

Lent 2021: Beginning on Ash Wednesday (February 17), tens of thousands are joining together for "Let Freedom Ring: A 40-Day Tactical Training for Freedom from the Devil." Through acts of reparation, fasting, penance, charity, and prayer (both personal and sacramental) we call upon the power of God to release ourselves, our families, our parishes, our dioceses, and our nation from all demonic influences and oppression. Fast and Abstinence During Lent: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence and Fridays are obligatory days of abstinence. The norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal. Two smaller meals may also be taken, but not to equal a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding from age 14 onwards. If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus and to prepare ourselves to share more fully, and to celebrate more readily, His Resurrection.

During the Lenten season, help to support missionary efforts in and outside of the Diocese of Austin by participating in the **Ashes to Easter** program. If all the boxes were taken and you did not get you, you could make your owe box or put your donation in an envelope marked "Ashes to Easter". You will then return your boxes at Easter. Thank you, in advance, for your participation and generosity.

Dear friends in Christ,

Peace be with you. Thank you to everyone who is helping out with the Friday Fish Fries. It is an excellent meal. May God bless all of you and your labor.

In this bulletin is listed the Lenten Penance Services in our area. Please be sure to make a good confession before Easter. **Our Penance Service will be next Sunday, March 14, at 5:00 pm.** We will have five priests hearing confessions to take advantage of this opportunity to receive the love and forgiveness of God in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

On this Third Sunday of Lent we have in today's Gospel the story of Jesus throwing the money changers out of the Temple. The money changers were a necessary part of regular Temple religious activities. The problem was that these money changers were lying, cheating, and stealing from the people whom they were there to serve. They were breaking the Ten Commandments as given to us in today's First Reading from the Book of Exodus. In doing so they were defiling or desecrating the Temple in Jerusalem making it impure for worship. Jesus could not allow this to happen. Do we have the same zeal for the House of the Lord, our church, by keeping it as God would want it to be kept? Do we desecrate it by our actions or by the words we speak when we enter this building? Do we recognize our church as the House of God? Do we act with reverence when we are in church by keeping our voices down and not speaking loudly to one another? Do we show respect to one another and offer to each other the love of God while we are in church? May we have the same zeal for the House of God as Jesus.

You may want to take some time to reflect upon the Ten Commandments and then read today's Responsorial Psalm which comes from Psalm 19, verses 8-11. Do we view God's Law as it is described in this Psalm?

Don't forget to attend **Stations of the Cross** every week during Lent with your family. Stations are on Wednesdays at 6:30 p.m. Come and pray the Way of the Cross and walk with our Lord in His suffering so that you can experience the resurrection with Him.
