a small table in a room that best suits your needs. A beautiful icon or a crucifix can be hung on the wall above the table. A Bible, prayer books,

holy water and basket of rosary beads can be placed on the table. Children's books on saints or Bible stories can fill a basket or bookshelf nearby.

Use different color cloths so your prayer table can reflect the various seasons in the liturgical year. A candle can be lighted with adult supervision. Flowers can be added on holy days or Marian feast days for family prayers, making the occasion of prayer more ceremonious.

Children can sit upon pillows or mats as they gather for morning or evening prayer or while listening to an age appropriate inspirational story. The kids can be encouraged to draw holy pictures to decorate the

area. Prayer petitions can be scribbled on paper and placed on the prayer table.





This unique area will grow with your children as you replace the large wooden rosary beads with grown-up beads and swap out the little kid books for more mature ones. With a bit of time, thought and prayer, you will have fashioned a little oratory for holy encounters, a place of refuge. Even when not in use, your prayer corner stands as a reminder of a holy reason for your days within the home.
